AN ACT RELATING TO THE IDAHO MEDICAL IMAGING AND RADIATION THERAPY PROTECTION ACT; AMENDING TITLE 54, IDAHO CODE, BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW CHAPTER 58, TITLE 54, IDAHO CODE, TO PROVIDE A SHORT TITLE, TO PROVIDE LEGISLATIVE FIND-INGS AND INTENT, TO DEFINE TERMS, TO PROVIDE FOR SCOPE OF PRACTICE, TO PROVIDE EXEMPTIONS FOR LICENSURE, TO PROVIDE THAT A LICENSE IS REQUIRED TO PERFORM MEDICAL IMAGING OR RADIATION THERAPY, TO PROVIDE FOR LIMITA-TIONS, TO ESTABLISH THE BOARD OF MEDICAL IMAGING AND RADIATION THERAPY EXAMINERS AND ITS ORGANIZATION, TO PROVIDE FOR POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE 10 BOARD, TO PROVIDE REQUIREMENTS FOR ISSUANCE OF A LICENSE, TO PROVIDE FOR ENDORSEMENT LICENSURE, TO PROVIDE FOR PROVISIONAL LICENSES, TO PROVIDE 11 FOR THE LICENSING OF EXISTING PRACTITIONERS OF MEDICAL IMAGING OR RA-12 DIATION THERAPY, TO PROVIDE FOR RENEWAL OF LICENSES, TO REQUIRE CERTAIN 13 CERTIFICATIONS FOR LICENSURE, TO PROVIDE FOR CERTAIN FEES, TO PROVIDE 14 15 FOR THE DENIAL OF LICENSES, TO PROVIDE FOR DISCIPLINARY PROCEEDINGS AND 16 TO PROHIBIT CERTAIN ACTS.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

SECTION 1. That Title 54, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended 18 by the addition thereto of a NEW CHAPTER, to be known and designated as Chap-19 ter 58, Title 54, Idaho Code, and to read as follows: 20

CHAPTER 58 IDAHO MEDICAL IMAGING AND RADIATION THERAPY PROTECTION ACT

54-5801. SHORT TITLE. This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Idaho Medical Imaging and Radiation Therapy Protection Act."

54-5802. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND INTENT. The legislature hereby finds and declares that the citizens of the state of Idaho are entitled to the maximum protection from the harmful effects of excessive and improperly performed medical imaging and radiation therapy procedures. Protection can be increased by requiring appropriate education and training of persons operating medical imaging equipment used to perform medical imaging and radiation therapy procedures. It is therefore necessary to establish standards of education and training for these operators and to provide for appropriate examination and licensure.

54-5803. DEFINITIONS. As used in this chapter:

- (1) "Board" means the board of medical imaging and radiation therapy examiners created by this chapter.
- (2) "Bone densitometry" means the determination of bone mass by means of the radiation absorption by a skeleton or part of a skeleton.

(3) "Computed tomography" means the process of producing sectional and three-dimensional images using external ionizing radiation.

- (4) "Diagnostic medical sonographer" means a person who is licensed under the provisions of this chapter to perform diagnostic medical sonography procedures.
- (5) "Diagnostic medical sonography" means the process of using high-frequency sound waves with specialized equipment to direct the sound waves into an area of the human body to generate a diagnostic image.
- (6) "Fluoroscopy" means the creation or acquisition of dynamic images using fluoroscopic equipment.
- (7) "Fluoroscopy operator" means a physician assistant who is licensed under the provisions of this chapter to perform fluoroscopy procedures.
- (8) "Hybrid imaging equipment" means imaging equipment that combines more than one (1) medical imaging modality into a single device.
- (9) "Ionizing radiation" means gamma rays and X-rays, alpha and beta particles, high-speed electrons, neutrons, protons and other atomic particles
- (10) "Licensed practitioner" means a person licensed to practice as a podiatrist, chiropractor, dentist, physician or surgeon pursuant to this title.
- (11) "Limited X-ray machine operator" means a person who is licensed under the provisions of this chapter to perform, under the supervision of a licensed practitioner, diagnostic radiography procedures or bone densitometry procedures using equipment that emits external ionizing radiation resulting in diagnostic radiographic images of selected specific parts of human anatomy or bone density measurements.
- (12) "Magnetic resonance imaging" means the creation or acquisition of images generated by using radiofrequency signals within a magnetic field for diagnostic or therapeutic purposes.
- (13) "Magnetic resonance technologist" means a person who is licensed under the provisions of this chapter to perform magnetic resonance procedures using magnetic fields and radiofrequency signals.
- (14) "Medical imaging" means any procedure or article intended for use in the diagnosis or visualization of disease or other medical conditions in human beings including, but not limited to, sonography, computed tomography, fluoroscopy, magnetic resonance, nuclear medicine, radiography and other procedures using ionizing radiation, high-frequency sound waves or magnetic fields.
- (15) "Mobile imaging" means any arrangement in which medical imaging services are transported to various sites. "Mobile imaging" does not include movement within a hospital or movement to a site where the equipment will be located permanently.
- (16) "Nuclear medicine technologist" means a person who is licensed under the provisions of this chapter to perform a variety of nuclear medicine and molecular imaging procedures using sealed and unsealed radiation sources, ionizing and nonionizing radiation, and adjunctive medicines; and therapeutic procedures using unsealed radioactive sources.
- (17) "Nuclear medicine technology" means the branch of medicine that uses in vivo and in vitro administration, detection and measurement of

radionuclide radiation and adjunctive medications in the diagnosis and treatment of disease.

- (18) "Physician assistant" means a person licensed to practice as a physician assistant pursuant to this title.
- (19) "Public member" means a person who is a resident of the state but who is not a licensed practitioner or a person who administers medical imaging or radiation therapy procedures under the provisions of this chapter.
- (20) "Radiation therapist" means a person who is licensed under the provisions of this chapter to administer ionizing radiation to human beings for therapeutic purposes.
- (21) "Radiation therapy" means the use of ionizing radiation for the purpose of treating disease.
- (22) "Radiographer" means a person who is licensed under the provisions of this chapter to perform a comprehensive set of diagnostic radiographic procedures using external ionizing radiation to produce bone density measurements and radiographic, fluoroscopic or digital images.
- (23) "Radiography" means the process of obtaining an image for diagnostic evaluation using external ionizing radiation or X-rays.
- (24) "Radiologist" means a physician licensed in this state who is board-eligible for certification or certified by the American board of radiology, the American osteopathic board of radiology, the British royal college of radiology or the royal college of physicians and surgeons of Canada.
- (25) "Radiologist assistant" means a licensed radiographer who is additionally licensed under this chapter to perform a variety of activities under the supervision of a radiologist in the areas of patient care, patient management, medical imaging or interventional procedures guided by medical imaging.
- 54-5804. SCOPE OF PRACTICE. (1) Individuals licensed to perform radiation therapy may perform computed tomography or magnetic resonance imaging for treatment planning purposes.
- (2) Individuals licensed to perform nuclear medicine technology may perform computed tomography or magnetic resonance imaging for attenuation correction on hybrid imaging equipment.
- (3) No later than July 1, 2018, all individuals licensed to perform medical imaging and radiation therapy who perform computed tomography for diagnostic purposes must be certified in computed tomography by the American registry of radiologic technologists, the nuclear medicine technologist certification board or a certification organization recognized by the board.
- (4) Individuals licensed to perform radiography may perform fluoroscopy.
- (5) Individuals licensed to perform radiologist assistant services may provide initial imaging observations only to the supervising radiologist and may not perform image interpretation, diagnose patients or prescribe medications or therapies.
- (6) Individuals issued a limited X-ray machine operator license may not perform procedures involving the administration or utilization of contrast media, or perform fluoroscopy, mammography, computed tomography, mobile

imaging, nuclear medicine, magnetic resonance, diagnostic medical sonography or radiation therapy procedures.

(7) Individuals issued a fluoroscopy operator license may not perform procedures involving radiography, mammography, computed tomography, mobile imaging, nuclear medicine, magnetic resonance, diagnostic medical sonography or radiation therapy procedures.

54-5805. EXEMPTIONS FOR LICENSURE. The provisions of this act shall not apply to the following:

- (1) A licensed practitioner performing medical imaging procedures or administering radiation therapy;
 - (2) A registered dental hygienist licensed by the state;
 - (3) A dental assistant licensed by the state;

- (4) A resident physician or a student enrolled in and attending a school or college of medicine, chiropractic, podiatry, medical imaging or radiation therapy, who performs medical imaging or radiation therapy procedures on humans while under the supervision of a licensed practitioner or under direct supervision of a diagnostic medical sonographer, magnetic resonance technologist, nuclear medicine technologist, radiation therapist, radiographer or radiologist assistant holding a license under the provisions of this chapter;
- (5) A person administering medical imaging or radiation procedures who is employed by the United States government when performing duties associated with that employment;
- (6) A person performing medical procedures or radiation therapy on non-human subjects or cadavers; and
- (7) A person performing sonography procedures that do not generate a recorded diagnostic medical image that is used to assess specific and limited information about a patient's immediate medical condition and limited to a focused imaging target. A focused imaging target includes, but is not limited to:
 - (a) Identification of an anatomical landmark or blood vessel for vascular access or administration of anesthesia;
 - (b) Assessment of fluid in a body cavity;
 - (c) Assessment of fetal presentation or heartbeat;
 - (d) Fetal monitoring during active labor; or
 - (e) Assessment of foreign body position or location.
- 54-5806. LICENSE REQUIRED -- LIMITATIONS. (1) On and after July 1, 2018, only a licensed practitioner or an individual licensed under the provisions of this chapter may perform medical imaging or radiation therapy procedures on humans for diagnostic or therapeutic purposes.
- (2) The board shall establish licensure standards for individuals performing diagnostic medical sonography, fluoroscopy, limited X-ray machine operation, magnetic resonance imaging, nuclear medicine technology, radiation therapy, radiography and for radiologist assistants.
- (3) A person holding a license under this chapter may use radioactive substances or equipment emitting ionizing radiation, high-frequency sound waves or magnetic fields for medical imaging and radiation therapy procedures on humans for diagnostic or therapeutic purposes only by prescription

of an individual authorized by the state to prescribe medical imaging or radiation therapy procedures and under the supervision of a licensed practitioner.

- (4) Nothing in the provisions of this chapter relating to medical imaging or radiation therapy shall limit or enlarge the practice of a licensed practitioner herein defined.
- 54-5807. BOARD OF MEDICAL IMAGING AND RADIATION THERAPY EXAMINERS -- ORGANIZATION AND MEETINGS. (1) The board of medical imaging and radiation therapy examiners is hereby created. The board shall consist of five (5) members appointed by the governor and shall serve at the pleasure of the governor. Board members shall, except for the initial appointments, be currently licensed and in good standing to engage in the practice of medical imaging or radiation therapy in this state; shall be residents of the state of Idaho; and shall be appointed within ninety (90) days following the effective date of this chapter. The members of the board shall consist of:
 - (a) One (1) radiologist;

- (b) One (1) licensed practitioner;
- (c) One (1) public member; and
- (d) Two (2) persons who perform medical imaging.
- (2) Initial appointments to the board shall be for the following terms: one (1) shall be appointed for a term of one (1) year; two (2) for a term of two (2) years; and two (2) for a term of three (3) years. Vacancies shall be filled for an unexpired term only in the manner provided by the original appointment. The initial members of the board who are not a licensed practitioner or public member must meet the qualifications for licensure under this act.
- (3) In the event of the death, resignation or removal of any board member before the expiration of the term to which the member is appointed, the vacancy shall be filled for the unexpired portion of the term in the same manner as the original appointment.
- (4) Each member of the board shall receive an honorarium as provided in section $59-509\,(n)$, Idaho Code.
- (5) No public member shall have any association or relationship with a licensed practitioner or person who performs medical imaging or radiation therapy procedures that would prevent or in any way hinder the public member in representing the interest of the public.
- (6) The board shall meet annually and at such times as deemed necessary and advisable by the chairman, or by a majority of its members, or by the governor. Notice of all meetings shall be given in the manner prescribed by rule. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum at any meeting or hearing.
 - 54-5808. BOARD POWERS. The board shall have the following powers:
- (1) To receive applications for licensure, determine the qualifications of persons applying for licensure, provide licenses to applicants qualified under the provisions of this chapter and reinstate and deny licenses;
 - (2) To establish by rule and collect fees as prescribed by this chapter;

(3) To maintain records necessary to carry out its duties under this chapter;

- (4) To pass upon the qualifications and fitness of applicants for licenses and to adopt rules requiring annual continuing education as a condition for the renewal of licenses issued under this chapter;
- (5) To prescribe by rule the minimum number of and qualifications for continuing education units (CEUs) to be required of each medical imaging and radiation therapy examiner seeking to obtain or renew a license in the state of Idaho and for the approval of continuing education courses;
- (6) To examine for, deny, approve, issue, revoke and suspend licenses pursuant to this chapter and to conduct investigations and hearings in connection with such actions;
- (7) To establish requirements for reinstatement and renewal of licenses;
- (8) To adopt and revise such rules as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this chapter in compliance with chapter 52, title 67, Idaho Code. The rules shall include, but shall not be limited to, a code of ethics for medical imaging and radiation therapy examiners and licensed medical imaging and radiation therapy examiner standards of practice;
- (9) In any proceeding before the board authorized by this chapter, to administer oaths or affirmations to witnesses appearing before it;
- (10) To recover the actual costs and fees, including attorney's fees, incurred by the board in the investigation and prosecution of a licensee upon the finding of a violation of this chapter or a rule adopted or an order issued by the board under this chapter;
- (11) To take such action as may be necessary to enforce the provisions of this chapter and to regulate the practice of medical imaging and radiation therapy;
- (12) In a final order, to impose a civil penalty not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each violation by a licensee of this chapter or of rules adopted by the board; and
- (13) To authorize, by written agreement, the bureau of occupational licenses as its agent to act in its interest and, in its discretion, to contract with the bureau of occupational licenses for those services deemed necessary for the proper administration of this chapter.
- 54-5809. REQUIREMENTS FOR ISSUANCE OF A LICENSE. (1) In addition to such other information as the board may require by rule, each applicant under this act shall:
 - (a) At the time of application, be at least eighteen (18) years of age;
 - (b) Hold a high school diploma or have passed an approved equivalency test;
 - (c) Submit an application in the form prescribed by the board;
 - (d) Pay the fee determined by the board by rule; and
 - (e) Provide evidence satisfactory to the board of having successfully passed a nationally recognized competency examination approved by the board by rule.
- (2) Holders of a license under the provisions of this chapter shall display the official license document or a verified copy in each place of regular employment.

54-5810. ENDORSEMENT LICENSURE. An applicant who satisfies the board that he is licensed or registered under the laws of another state, territory or jurisdiction of the United States, which in the opinion of the board imposes substantially equivalent licensing requirements as this act, may, upon the payment of the required fee and the approval of the application, be licensed by endorsement pursuant to this act.

- 54-5811. PROVISIONAL LICENSE. (1) The board may grant an existing practitioner of medical imaging or radiation therapy who does not qualify for licensure under the provisions of this act a provisional license to practice medical imaging or radiation therapy upon filing an application with the board and payment of the fee established by the board by rule.
- (2) The provisional license shall be valid for one (1) year from the date of its issue and may be renewed at the discretion of the board for additional one (1) year periods up to a maximum of four (4) renewals. A provisional license shall expire automatically upon the issuance of a full license.
- (3) A provisionally licensed practitioner of medical imaging or radiation therapy shall work under the general supervision of a licensed practitioner of medical imaging or radiation therapy or under a licensed practitioner at all times during which the provisionally licensed practitioner of medical imaging or radiation therapy performs medical imaging or radiation therapy. An application for extension of the provisional license shall be signed by the supervisor. General supervision shall not require the physical presence of the provisional licensee's supervisor at the location where such provisional licensee provides medical imaging or radiation therapy services; however, the supervisor shall be readily accessible by telephone or electronically for consultation and assistance whenever such provisional licensee provides such services.
- 54-5812. LICENSING OF EXISTING PRACTITIONERS OF MEDICAL IMAGING OR RADIATION THERAPY. Until July 1, 2018, an individual who does not qualify for licensure under this chapter may apply to the board for licensure, and the board may approve the application if the individual has paid the required fees and:
- (1) Has worked as a practitioner of medical imaging or radiation therapy for a minimum of ten (10) years preceding the enactment of these provisions with at least five (5) of those years being the five (5) years immediately preceding the application for a license;
- (2) Submits three (3) letters of recommendation from individuals who have worked with the applicant in an employment setting, including at least one (1) letter from a practitioner of medical imaging or radiation therapy who qualifies for licensure under this chapter and one (1) letter from a licensed practitioner; and
- (3) Provides documentation satisfactory to the board that he has completed formal training in medical imaging or radiation therapy as determined by the board and has practiced medical imaging or radiation therapy for at least five (5) hours per week on average for at least the five (5) years immediately prior to the date of application.

54-5813. RENEWAL OF LICENSES. (1) All licenses issued under the provisions of this chapter shall be subject to annual renewal and shall expire on the licensee's birthday unless renewed in the manner prescribed by the board regarding applications for renewal, continuing education and fees and in compliance with section 67-2614, Idaho Code.

- (2) In addition to such other requirements as the board may establish by rule, each applicant shall present satisfactory evidence when seeking license renewal that in the period since the license was issued or last renewed the applicant has completed the amount of board-approved continuing education required by the board by rule. The board may waive all or a portion of these requirements or grant an extension of time in which to complete these requirements upon a finding of good cause.
- 54-5814. CERTIFICATIONS FOR LICENSURE. (1) An applicant for a license to perform diagnostic medical sonography shall be certified and registered in sonography by the American registry of diagnostic medical sonography, the American registry of radiologic technologists or by a certification organization recognized by the board.
- (2) An applicant for a license to perform magnetic resonance imaging shall be certified and registered in magnetic resonance imaging by the American registry of radiologic technologists or by a certification organization recognized by the board.
- (3) An applicant for a license to perform nuclear medicine shall be certified and registered in nuclear medicine by the American registry of radiologic technologists or by the nuclear medicine technology certification board or by a certification organization recognized by the board.
- (4) An applicant for a license to perform radiation therapy shall be certified and registered in radiation therapy by the American registry of radiologic technologists or by a certification organization recognized by the board.
- (5) An applicant for a license to perform radiography shall be certified and registered in radiography by the American registry of radiologic technologists or by a certification organization recognized by the board.
- (6) An applicant for a license to perform radiologist assistant services shall be licensed as a radiographer and certified and registered as a radiologist assistant by the American registry of radiologic technologists or as a radiology practitioner assistant by the certification board of radiology practitioner assistants. Radiologist assistant license applicants shall submit to the board clinical protocols signed by the supervising radiologist specifying procedures that are performed by the radiologist assistant, levels of radiologist supervision and locations of practice designated by the supervising radiologist. Updated protocols shall be submitted biannually consistent with license renewal. The radiologist assistant scope of practice shall be consistent with the most recent version of the radiologist assistant practice standards published by the American society of radiologic technologists.
- (7) An applicant for a limited X-ray machine operator license shall pass an examination approved by the board. The board may contract with the American registry of radiologic technologists to administer an examination. The board may accept certification from the American chiropractic registry

of radiologic technologists for persons applying for a limited permit in spine radiography and working only in chiropractic facilities. The board may accept certification from the American society of podiatric medical assistants for persons applying for a limited permit in podiatric radiography and working only in podiatric facilities.

- (8) The license of a limited X-ray machine operator shall be limited in scope through the issuance of permits to perform diagnostic X-rays on specific anatomical areas of the human body. The anatomical areas for which a limited X-ray machine operator may be licensed are:
 - (a) Chest radiography: radiography of the thorax, heart and lungs;
 - (b) Extremities radiography: radiography of the upper and lower extremities, including the pectoral girdle;
 - (c) Spine radiography: radiography of the vertebral column;
 - (d) Skull and sinus radiology: radiography of the skull and facial structures;
 - (e) Podiatric: radiography of the foot, ankle and lower leg below the knee; and
 - (f) Bone densitometry: Individuals who are certified by the international society for clinical densitometry or who have successfully completed the American registry of radiologic technologists bone densitometry examination shall be granted a license to perform bone densitometry measurement.
- (9) An applicant for a fluoroscopy operator license shall be a physician assistant licensed under this title who has:
 - (a) Completed forty (40) hours of didactic education in radiation safety, radiation protection, equipment operation, image acquisition, patient positioning and other subject areas determined by the board;
 - (b) Documented forty (40) hours of clinical education supervised by a radiologist or licensed radiographer; and
 - (c) Successfully completed the American registry of radiologic technologists fluoroscopy examination. The board shall determine by rule the examination score that constitutes successful completion.
- (10) Persons who have been engaged in the practice of medical imaging or radiation therapy, other than a radiologist assistant or fluoroscopy operator, who do not hold a current registration from a voluntary professional certification organization approved by the board, may continue to practice in the modality of medical imaging or radiation therapy in which they are currently employed provided that they:
 - (a) Register with the board on or before July 1, 2018;
 - (b) Do not change the scope of their current practice;
 - (c) Complete all continuing education requirements for their area of practice biannually as prescribed by the board;
 - (d) Practice only under the supervision of a licensed practitioner; and
 - (e) Obtain a license from the board on or before July 1, 2023.
- 54-5815. FEES. (1) The board shall establish by rule fees for licensure under the provisions of this chapter as follows:
 - (a) An application fee not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200);
 - (b) A fee established by rule for an initial full license not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200);

- (c) A fee established by rule for a provisional license, an endorsement license and for an existing medical imaging or radiation therapy license not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200);
- (d) The fee established by rule for annual renewal of licenses not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200); and
- (e) Fees charged pursuant to paragraph (b), (c) or (d) of this subsection shall be in addition to the application fee.
- (2) All fees received under the provisions of this chapter shall be non-refundable and shall be deposited in the state treasury to the credit of the occupational license account in the dedicated fund, and all costs and expenses incurred by the board under the provisions of this chapter shall be a charge against and paid from the account for such purposes, and the funds collected hereunder shall be immediately available for the administration of this chapter, the provisions of any other law notwithstanding.

54-5816. DENIAL OF LICENSE AND DISCIPLINARY PROCEEDINGS. (1) The board may refuse to issue, refuse to renew, revoke, suspend or otherwise sanction a licensee upon the following grounds:

- (a) Fraud or deception in procuring or renewing the license;
- (b) Having been found guilty, convicted, or placed on probation; having entered into a guilty plea that is accepted by the court; forfeited bail, bond or collateral deposited to secure a defendant's appearance; or having received a withheld judgment or suspended sentence of a felony by a court of competent jurisdiction;
- (c) Gross incompetence or unprofessional conduct;
- (d) Fraud or deceit in connection with services rendered as a genetic counselor or in establishing qualifications for licensure under this chapter;
- (e) Violation of any of the provisions of this chapter or any of the rules promulgated by the board under the authority of this chapter;
- (f) Failure to comply with a board order;

- (g) Having had a license revoked or suspended or having been otherwise disciplined by the board or the proper authorities of another state, territory or country;
- (h) Habitual drunkenness or addiction to habit-forming drugs, either of which impairs the ability to perform work without danger to himself or the public;
- (i) Aiding or abetting any person not licensed or otherwise authorized under this chapter in the practice of medical imaging or radiation therapy in the state of Idaho;
- (j) Representing himself as a person licensed to perform medical imaging or radiation therapy when he is unlicensed;
- (k) Failing to maintain the requirements for a license or failing to achieve the minimum CEUs required for the renewal of a license;
- (1) Having a license or certification in a related field revoked or suspended or having been otherwise disciplined in Idaho or any other state; or
- (m) Unethical or unprofessional conduct as defined by the rules of the board or the code of ethics established by the rules of the board.

(2) The board may reinstate any revoked or suspended license upon such terms as it may determine.

- (3) The board may by rule provide a procedure for an applicant to request an exemption review for a felony or lesser crime conviction. The applicant shall bear the burden and financial responsibility of providing all evidence, documentation and proof of suitability for licensure required by the board for exemption review.
- 54-5817. CERTAIN ACTS PROHIBITED. It shall be unlawful and a misdemeanor for any person to engage in any of the following acts:
- (1) To practice medical imaging or radiation therapy or to represent himself to be licensed in providing medical imaging or radiation therapy without having at the time of so doing, a valid license issued under this chapter; or
- (2) To use in connection with his name or place of business, the titles involved in medical imaging or radiation therapy, as provided in this chapter, or any words indicating or implying that the person holds such a license unless he is licensed in accordance with this chapter.
