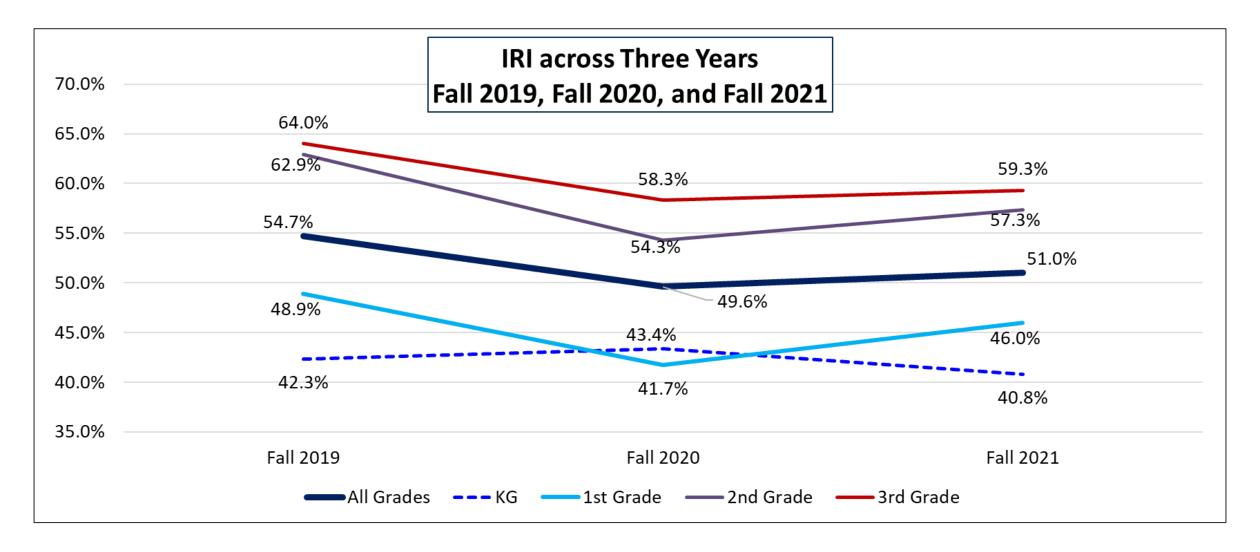

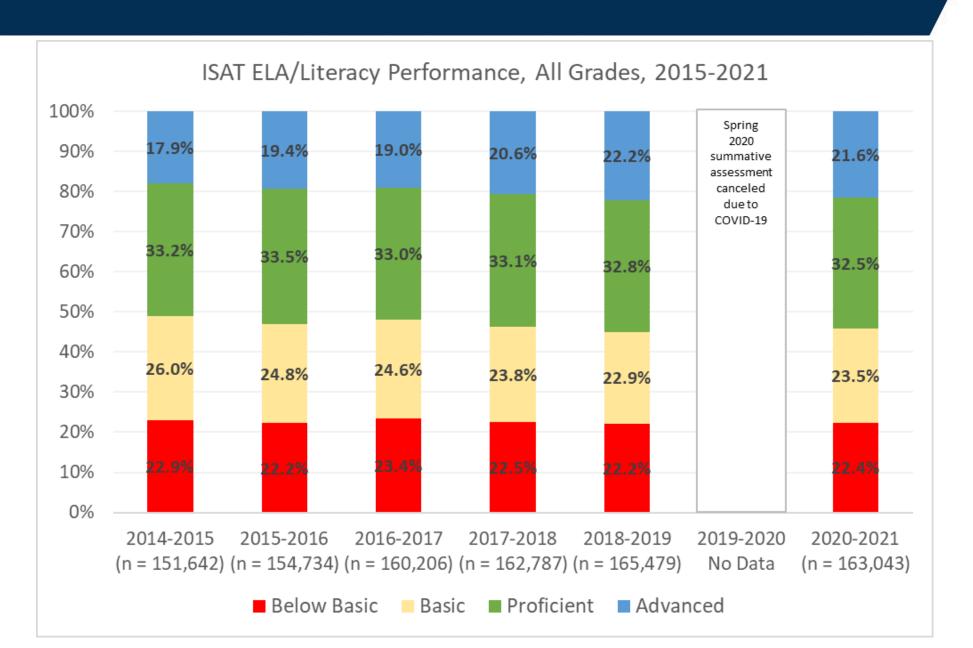
Idaho Reading Indicator (IRI)





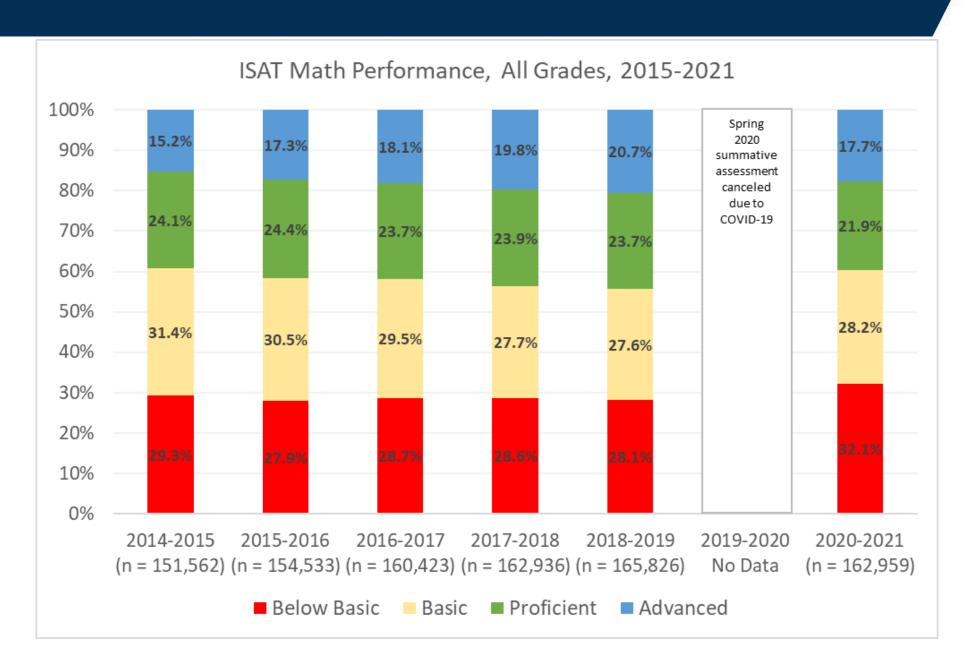
Idaho Standards Achievement Tests - ELA





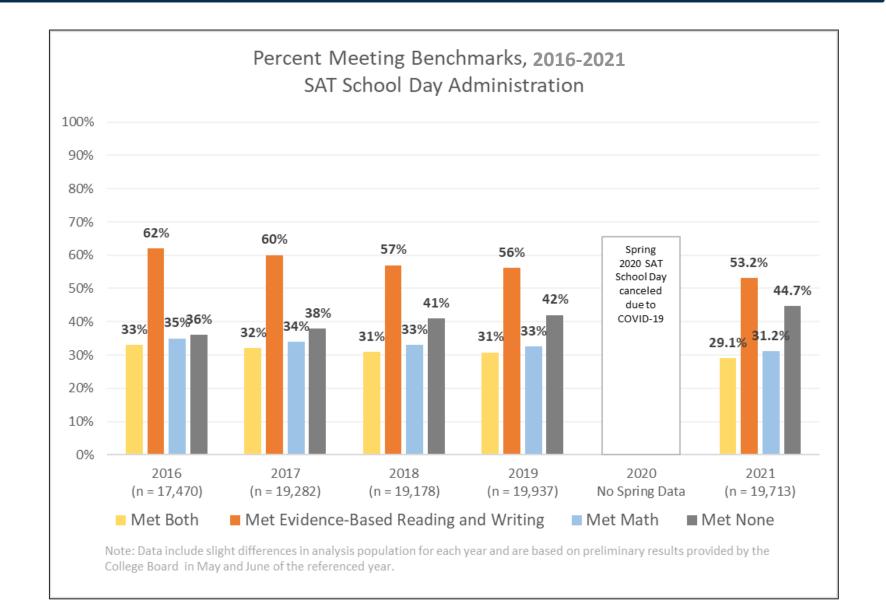
Idaho Standards Achievement Tests - Math

Clarifying Purpose of & Results from SAT



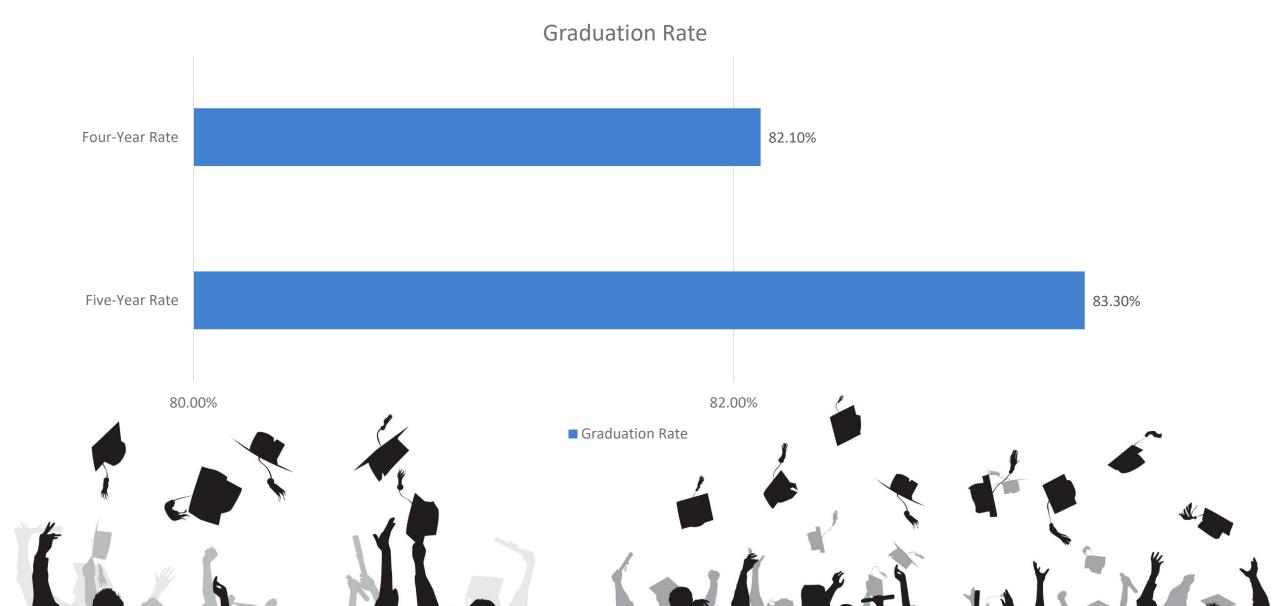
 SAT assesses the knowledge and skills learned in high school that are important to know in college and for career readiness.

"Students are considered college- and career-ready when their SAT scores meet both the Math and the Evidence-Based Reading and Writing benchmarks. It is important to note that college readiness is a continuum — students scoring below the SAT benchmarks can still be successful in college, especially with additional preparation and perseverance."

Addressing Learning Loss



 Governor recommended and Legislature appropriated \$20 million from Federal COVID-19 Relief Fund

- Districts & Charter schools used funds to address local needs based on recommendations for:
 - Summer Programs, Afterschool Programs,
 Additional Tutoring, Targeted Intervention, etc.

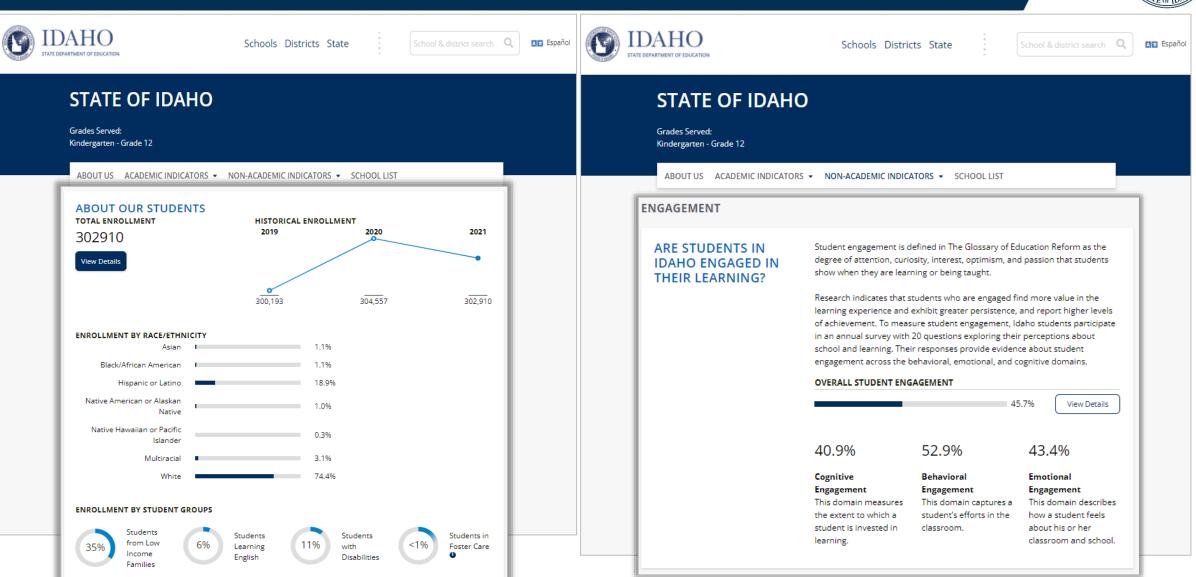

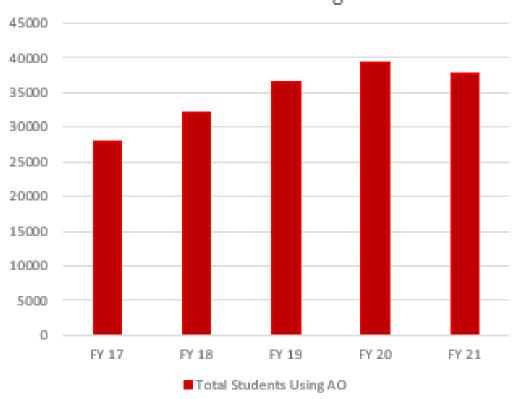

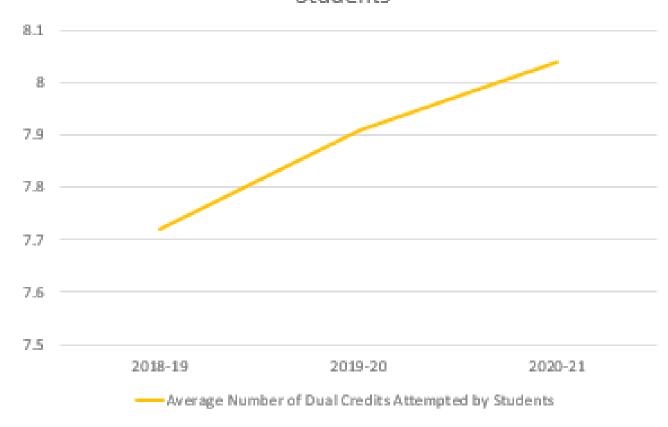

Average Number of Dual Credits Attempted by Students

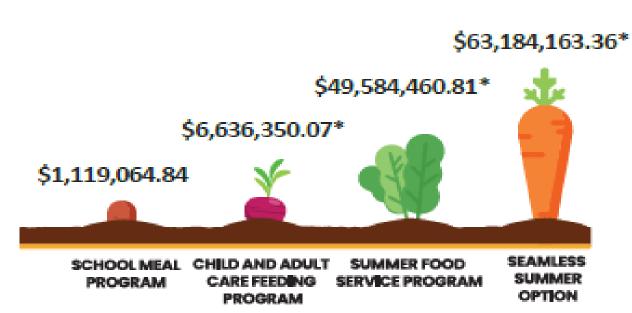
