Chairman Palmer called the meeting to order at 1:31 p.m.

H 571: Rep. Christensen presented H 571. This bill provides for a maximum speed limit

a school bus may travel, up to seventy miles per hour on an interstate highway,

provided the bus does not exceed the posted speed limit.

Rep. Shepherd spoke in support of the bill citing the dangers of school buses traveling at a much slower rate of speed than semi-trucks and other traffic on

MOTION: Rep. McCrostie made a motion to send H 571 to the floor with a DO PASS

recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Christensen will sponsor

the bill on the floor.

H 523: Brian Goeke, DMV Policy Manager for the Idaho Transportation Department,

presented **H 523**. The bill eliminates the outdated practice of requiring drivers to surrender their license when their driving privileges are suspended. Mr. Goeke said most suspensions are for only a brief period of time. He added, an individual's driving status is displayed in real-time to law enforcement and drivers' licenses are the main source of identification for many uses such as banking, traveling and

public services.

MOTION: Rep. DeMordaunt made a motion to send H 523 to the floor with a DO PASS

recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Gannon will sponsor the

bill on the floor.

H 525: Brian Goeke said this bill extends the length of time a Commercial Learner's Permit

is valid, from six months to one year.

MOTION: Rep. Blanksma made a motion to send H 525 to the floor with a DO PASS

recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Manwaring will sponsor

the bill on the floor.

H 524: Ramon Hobdey-Sanchez, ITD Program Manager, presented legislation to

eliminate the Head Start Association from the Interagency Working Group. The IWG is a compilation of thirteen state agencies that advise the Idaho Transportation Department on public transportation needs and efficient use of certain Federal Transit Administration grants. Head Start does not receive these grants and no longer participates in the group. The language in statute is outdated and obsolete.

MOTION: Rep. Harris made a motion to send H 524 to the floor with a DO PASS

recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Gannon will sponsor the

bill on the floor.

H 476: Major Steve Stokes, Idaho Military Division General Counsel, presented H 476.

This bill clarifies the recommending and appointing authority for the Governing Board of The Youth Challenge Academy. It allows the Adjutant General to provide nominees to the Governor for members of the board. The bill transitions student

eligibility criteria from an administrative rule into statute.

MOTION: Rep. DeMordaunt made a motion to send H 476 to the floor with a DO PASS

recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. DeMordaunt will sponsor

the bill on the floor.

H 477: Major Nathaniel Petersen, Brigade Judge Advocate, Idaho National Guard, said

the Idaho Military Division seeks to amend and update Code in order to correctly

reflect diversity within the Idaho Military Division.

MOTION: Rep. Rubel made a motion to send H 477 to the floor with a DO PASS

recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Rubel will sponsor the bill

on the floor.

H 478: Lt. Col. Lauren Tschampl, Staff Judge Advocate for the Air National Guard,

presented **H 478**. The Idaho Military Division's Public Safety Communication's group installs communication equipment and microwave services in emergency and first responder vehicles throughout the state, as required by code. This bill provides positive statutory authority to continue to charge for the equipment and services

they provide to other state agencies.

MOTION: Rep. DeMordaunt made a motion to send H 478 to the floor with a DO PASS

recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Syme will sponsor the bill

on the floor.

H 475: Major Steve Stokes presented H 475. This bill eliminates provisions in Code

deemed by the Idaho Military Division as outdated or unnecessary. Certain language being omitted is seen as unconstitutionally broad, vague, unenforceable, unnecessary, and otherwise inconsistent with Idaho law and the State's Constitution.

Speaking **in opposition** was a contingent of people from Coeur d'Alene. Sandpoint, Post Falls, Moscow and Boise. Concerns they voiced were, by eliminating the prescribed language in the bill, members of the public would fall victim to vigilantism,

lawlessness and intimidation.

ORIGINAL MOTION:

Rep. Syme made a motion to HOLD H 475 in committee.

SUBSTITUTE MOTION:

Rep. Gannon made a substitute motion to send **H 475** to General Orders.

AMENDED SUBSTITUTE MOTION: Rep. DeMordaunt made an amended substitute motion to send H 475 to the floor

without recommendation.

VOTE ON Chairman Palmer called for a vote on the amended substitute motion. Roll call **AMENDED** vote was requested. Motion carried by a vote of 13 AYE and 4 NAY and 1 SUBSTITUTE absent/excused. Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. Palmer, DeMordaunt, Gestrin, Youngblood, Dixon, Harris, Holtclaw, Monks, Blanksma, Manwaring, MOTION: Mitchell, Okuniewicz, Shepherd. Voting in opposition to the motion: Reps. Syme, Gannon, Rubel, McCrostie. Rep. Addis was absent/excused. Rep. Palmer will sponsor the bill on the floor.
