GAVEL:

Chairman Burtenshaw passed the gavel to Vice Chairman Bayer.

DOCKET NO. Notice of Omnibus Rulemaking (Fee Rule) - Proposed Rule, p. 335. Casey

> Chumrau, Executive Director, Idaho Wheat Commission, introduced herself to the Committee. Ms. Chumrau advised that there are no fee or language changes

in the docket.

MOTION: Senator Nelson moved to approve Docket No. 42-0101-2100F. Senator Blair

seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote.

Notice of Omnibus Rulemaking (Fee Rule) - Proposed Rule, p. 347. Laura DOCKET NO. Wilder, Executive Director, Idaho Barley Commission (IBC), introduced herself to 53-0101-2100F

the Committee. Ms. Wilder stated the rule is the same as last year's rule docket.

MOTION: Senator Blair moved to approve Docket No. 53-0101-2100F. Senator Ricks

seconded the motion. The motion carried by **voice vote**.

**DISCUSSION:** 

PRESENTATION Idaho Barley Commission Annual Report. Ms. Wilder provided the Committee with the IBC's annual report (see Attachment 1). She gave an overview of the IBC, discussed Idaho barley production, reviewed the economic impact of the Idaho

barley industry, and highlighted IBC activities.

Senator Nelson asked about 2021 barley prices. Ms. Wilder responded that most prices were contracted prior to the growing season. She said growers with excess barley to sell obtained a higher price last year. Ms. Wilder added that the 2022 contracting process started earlier and at higher prices than in 2021. She noted that input prices have also increased.

Senator Patrick inquired whether beer made out of the country with Idaho barley and then shipped back to Idaho is considered an import. Ms. Wilder answered yes.

Senator Blair asked the reason for a decrease in beer consumption. Ms. Wilder responded that the number of adults consuming alcohol has decreased in the last ten years from 55 percent to 50 percent. She commented that seltzer consumption

has increased and consumers have gravitated to lower priced beverages.

Senator Blair inquired about the impacts of shipping challenges and increased Argentina barley production on the Idaho barley industry. Ms. Wilder replied that shipping issues have primarily impacted the Asia market. She reported that transportation options are limited and costs have increased significantly. Ms. Wilder observed that barley production in other countries has not impacted the Idaho barley industry due to an increase in worldwide demand for barley.

Vice Chairman Bayer asked how barley moves from Idaho to market. Ms. Wilder answered that barley is most often shipped by rail to Mexico, the Coors plant in Colorado, and ports in Seattle and Portland.

In response to questions from **Senator Blair** about using ports in other parts of the country, Ms. Wilder advised that it is difficult to transfer shipments. There are insufficient numbers of shipping containers and workers at the ports, she said. She advised that the cost of containers has increased dramatically. Ms. Wilder stated some Idaho producers also reported delays in receiving shipments of needed equipment.

DOCKET NO. 60-0501-2100 Notice of Omnibus Rulemaking - Proposed Rule, p. 159. Delwyne Trefz, Administrator, Idaho Soil & Water Conservation Commission (ISWCC), introduced himself to the Committee. Mr. Trefz provided an overview of the ISWCC's mission and functions. He stated the text of the rule has not changed from previous years. Mr. Trefz explained that the rule was moved from a fee rule to a non-fee rule because there were no fees established in the rule.

DISCUSSION:

Vice Chairman Bayer asked whether participation in the Resource Conservation & Rangeland Development (RCRD) loan program had improved. Mr. Trefz responded that ISWCC Commissioners reduced the loan rate by 1.5 percent on August 19, 2021. As a result, there has been increased participation, he said. Mr. Trefz noted that some applicants are discouraged by the additional requirements imposed by a federal program. He added that cost and availability of materials has had a negative impact on conservation projects.

MOTION:

Senator Nelson moved to approve Docket No. 60-0501-2100. Senator Den **Hartog** seconded the motion. The motion carried by **voice vote**.

PASSED THE GAVEL:

Vice Chairman Bayer passed the gavel to Chairman Burtenshaw.

PRESENTATION: Idaho Soil & Water Conservation Commission Annual Report. Mr. Trefz provided the Committee with the ISWCC's annual report and reviewed its performance measurement report (see Attachments 2 and 3). He discussed challenges with hiring a qualified engineer to fill a critical vacant position. Mr. Trefz stated the ISWCC was recently fortunate to hire three new natural resource conservationists who bring energy and enthusiasm to the ISWCC.

> **Devin Fielding**, Division 5 Director, Idaho Association of Soil Conservation Districts (IASCD), introduced himself to the Committee. Mr. Fielding gave a brief overview of his background in agriculture and conservation. He explained the history of soil and water conservation districts and their powers and sources of funding (see Attachment 4). Mr. Fielding reviewed several IASCD projects. He emphasized the importance of partnerships among government agencies, landowners, and business owners in resource conservation.

There being no further business at this time, Chairman Burtenshaw adjourned the meeting at 9:07 a.m.
