CONVENED: Chairman Burtenshaw called the meeting of the Senate Agricultural Affairs

Committee (Committee) to order at 8:01 a.m.

GAVEL:

Chairman Burtenshaw passed the gavel to Vice Chairman Bayer.

DOCKET NO. 51-0101-2100F

Notice of Omnibus Rulemaking (Fee Rule) - Proposed Rule, p. 343. T. K. Kuwahara, Chief Executive Officer, Idaho Beef Council (IBC), introduced herself to the Committee. May Kuwahara advised the rule desket included miner

to the Committee. **Ms. Kuwahara** advised the rule docket included minor non-substantive language changes from last year and no changes to fees.

MOTION: Senator Patrick moved to approve Docket No. 51-0101-2100F. Senator Den

Hartog seconded the motion. The motion carried by **voice vote**.

PASSED THE

GAVEL:

Vice Chairman Bayer passed the gavel to Chairman Burtenshaw.

PRESENTATION: Idaho Beef Council Annual Update. Ms. Kuwahara gave an overview of

the IBC's composition, mission, goals, challenges, and ongoing education and outreach efforts (see Attachment 1). She noted that the IBC was not authorized to perform any lobbying activities. **Ms. Kuwahara** presented examples of promotional

materials showcasing Idaho beef.

DISCUSSION: Senator Blair asked how the IBC addressed the public's increased focus on

sustainability. **Ms. Kuwahara** answered that the IBC focused on ranchers' efforts to rotate grazing, improve plant health, conserve water supplies, and manage interactions with wildlife. **Senator Blair** inquired if the IBC discussed beef labeling such as grass fed, hormone free, and so forth. **Ms. Kuwahara** replied that the IBC could only state facts or provide nutritional labels. She pointed out that the IBC

could educate consumers on the meaning of various label terms.

PRESENTATION: Idaho Oilseed Commission (IOC) Annual Update. Erik Olson, Chairman, IOC,

introduced himself to the Committee. **Mr. Olson** gave a brief overview of his background and farming history. He listed Idaho's primary oilseed crops and the locations where they were grown in Idaho. **Mr. Olson** described the uses and positive attributes of oilseed crops. He noted the health benefits of canola oil. **Mr. Olson** mentioned a new crushing facility in Warden, Washington resulted in better access for producers. He discussed University of Idaho (UI) research into oilseed

breeding and pest control. He noted issues with UI research funding.

DISCUSSION:

Senator Nelson asked for more information about the funding difficulties. Mr. Olson replied that 2021 IOC assessments were down due to the drought. He stated the funding structure was problematic. Mr. Olson observed that producer assessments should not fund UI positions but instead should be used strictly for research projects. The Legislature should increase UI's budget to stabilize staff funding, he said.

Chairman Burtenshaw asked about the process to harvest canola. Mr. Olson said he used a regular combine with a direct cut system. He explained his no-till process to evenly spread the chaff rows for water savings and seed bed preparation.

PRESENTATION: Idaho Rangeland Resources Commission (IRRC) Annual Update. Gretchen Hyde, Executive Director, IRRC, introduced herself to the Committee. Ms. Hyde described the IRRC's mission, funding sources, goals, and outreach efforts (see Attachment 2). She discussed educational programs for children and teachers. Ms. Hyde presented a video developed to inform recreational users about respectful rangeland practices to minimize conflicts. She reported the results of an annual survey commissioned to gauge public sentiment on rangeland use.

DISCUSSION:

Chairman Burtenshaw asked the amount of rangeland in Idaho. Ms. Hyde said 20 million acres was rangeland, comprising 54 percent of the State.

WELCOME:

State FFA Officer Team. Chairman Burtenshaw welcomed Katie Hebdon, Future Farmers of America (FFA) State Vice President, and Cassie Moody, FFA State Sentinel, to the Committee. Ms. Hebdon reported that FFA members traveled to Boise to celebrate National FFA Week. Ms. Moody said National FFA Week was an opportunity for members to get together for meetings, projects, and agriculture advocacy. Ms. Hebdon described the FFA three-circle model of agriculture classroom education, application of learning outside the classroom, and a project to tie the learning together. Ms. Moody reviewed the history of her involvement in FFA.

Senator Blair asked about current FFA projects in Ms. Moody's home town of Deary. Ms. Moody answered that in addition to preparing for the FFA State competition in April, other projects included welding, metal shop, and livestock and horse judging.

There being no further business at this time, Chairman Burtenshaw adjourned the meeting at 9:13 a.m.
