Mr. Moyle moved that the House adopt as Rules and Joint Rules for the First and Second Sessions of the Sixty-fourth Legislature, the Rules and Joint Rules as adopted by the Sixty-third Legislature. Seconded by Mr. Erpelding.

Whereupon the Speaker declared by voice vote that a majority of the members having voted in the affirmative, the motion carried and the Rules and Joint Rules were adopted.

There being no objection, the House advanced to the Thirteenth Order of Business.

His Excellency, the Governor of the State of Idaho, C.L. "Butch" Otter, was introduced by the Speaker and the following **State of the State Message and Budget Address** was delivered by Governor Otter.

Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, Honorable Justices and Judges, my fellow constitutional officers, distinguished legislators and members of my Cabinet, honored guests, friends, my family and our First Lady ... my fellow Idahoans.

Before I begin, allow me to add my welcome and best wishes to all the new members of the Idaho Legislature joining us here today. Thanks to each of you for bringing your life experiences and your unique perspectives to our important work here in the People's House.

I also have the privilege today of introducing newly elected Idaho Supreme Court Justice Robyn Brody to this chamber and to the Idaho Judiciary. Congratulations Madam Justice.

The new year also brings some key departures from the Executive Branch. I'm sure you join me in wishing Kevin Kempf god speed in his new national responsibilities after two eventful and successful years as director at the Department of Correction. We also are losing Sam Haws to well-deserved retirement from the Office on Aging. And Kelly Pearce's experience and leadership will be missed with his recent retirement as administrator at the Division of Building Safety. I extend my thanks and best wishes to them all.

Finally, this will be the last legislative session for Dick Armstrong as director of the Department of Health and Welfare. His stalwart and tireless leadership has set a high standard for whoever takes on that difficult and often thankless responsibility next. Dick will be retiring in June, and he'll be leaving big shoes to fill.

Ladies and gentlemen, it's my honor and privilege to report to you today that the State of Idaho is resurgent, and in fact is gaining a national reputation among states for our stability and our strength.

Our finances are secure. Revenue is exceeding expectations. Economic growth is outpacing the overall growth of government, and our own operations are more transparent and efficient than ever

More of our people are working than at any time in our history. And wages are rising - slowly but surely - along with employer demand for more skilled workers.

Meeting that demand is among our most serious challenges, but we are facing it head on. And I know you share my commitment to finding Idaho-based solutions rather than waiting for our national government's dysfunction to get turned around.

So as we honor that spirit of independence and self-determination, I can testify to you today that our citizens are energized and engaged in growing our economy, improving our communities, caring for our families and neighbors, and most importantly in preparing our youth for a rapidly changing world.

Seldom has the future seemed either as hopeful or as uncertain. It is beyond our power, or that of any state government, to bring order to national and global turmoil. But it is our responsibility and our duty as elected leaders to preserve and protect the steady framework of opportunity that the people of Idaho need in order to confidently pursue their dreams and freely express their civic virtue.

That's why such a large share of the Executive Budget recommendations you have before you continue addressing our five-year plan for improving Idaho's public schools, as well as our efforts to create a seamless, sustainable education and training system extending from kindergarten through career for every citizen.

My budget recommendations are about more than fulfilling shared commitments and implementing task force recommendations. They are about more than living up to our constitutional responsibilities. They are even about more than providing for the skilled workforce that our employers need. Ultimately, my education funding proposals are about doing the right thing for the next generation of Idahoans, and laying a foundation for their own refinements and adjustments to keep pace with a dynamic global marketplace.

So allow me to briefly outline some of the most crucial parts of this next round of investments.

My first and most significant recommendation is for an ongoing allocation of \$58 million to continue implementing the career ladder pay model for our public school teachers. Along with the \$75 million that we invested in that effort during the past two years, this new and largest tranche will keep us on track to reaching our five-year funding goal for attracting and retaining more of the best and brightest educators available.

I'm also calling for an ongoing investment of \$2.5 million a year for leadership training of principals in low-performing schools, and \$2.5 million a year more to train school administrators on Idaho's teacher evaluation framework and process.

As we work to improve the competitiveness of Idaho's teacher pay, it's critical that we have a solid basis for rewarding excellence. Looking beyond the recent challenges that we've

experienced with teacher evaluations, this training will help ensure that school administrators can professionally, thoroughly and meaningfully assess teacher effectiveness and help guide their professional growth.

Another of my K-12 budget recommendations is for \$15 million to help school districts cover the cost of higher health insurance premiums for their employees. That will help them avoid having to backfill those costs from discretionary funds that we only recently restored in the wake of the Great Recession.

Our task force recommendations called for investing a total of \$60 million a year in classroom technology statewide. We've allocated \$18 million so far. So now I'm asking for \$10 million a year more starting in fiscal 2018 to make achieving our remaining technology funding goals more manageable.

There's also an ongoing \$6 million request in my Executive Budget for improving teachers' professional development opportunities. The idea is to ensure that teachers have time to regularly share lesson plans and instructional resources, collaborate and learn from one another what works best in the classroom.

My funding recommendation additionally includes another \$5 million a year for expanding and improving college and career counseling in Idaho high schools. Based on our rising college enrollment rate, that kind of investment is helping more students, parents and educators determine the most appropriate options for enabling young people to "Go On" to higher education or career-technical training and certification.

I'm also urging you to continue supporting the STEM Action Center and its groundbreaking Computer Science Initiative. They already are having a significant impact on thousands of educators and tens of thousands of students. But the demand is there to expand their reach to help ensure every Idaho student and teacher gets the chance to embrace the STEM fields and the tremendous growth of career opportunities they provide. Proficiency in science, technology, engineering and math form an increasingly essential link between K-12 and career readiness. STEM education is critical to developing those skills most in demand in today's workplace.

Sometimes the challenges and complexities of life interrupt our best-laid plans for pursuing our own career opportunities, including our good intentions to complete a college degree within a traditional four- or five-year span.

So my budget recommendation for fiscal 2018 once again includes funding for an "adult completer" scholarship. It will provide an incentive for those with some college credits who have been away from school for at least three years to return to the classroom and finish up. It's an important part of our strategy for reaching the ambitious and worthy goal of ensuring that at least 60 percent of Idahoans between the ages of 25 and 34 have a college degree or certificate by 2020.

In pursuit of that goal, I'm recommending the transfer of \$35 million to the Permanent Building Fund for higher-education facilities throughout Idaho. That includes \$10 million for a Center for Material Science at Boise State University, \$10 million for the University of Idaho to build the Center for Agriculture, Food and the Environment or "CAFÉ" in the Magic Valley, \$10 million for Lewis-Clark State College to construct a Career-Technical Education building adjacent to the proposed Lewiston High School CTE facility, and \$5 million toward remodeling the Gale Life Sciences Building at Idaho State University.

Let me call your attention now and encourage your support for an effort to make post-secondary education in eastern Idaho more affordable for students, more competitive for businesses and more attractive and responsive to employers. I'm speaking of course of the campaign to turn Eastern Idaho Technical College in Idaho Falls into a full-fledged community college.

Establishing a College of Eastern Idaho will spur economic growth and complete a comprehensive statewide system of affordable community college options, along with North Idaho College, the College of Southern Idaho and the College of Western Idaho.

This body already has set aside \$5 million for startup costs. Now the people of Bonneville County must decide at the polls in May whether to invest in their own future by advancing plans to provide better opportunities for students and families, for those looking to improve their career readiness, and for businesses looking to locate or expand.

After seeing the difference that the College of Western Idaho has made here in the Treasure Valley, after seeing how quickly CWI has grown to meet pent-up demand for new educational opportunities, and after seeing the overwhelmingly positive response from employers, the College of Eastern Idaho campaign has my full and enthusiastic support.

For those of you from Ada and Canyon counties, I also support and urge your positive consideration of the College of Western Idaho's efforts to expand its Nampa campus and build a new campus in Boise. CWI is bursting at the seams, with an enrollment of 20,000 students just eight years after opening with 1,200. The employers who provide jobs and tax revenue here in the valley are relying on your help to meet the need.

My other higher education budget priorities continue to reflect a K-through-career emphasis. They focus on workforce development and expanding programs at our four-year institutions and community colleges that support such in-demand career fields as energy, computer science and the health professions. That includes a \$2.4 million request to expand residency programs in graduate medical education that are needed to address our chronic shortage of physicians and other health care providers, especially in Idaho's more rural areas.

As many of you know, Idaho ranks near the bottom nationally in the number of doctors and medical residents per capita. In addition, a significant percentage of our physicians are approaching retirement age. But we also know that there's a better-than-average chance that when aspiring physicians do their residencies in Idaho, they will stay in Idaho to practice.

That's why I'm grateful for the work of stakeholder groups in developing a plan for increasing medical residencies and implementing other solutions to Idaho's physician shortage. That includes significantly leveraging my budget request for expanding residency programs with federal funds.

A genuinely historic development toward making health care more accessible for all Idahoans is the Idaho College of Osteopathic Medicine. Idaho's first medical school is being developed on the Idaho State University health sciences campus in Meridian, with construction set to begin early this year. ICOM plans to have its first class of students begin their studies in 2018. It already has secured 78 new residency positions for eventual ICOM graduates at hospitals throughout the region, with more on the way. So I hope you will join me in embracing the opportunity and welcoming this important new institution to Idaho.

I also want to offer my thanks and congratulations to the community leaders responsible for making our Behavioral Health Crisis Center program such a success. The third of our community facilities opened in Twin Falls about a month ago. It joined sites already operating in Idaho Falls and Coeur d'Alene, and a fourth in the works here in Boise, in providing an accessible, cost-effective alternative to jail or emergency room visits for those struggling with mental health or substance abuse issues. They are providing significant savings on law enforcement responses and hospital costs, and already have become critical parts of local systems of care.

My budget recommendation includes \$1.5 million to cover the remaining costs of standing up the Twin Falls and Boise facilities. Once again, these are investments that can save our communities millions of dollars a year on the costs of emergency services, and that means less stress on local taxpayers.

To continue improving our statewide mental health system, I'm also requesting \$10.3 million to build an adolescent mental health facility in the Treasure Valley. That also would cover the cost of remodeling a unit at State Hospital South in Blackfoot as a secure mental health facility.

Now let's talk for a minute about our spending priorities and living within the people's means.

It's no surprise that we all want tax relief. For some it's the top priority of this legislative session. But I would remind you that together we have reduced the tax burden on our citizens during my tenure by about \$1 billion. And you soon will have legislation before you to cut the base tax rate for unemployment insurance paid by Idaho employers by 6.3 percent this year. That's \$46 million in tax relief in the coming year alone, and \$115 million over three years.

I am as committed as ever to limiting the size and growth of our State government, and we continue to make many of the efficiencies realized during the Great Recession a part of our standard operations. But I also understand the costs of failing to invest prudently and sustainably in our future. So I will not entertain anything that undermines our commitment to meeting our essential State government functions. At the top of that list are our investments in improving education and career readiness in Idaho.

We're not alone in our efforts to build and improve Idaho's workforce. From STEM education to advanced research, we have a strong partner in the Idaho National Laboratory. It was great to hear recently that a \$1.6 billion state-of-the-art facility for handling spent fuel from the Navy's nuclear warships will soon be built there.

Now we're working with the INL to strengthen the capabilities at our colleges and universities by collaborating on one of our most complex challenges - addressing the growing threat of cyberattacks like the one against Fish and Game's online licensing system last year. You soon will be seeing the work product of the cybersecurity task force led by Lieutenant Governor Little, and I ask you to take its findings seriously.

Because make no mistake: We got off lucky last time. Cyber-crime and even cyber-warfare are very real and growing threats. The next hack here in Idaho could target more critical infrastructure, including our electrical grid, industrial control systems, military equipment or even or our personal vehicles.

The INL is a world leader in cybersecurity, and our partnerships there are positioning our three universities to be on the cutting edge of addressing the global challenge. Work already is under way to establish and expand a joint cyber lab that I proposed, and you funded, last year. But we can do more to protect ourselves and secure our future. So now I'm encouraging the Legislature to express its support for an even more substantial step toward Idaho leadership in cybersecurity, supercomputing and new nuclear technologies.

The State Board of Education, the INL and our universities are working to finance and build two world-class research facilities near the Center for Advanced Energy Studies in Idaho Falls. The Cybercore and the Collaborative Computing Center would be financed and owned by the State but paid for by the INL through lease payments. And those payments would continue for decades - long after the buildings are paid off providing a continuing revenue stream for higher education.

But this initiative will pay dividends far beyond our budget. It will help to address our workforce needs by growing a talent pipeline for the INL and related Idaho industry. And perhaps most importantly, it will enable more of Idaho's best and brightest students to find high-paying career opportunities right here at home.

Folks, we all aspire to be more self-reliant. We strive for it in our personal lives as well as in the operation of our State government. Few federal edicts in recent years have been more intrusive or more damaging to our self-determination than the Affordable Care Act.

There is broad agreement in this body on the need to help tens of thousands of Idahoans with incomes too high to qualify for Obamacare subsidies but too low to afford health care coverage on their own. Just as clearly, there is very little support for expanding Medicaid. I understand that. It would mean subordinating our Idaho priorities to the siren song of federal dollars that neither the national government nor taxpayers can afford.

So beyond continuing to seek elusive answers to the policy questions that we've been asking for years, we now have the option of waiting to see what the Trump administration and Congress do with Obamacare.

But waiting by itself is seldom a solution. Instead, while we wait I would encourage you to seek ways to make Idaho less dependent on the feds. That includes continuing to build local partnerships and encouraging marketplace innovations that address our Idaho goals of improving health-care accessibility and affordability.

However, I believe that waiting in this case is not entirely an exercise in kicking an oversized can down the road. I mentioned earlier that our immediate future is marked by hope and uncertainty. Nowhere is that dichotomy more striking than in the upcoming change of leadership in Washington, D.C.

While few people know just what to expect from the President-elect or his Cabinet, I am far more hopeful than anxious about the promise of a new and better day in the relationship between the federal government and the states.

Dealing with Obamacare should be only the start. This is uncharted territory. There is no history or precedent from which to project. But I for one look forward in the years ahead to seeing renewal of a national commitment to the principles of federalism on which our system of government was founded.

For years now, we in the West have been frustrated by the increasing imposition of the federal government's will over our livelihoods and quality of life. Regulatory bureaucracies and entrenched interests have become practiced at reaching far beyond the letter of such laws as the Clean Air Act, Clean Water Act and Endangered Species Act to essentially nullify the commonsense stewardship of states and local jurisdictions.

I am optimistic that President-elect Trump and his team will work to ensure that meaningful reforms are implemented to keep such agencies as the EPA, the BLM, the Forest Service and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in check. Their focus must be shifted to working more collaboratively with states to develop national policies that are flexible enough to accommodate local needs and realities.

I recently provided the new administration with some detailed advice for improving the federal approach to such issues as protecting sage-grouse and their habitat, delisting grizzly bears, and developing needed energy infrastructure like the Gateway West electrical transmission project in southern Idaho.

I hope and trust that my advice will not fall on deaf ears, because Idaho has an exemplary record of managing and protecting our own natural resources. Our own citizens and communities have the civic virtue and proven know-how to ensure our lands and resources are responsibly used for the long-term economic and recreational opportunities they can provide.

I am not advocating for the State to take over the more-than 60 percent of Idaho owned by the federal government. But we should continue expanding on the efforts we've made so far to realize the potential of such Idaho values as active management and local stewardship. Our initiative to improve water sustainability is a great example of how Idaho can do very well caring for our own needs without punitive federal oversight.

Simply put, states need the opportunity to be full and equal partners in decisions that affect the land, water, wildlife and other resources within our borders. States must be enabled to be the architects of our own destiny.

We in Idaho already are making great use of those rare opportunities where real collaboration with the states is actually encouraged by the feds. Good Neighbor Authority granted under the 2014 Farm Bill invites Idaho to increase the pace and scale of forest and watershed restoration work on federal forests.

Under agreements reached through the program, Idaho is playing a more active role in improving the health of our intermingled timberlands. That's reducing fuels and the threat to communities and watersheds from catastrophic wildfires while creating more jobs and economic benefits for our citizens. So I'm recommending the allocation of \$250,000 for additional foresters to keep advancing that effort.

And thanks to your support, the Rangeland Fire Protection Association program has been growing in popularity and impact. There are eight groups organized so far throughout southern Idaho. The informal BLM program provides training and equipment for local ranchers and other landowners to offer a first-attack capability that helps stop range fires before they devastate the landscape. In the past year, about 250 Idaho ranchers provided fire suppression assistance on more than 7.7 million acres of federal, state and private lands.

As a fringe benefit, letting Idaho ranchers protect the land from which they draw their livelihoods also serves to protect sage-grouse from habitat-destroying wildfire - the single biggest threat to their survival. Folks, federalism can and does work, but only when it involves willing partners. This past election has provided us here in the West with a window of opportunity to make broader and better collaboration between the federal and state governments a reality.

Voters have expressed a desire for government that works, both here in Boise and in Washington, D.C. They're tired of timid representation that seems more concerned with the next election than the next generation. They want government that reflects their highest aspirations and understands that individuals - as well as states - must have both the tools and the freedom to rise up and meet their own best potential.

If the recent national election taught us anything, it's that the people are still in charge - not factions; not special interests; not the news media - not even the political parties. I'm proud that Idahoans voted in support of real and substantial change in our national government and against stuck-in-the-mud business as usual

Now it's up to us to put the lessons of 2016 to work for Idaho. Now it's time to recognize that differences on policy, personality or priorities do not mean differences in principle. More than ever, we now have the opportunity and the responsibility as citizens to help secure Idaho's future.

So good luck and thank you for your attention, your talents and your willingness to serve. My door is open, and I look forward to your conscientious and constructive work during this 1st regular session of the 64th Idaho Legislature.

May God continue to bless Idaho and the United States of America.

#### RULE 24

Bills – Introduction. – After the 20th day of any session, no bill shall be introduced except by committees and after the 36th day no bill shall be introduced except by the State Affairs Committee, the Appropriations Committee, the Education Committee, the Revenue and Taxation Committee and the Ways and Means Committee. When essential to expedite the work of the House, the Speaker may designate any standing committee to serve as a privileged committee temporarily or during the remainder of the session.

When a routing slip (RS) has at least ten legislative co-sponsors, including at least five co-sponsors from each of the two major political parties represented in the House, the RS shall be guaranteed a hearing in the committee where it is introduced, and a recorded vote regarding the instrument's fate shall be taken in that committee. When a bill, joint resolution, concurrent resolution or joint memorial has at least ten legislative co-sponsors, including at least five co-sponsors from each of the two major political parties represented in the House, the bill, joint resolution, concurrent resolution or joint memorial shall be guaranteed a hearing in the committee to which it is assigned, and a recorded vote regarding the instrument's fate shall be taken in that committee.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND ACKNOWLEDGING THE SERIOUSNESS OF THE INCREASING DEMANDS ON UNPAID FRIEND AND FAMILY CAREGIVERS, THE GROWING NUMBER OF FAMILY MEMBERS NEEDING CARE, THE COMPLEXITY OF CARE AND THE LACK OF SUPPORT AND TRAINING FOR CAREGIVERS, AND SUPPORTING THE RECOMMENDATIONS IN THE IDAHO LIFESPAN FAMILY CAREGIVER ACTION PLAN DEVELOPED BY THE IDAHO CAREGIVER ALLIANCE.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, annually more than 300,000 adults in Idaho, 200,000 at any given time, provide care to family members, relatives or friends, which equates to an estimated value of \$2 billion per year; and

WHEREAS, an estimated 53,000 Idaho children have a special health care need, and nearly 19,000 have a serious emotional disorder; and

WHEREAS, the population of the state that is 65 years of age and older is the fastest growing population in the state, projected to reach 370,000 in 2032; and

WHEREAS, an estimated 77,000 unpaid family caregivers are caring for approximately 22,000 Idahoans with Alzheimer's disease or a related disorder; and

WHEREAS, the costs of family caregiving include lost income to the caregiver and lost productivity to the caregiver's employer; and

WHEREAS, family caregivers are an essential part of Idaho's health care system, providing uncompensated support and care to ill or disabled family members or loved ones; and

WHEREAS, family caregivers increasingly manage complex medical and/or psychological conditions without the support and training they need; and

WHEREAS, caregiving takes its toll on caregiver health and well-being and affects the entire family; and

WHEREAS, providing services and support to Idahoans in their homes and communities is generally less expensive than institutional care; and

WHEREAS, in 2010, there were six working-age adults for every older adult, but by 2020 that ratio will drop to three working-age adults for every older adult; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Caregiver Alliance has joined with stakeholders across the state to develop and author Idaho's Lifespan Family Caregiver Action Plan, which provides recommendations for improving support for caregivers across the lifespan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we recognize the unmet needs and significant contributions of Idaho's family caregivers across the lifespan; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we understand the pressures created by the expanding number of people needing care in proportion to the diminishing number of family caregivers; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we acknowledge the work of the Idaho Caregiver Alliance in its comprehensive review of caregiver issues; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we support the Idaho Lifespan Family Caregiver Action Plan and its recommendations: to increase public awareness about family caregiving and its costs and benefits; to provide training for caregivers; to improve caregiver support, including respite resources; to integrate family caregivers into health care system transformations; and to develop methods for ongoing data collection and reporting to monitor changes and assure responsible use of public and private resources.

#### HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 1 BY AGRICULTURAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, since the beginning of time, the ability of man to provide food, fiber and fuel for himself and others has determined his independence, freedom and security; and

WHEREAS, the strength of a nation is based upon its ability to sufficiently provide safe and reliable food, fiber and fuel for its people; and

WHEREAS, America's national security has been and is directly related to the safety and reliability of the source of food, fiber and fuel; and

WHEREAS, Idaho agriculture and related agricultural businesses represent our state's largest industry, Idaho being the fourth largest agricultural state economy in the nation and the third largest in net farm income; and

WHEREAS, federal, state and local laws and regulations require American farmers, ranchers and food processors to meet the highest standards in the world when it comes to environmental protection, worker safety, wage rates and food safety concerns; and

WHEREAS, American farmers, ranchers and food processors fund record audits and USDA product inspections to confirm their products meet the criteria for U.S. standards; and

WHEREAS, the importation of fruits and vegetables has increased dramatically in the past fifteen years, while the exportation of fruits and vegetables has remained stagnant in this same time period; and

WHEREAS, imports are not held to the same strict standards as domestic products, and American producers face an unfair and unequal market; and

WHEREAS, the Country of Origin Labeling law was repealed in 2015 because of the World Trade Organization ruling derived from complaints from Canada and Mexico, and now U.S. citizens have no way of knowing where food products are coming from; and

WHEREAS, the actual number of producers in the United States is now less than one percent of the nation's population, and declining.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that because of the importance of the standards to which American farmers, ranchers and food processors are held, primarily standards concerning food safety, we urge that foreign companies wishing to participate in markets that lie within the boundaries of the United States be held to the exact same standards.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any audits or inspections that may be required to confirm that the necessary criteria are met to conform to these standards are paid in full by the foreign companies themselves, so there is no burden to U.S. taxpayers.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage the education of the general public regarding the importance of the role that agriculture plays in the development of a society, recognizing that such public education, especially at the middle school and secondary levels, is critical in the preservation and strengthening of the agricultural industry, the State of Idaho, and our nation as a whole.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we urge that American farmers, ranchers and food processors be enabled to compete freely and trade fairly in domestic and foreign markets on a strictly level playing field.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

#### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 6 BY COMMERCE AND HUMAN RESOURCES COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO UNDERTAKE AND COMPLETE A STUDY OF ISSUES RELATING TO PUBLIC PROCUREMENT AND TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature adopted House Concurrent Resolution No. 48, which authorized the appointment of a committee to undertake and complete a study of the procurement laws of the State of Idaho and to make recommendations; and

WHEREAS, the committee, having conducted the study, has proposed legislation on several issues; and

WHEREAS, the committee's term has expired; and

WHEREAS, it is the opinion of the committee that several issues in public procurement require further study, including, but not limited to, administrative and judicial review of procurement challenges and appeals, information technology procurement, the ability of certain persons and entities to obligate the state on a contract, and the applicability of the State Procurement Act to certain persons and entities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to undertake and complete a study of issues relating to public procurement. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee and shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that nonlegislative members of the committee may be appointed by the co-chairs of the committee who are appointed by the Legislative Council. Nonlegislative members of the committee shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage or other expenses and shall not have voting privileges regarding the committee's recommendations or proposed legislation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings, recommendations and proposed legislation, if any, to the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature.

#### HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 2 BY RESOURCES AND CONSERVATION COMMITTEE A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the Snake River, and its surface and ground water tributaries, is the backbone of Idaho's economy, supplying water for 76% of Idaho's population, cities, businesses, dairies, factories and more than 3 million acres of irrigated lands above Idaho Power Company's Hells Canyon Complex; and

WHEREAS, in the first half of the 20th century, hydropower development in the mid-Snake and Hells Canyon spurred economic development, irrigation, industry and growth in Southern Idaho and has provided Idahoans with clean electric energy at rates that are among the lowest in the nation; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho, while recognizing the benefit of hydropower generation to the citizens of the State through sustaining economic growth and agriculture, also acknowledged the value of protecting Idaho's water, property rights and natural resources; and WHEREAS, in 1964, the State, recognizing its sovereignty over Idaho's water resources and potential intrusions upon that sovereignty, approved through constitutional amendment, Section 7, Article XV, Constitution of the State of Idaho, the establishment of the Idaho Water Resource Board (IWRB) whose members are appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate, and empowered the IWRB to formulate a comprehensive State Water Plan as described in Section 42-1734A, Idaho Code; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 42-1734A, Idaho Code, the State of Idaho has adopted a State Water Plan ("Plan"); and

WHEREAS, Policy 1A of the Plan provides that: "The State asserts sovereignty over the development and use of Idaho's water resources for the benefits of its citizens. [And that] [a]ny action by the federal government or other states that would impair Idaho's sovereignty over its water resources is against state policy"; and

WHEREAS, Policy 1N of the Plan provides that: "Appropriation of water for hydropower should be subordinated to subsequent upstream beneficial uses to assure an adequate supply of water for all future beneficial uses, and minimum stream flows for hydropower projects should be established by state action"; and

WHEREAS, Policy 2B of the Plan provides that: "The State asserts primacy over the management of its fish and wildlife and water resources. Accordingly, any reintroduction or introduction of federally listed species or other aquatic species without state consultation and approval is against the policy of the State of Idaho because it would impair or impede the state's primacy over its water resources"; and

WHEREAS, Policy 4A of the Plan provides that the main stem Snake River will be managed to meet or exceed minimum average daily flows at Milner, Murphy, Weiser, Johnson Bar and Lime Point and that these "minimum flows provide the management framework for the optimum development of water resources of the Snake River Basin"; and

WHEREAS, Policy 4H of the Plan provides that: "Hydropower generation is a beneficial use of the flow of the Snake River, and it is in the public interest to protect the minimum average daily flows set forth in Policy 4A as a base flow for hydropower use"; and

WHEREAS, Policy 4J of the Plan provides that: "The minimum stream flows set forth in Policy 4A provide adequate flows for Snake River fish, wildlife, recreation, and scenic values in the main stem Snake River below Milner Dam"; and

WHEREAS, Policy 4C of the State Water Plan in discussing the Swan Falls Agreement, recognized the value of hydropower through the acknowledgment and protection of minimum stream flows and ensured that electric rates remain beneficial to its citizens; and

WHEREAS, in 1976 the State of Idaho in partnership with neighboring states of Oregon and Washington (collectively "States"), together with the National Marine Fisheries Service filed a petition with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) requesting that "it issue an order requiring the licensee to take appropriate measures as compensation for" the loss of salmon and steelhead due to the construction and operation of the Hells Canyon Complex; and

WHEREAS, in 1980 the States and the Idaho Power Company executed a settlement agreement that, by its terms, constituted "full and complete mitigation for all numerical losses of salmon and steelhead caused by or in any way associated with the construction of, and operation within the existing license" for, the Hells Canyon Complex; and "further agree not to contend or support contentions by others before any agency or in any proceeding that additional fish or fish facilities are required by

or in any way associated with the construction of, or operation within the existing license for," the Hells Canyon Complex; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Power Company has complied with the terms of the 1980 Settlement Agreement with state support; and

WHEREAS, in 1984 the State and Idaho Power Company entered into the implementing agreements for the Swan Falls Settlement, which confirmed the State's primacy over flows of the Snake River through the establishment of minimum flows from Milner Dam to reaches below the Hells Canyon Complex; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Power Company, since 2003, has been seeking to relicense the Hells Canyon Complex before the FERC under the Federal Power Act; and

WHEREAS, the State Water Plan directs the Water Resource Board to participate in the Hells Canyon Complex relicensing to ensure that the conditions in "the new license for the Hells Canyon Complex includes operational conditions that preserve and enhance the generation capacity of the project in a manner consistent with the State Water Plan"; and

WHEREAS, in 2004 the State, participating water users, and the Nez Perce Tribe entered into the 2004 Snake River Water Rights Agreement providing for cooperative agreements to assist in the recovery of listed species under the Endangered Species Act in tributaries below the Hells Canyon Complex while providing certainty to Idaho landowners and water users in the exercise of property rights; and

WHEREAS, the 2004 Snake River Water Rights Agreement identified specific actions by the water users with respect to the rental of water to augment flows for listed anadromous fish below the Hells Canyon Complex, such agreement providing certain protections to the water users; and

WHEREAS, water users have benefited from the certainty regarding the water supply availability and operating conditions in the reaches of the Snake River upstream from the Hells Canyon Complex; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Water Users Association, through Association Resolution No. 2017-6, has and continues to oppose introduction of salmon and steelhead species into surface waters above the Hells Canyon Complex due to the drastic impacts on irrigated agriculture, industry, water supply and electric generation; and

WHEREAS, Section 42-1734C, Idaho Code, requires that the Idaho State Water Plan "be submitted to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission . . . as the state water plan for the conservation, development, management and optimum use of the state of Idaho's water resource" and the Plan has been submitted; and

WHEREAS, the State committed to certain actions through the 1980 Agreement, the Swan Falls Agreement, and the 2004 Snake River Agreement, that provide the citizens of Idaho certainty and appropriate management of the State's resources in a manner consistent with the intentions provided herein; and

WHEREAS, the State of Oregon has taken certain actions in the relicensing proceeding for the Hells Canyon Complex in an attempt to mandate the passage and introduction of salmon and steelhead above Hells Canyon Dam and into the Idaho waters of the Snake River, which form a border between Oregon and Idaho, that directly infringe upon Idaho's sovereignty over its water resources and primacy over management of its fish and water resources; and

WHEREAS, the Governor of the State of Idaho, through the Office of Species Conservation, is charged with coordinating with all state departments and divisions with respect to endangered, threatened, candidate species, species petitioned to be listed, and rare and declining species, coordinating state response to federal

recovery plans and projects, participating in regional efforts and providing input to federal and state agencies with regard to such species act as an ombudsman for state citizens on ESA issues, and ensuring state primacy over management of its fish and wildlife, including prevention of reintroduction or introduction of listed species without state consultation and approval; and

WHEREAS, the Governor, by letter to the Natural Resources Agency Administrators and Directors dated May 27, 2016, directed that: "Each agency shall coordinate with the Governor's Office of Species Conservation and status of any introduction or reintroduction proposals under the Endangered Species Act"; and

WHEREAS, the Governor, by letter to Oregon Governor Brown dated July 19, 2016, advised that Idaho would not agree to Oregon's passage or introduction proposal above Hells Canyon Dam, in violation of Sections 67-818 and 67-6302, Idaho Code, stating in part: "Such occurrence would violate long-standing Idaho law and policy opposing reintroduction of any species without the express consent of the Idaho State Legislature and executive branch.... Based upon state law and in part on our past experiences with reintroduced species (e.g., wolves), Idaho cannot and will not, agree to the reintroduction of salmon or steelhead above Hells Canyon Dam."; and

WHEREAS, while the Idaho Power Company serves customers in Idaho and eastern Oregon, approximately 95% of its customers are located in Idaho; and

WHEREAS, the Governor, by letter to Oregon Governor Brown dated January 17, 2017, advised that Oregon's draft 401 conditions related to fish passage and reintroduction would impact Idaho waters and citizens and interfere with Idaho's sovereign interests in managing its natural resources; and

WHEREAS, the Governor's January 17, 2017, letter further advised that with respect to "any new requirement imposed by Oregon will lead to additional costs that will disproportionately impact Idaho customers" and "passage and reintroduction conditions should be removed"; and

WHEREAS, protecting Idaho's sovereignty by ensuring that Oregon does not impose fish passage and introduction in violation of Idaho law and policy will continue to be a benefit to Idaho's citizens through greater certainty regarding property rights, water supply and economic development.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the State of Idaho supports actions by the Governor and the Attorney General to oppose passage and introduction of salmon or steelhead above Hells Canyon Dam, that are necessary to protect Idaho's sovereignty, including its waters and property rights, and to ensure that Idaho's sovereignty is not violated by the introduction of salmon or steelhead to the reaches of the Snake River, and its Idaho tributaries, above Hells Canyon Dam.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor and the Attorney General shall undertake such action as is necessary and appropriate to ensure that the terms of the 1980 Agreement are complied with in regard to mitigation for the Hells Canyon Complex to protect upstream water users, water rights, landowners and economic development from the State of Oregon's efforts to pass and introduce salmon and steelhead above Hells Canyon Dam into waters of the State.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that consistent with the authority of Section 67-6302, Idaho Code, the Legislature of the State of Idaho does not approve of the efforts by the State of Oregon and opposes any action by a federal agency, or any entity acting on behalf of a federal agency, or other groups, entities or individuals to require the passage and introduction or reintroduction of salmon or steelhead above Hells Canyon Dam,

including trying to include in the FERC license for the Hells Canyon Project any provision that would result in introduction or reintroduction of any such species into the waters of the State of Idaho.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, the State of Idaho supports the relicensing of Hells Canyon Complex consistent with the following policies: (A) The license is consistent with the policies set forth in the Idaho State Water Plan; (B) The license recognizes that no salmon and steelhead populations can be introduced or reintroduced above Hells Canyon Dam; (C) The license recognizes that the water rights for the Hells Canyon Complex are subordinated to future upstream uses as set forth in the partial decrees for each of the three dams; and (D) The mitigation requirements in the license for salmon and steelhead comply with the terms of the 1980 Settlement Agreement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress and to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

WHEREAS, travel for evaluation and treatment is a financial and emotional hardship for patients, families and caregivers; and

WHEREAS, individuals and families affected by rare diseases often experience problems such as a sense of isolation, difficulty in obtaining an accurate and timely diagnosis, limited treatment options and difficulty accessing or being reimbursed for treatment; and

WHEREAS, thousands of Idaho residents are among those affected by rare diseases, as nearly one in ten Americans has a rare disease.

### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 12 BY EDUCATION COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO UNDERTAKE AND COMPLETE A STUDY OF THE PUBLIC SCHOOL FUNDING FORMULA AND TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the current public school funding formula was enacted in 1994 and the evolving needs of students make it desirable to review the current funding formula; and

WHEREAS, the Education School Funding Subcommittee of the Governor's Task Force concluded that, rather than focus solely on funding based on attendance or enrollment, the entire formula needs a thorough review; and

WHEREAS, in 2016, the Idaho Legislature authorized the Public School Funding Formula legislative interim study committee to study the public school funding formula with HCR 33; and

WHEREAS, the Public School Funding Formula legislative interim committee held five meetings around the State of Idaho between July 2016 and December 2016, during which time it heard public testimony from stakeholders, received presentations from national, state and local experts, and oversaw a survey by the Board of Education of parents, teachers, school administrators and employees; and

WHEREAS, the issue of public school funding is highly complex and it was anticipated that the work would be a multi-year project; and

WHEREAS, the Public School Funding Formula legislative interim committee has preliminary recommendations to report to the Legislature; and

WHEREAS, it is desirable to reauthorize the committee in order to allow it to complete its study of the public school funding formula

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to undertake and complete a study of and make recommendations for the state's public school funding formula. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee and shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Superintendent of Public Instruction and another member of the Idaho State Board of Education shall serve as voting nonlegislative members of the committee. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Services Office, Office of the State Board of Education including the Public Charter School Commission, State Department of Education, Office of the Governor and Division of Financial Management shall provide staff support to the committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the committee is also authorized to retain the services of a consultant or analyst, with the prior approval of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who is familiar with education funding policy and who can provide necessary economic or other research that can assist the committee and the Legislature in making an informed decision on this important topic. With the exception of a consultant approved by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, nonlegislative members shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage or other expenses.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings, recommendations and proposed legislation, if any, to the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature.

### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 13 BY HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO CONTINUE A STUDY OF THE STATE EMPLOYEE GROUP INSURANCE PLAN STRUCTURE AND TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho offers a health insurance benefit to nearly 20,000 individuals employed by the state, of whom 18,600 employees opt into the group health insurance plan that supports an additional 26,900 dependents; and

WHEREAS, the insurance plan structure currently has two enrollment tiers with 210 employees falling into the part-time tier that is defined as employees working 20-29 hours per week, while the remaining employees are enrolled in the full-time tier; and

WHEREAS, Idaho state appropriations for health insurance costs have increased at an annualized rate of 7.4% since fiscal year 2013, or 43% in the last five years, from \$8,850 for each full-time position in fiscal year 2013 to \$12,240 in fiscal year 2017; and

WHEREAS, the plan is currently qualified as "grandfathered" in relation to the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act because it was in effect prior to March 2010, which exempts the plan from certain provisions of that act; and

WHEREAS, in 2016, the Idaho Legislature authorized a legislative study committee to study the state employee group insurance plan structure and compensation package; and

WHEREAS, the 2016 State Employee Group Insurance and Benefits Committee met five times in 2016, hearing testimony and presentations from state agencies, local government and insurers; and

WHEREAS, during their meetings, the legislative study committee learned about different models and approaches to health care benefits, such as health savings accounts, high-deductible plans, accountable care organizations, direct primary care arrangements, patient-centered care, value-based provider reimbursement, an integrated partnership model between providers, carriers and patients, and a coordinated care organization model for Oregon Medicaid patients; and

WHEREAS, the legislative study committee also learned about the consequences to the State of Idaho of retaining or moving away from grandfathered status under the Affordable Care Act and of changing the current structure of health insurance for state employees to a self-insured model; and

WHEREAS, the legislative study committee's Final Report made a number of findings and recommendations, including reauthorizing the study committee for 2017 and employing a consultant to advise and assist the committee in recommending a model of health care that contains the rising cost of health care but also provides quality health care to state employees and their dependents.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to continue the work of the 2016 State Employee Group Insurance and Benefits Committee in studying the state employee group insurance plan to include, but not be limited to, consideration of the costs and benefits of allowing the grandfathered status of the current plan to lapse, as well as the structural plan changes that will be required as a result; consideration of other cost-effective benefit plan changes while maintaining a total compensation and benefits package; consideration of a self-insured plan or a fully insured plan structure; and development of a list of changes to the employee group insurance benefit package, as well as potential statutory changes outlining the minimum employee group insurance benefit plan design that will comply with the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act should the Legislature adopt structural plan changes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee is also authorized to retain the services of a consultant or analyst, with the prior approval of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, who is familiar with health insurance and health care plans and who can provide advice and assistance to the committee in selecting the most appropriate form of employee health care benefit plan for recommendation to the Idaho Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings, recommendations and proposed legislation, if any, to the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature.

### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 14 BY EDUCATION COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND REQUESTING THAT THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION ADOPT RULES TO PROVIDE FOR IDAHO STATE GOVERNMENT AND IDAHO HISTORY QUESTIONS FOR THE CIVICS TEST GIVEN TO SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENTS STARTING WITH THE 2017-2018 SCHOOL YEAR.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, in 2015 the Legislature passed Senate Bill No. 1071, as amended, which requires secondary school students to pass a civics test starting with the 2016-2017 school year and requires that school districts or public charter schools must use the 100 questions from the test taken by naturalized citizens or a test of their own design; and

WHEREAS, sadly, only 2 out of the 100 questions on the citizenship test relate specifically to Idaho government or history; and

WHEREAS, because we are citizens of both the United States and the sovereign State of Idaho, it seems appropriate that any such test should also contain questions relating to Idaho, as state and local governments are generally closest to the people; and

WHEREAS, we encourage the State Board of Education through rulemaking to add at least 25 questions, or at least 20% of the test, specifically relating to Idaho government and history to the civics test beginning with the 2017-2018 school year; and

WHEREAS, it is hoped that by adding these questions about Idaho government and history, teachers will be encouraged to teach more about Idaho's culture, history, diversity, beauty, resources and greatness.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the State Board of Education is requested to adopt rules to provide that at least 25 questions, or at least 20% of the test, relating specifically to Idaho state government and history be included with the civics test beginning in the 2017-2018 school year, and we request that such rules allow school districts or public charter schools, if they conduct their own test, to develop their own questions, provided that at least 25 questions, or at least 20% of the test, is based on specific questions that relate to Idaho government and history.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State Board of Education shall give a report to the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature regarding the questions included in its rules and other matters relating to this important topic.

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND RECOGNIZING AND SUPPORTING THE IMPORTANT HISTORY AND ONGOING CONTRIBUTIONS OF LEGAL IMMIGRANTS TOWARD THE BUILDING OF THE UNITED STATES.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the United States of America was built by people from all over the world and the protection of legal immigrants through resettlement in the United States of America is a manifestation of the most deeply held values of the nation and of Idaho, namely our unshakable belief in justice and freedom and our compassion for those who suffer; and

WHEREAS, legal immigrants go through a comprehensive vetting process, swearing allegiance to and bearing goodwill toward the United States of America, and many have earned green cards, become citizens and call this country home; and

WHEREAS, Idaho communities were founded and established by hard-working people of a wide variety of ethnicities, ages, religions and backgrounds, such as the Basque, Scandinavians, Irish and more; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho has a long and proud history of providing opportunity to immigrants over the course of its history; and

WHEREAS, immigrants serve in our military, work for America's diplomatic interests, and work, volunteer and contribute to Idaho communities every day; and

WHEREAS, organizations in our country and state, including the Catholic Charities, Lutheran Community Services, Jewish synagogues and the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, all work to help resettle immigrant families in Idaho; and

WHEREAS, immigrants include people fleeing poverty, persecution, oppression and war, and include women and children in need of safety; and

WHEREAS, America's immigrants have brought with them the character, talent, creativity, dynamism, determination and fortitude to help build the strongest and best nation on Earth; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Legislature believes in protecting America's deeply held values and unshakable belief in justice, freedom and compassion for legal immigrants coming to America to find a new home and appreciates their contributions to Idaho.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we do hereby recognize and support the important history and ongoing contributions of legal immigrants toward the building of our great nation.

### **HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 18** BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND APPLYING TO THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO CALL AN AMENDMENT CONVENTION OF THE STATES PURSUANT TO ARTICLE V OF THE UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION FOR SPECIFIC AND LIMITED PURPOSES RELATING TO THE REDUCTION OF THE ABUSE OF POWER BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT; ADOPTING CERTAIN RESERVATIONS, UNDERSTANDINGS AND DECLARATIONS LIMITING ADOPTING APPLICATION; AND CERTAIN SELECTION CRITERIA FOR COMMISSIONERS AS WELL AS LIMITATIONS UPON THEIR AUTHORITY.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

SECTION 1. Application of a Convention for Proposing Amendments.

WHEREAS, the Founders of the United States Constitution empowered state legislators to be guardians of liberty against excessive use of power by the federal government; and

WHEREAS, the federal government has created a crushing national debt through improper and imprudent spending; and

WHEREAS, the federal government has ceased to operate under a proper interpretation of the United States Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the federal government has invaded the legitimate roles of the states through the manipulative process of federal mandates, most of which are unfunded to a great extent; and

WHEREAS, it is the solemn duty of the states to protect the liberty of our people, particularly for the generations to come, by proposing amendments to the United States Constitution through a convention of the states under Article V for the purpose of restraining these and related abuses of power.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that pursuant to Article V of the Constitution of the United States, the Idaho Legislature joins in the applications of the states of Georgia (SR 736, 2014), Florida (SM 476, 2014), Alaska (HJR 22, 2014), Alabama (HJR 112, 2015), Tennessee (SJ 67, 2016), Indiana (SIR 14, 2016), Oklahoma (SJR 4, 2016), and Louisiana (SCR 52, 2016) for a convention for the specific and exclusive purpose of proposing amendments to the Constitution of the United States limited to the purposes stated therein; provided, however, that the delegates from Idaho to said convention are expressly limited to consideration and support of amendments that impose fiscal restraints on the federal government, and amendments that limit the power and jurisdiction of the federal government and no other amendments on any topic whatsoever.

#### SECTION 2. Reservations, Understandings and Declarations.

- 1. An application to the Congress of the United States to call an amendment convention of the states pursuant to Article V of the United States Constitution confers no power to Congress other than the ministerial duty to name a reasonable time and place for the initial meeting of a convention;
- 2. Congress shall perform its ministerial duty of calling an amendment convention of the states only upon the receipt of applications for an amendment convention for the substantially same purpose as this application from two-thirds of the legislatures of the several states;
- 3. Congress does not have the power or authority to determine any rules for the governing of an amendment convention of the states called pursuant to Article V of the United States Constitution. Congress does not have the power to set the number of delegates to be sent by any state to such a convention, nor does it have the power to name delegates to such a convention. The power to name delegates remains exclusively within the authority of the legislatures of the several states;
- 4. By definition, an amendment convention of the states means that states shall vote on the basis of one state, one vote:
- 5. An amendment convention of the states convened pursuant to this application shall be limited to consideration of the topics specified herein and no other. This application is made with the express understanding that an amendment that in any way seeks to amend, modify, or repeal any provision of the Bill of Rights shall not be authorized for consideration at any stage.
- 6. Pursuant to Article V of the United States Constitution, Congress may determine whether proposed amendments shall

be ratified by the legislatures of the several states or by special state ratification conventions. The Idaho State Legislature recommends that Congress select ratification by the legislatures of the several states.

SECTION 3. Procedures for Selection of Commissioners to Article V Convention and Limitations Upon Their Authority.

A. Any time a convention is called pursuant to Article V of the United States Constitution, the selection of commissioners from Idaho to such convention and their participation shall be governed as follows:

- 1. Eligible commissioners and alternates shall be residents of Idaho for at least six months prior to their appointment and shall otherwise meet the same qualifications necessary to hold office in the Idaho State Legislature. Commissioners and alternates may include persons holding public office, except that no member of the United States House of Representatives or Senate shall be eligible.
- 2. The House shall select, by simple majority vote, 3 commissioners who meet the eligibility requirements outlined in subsection (1), and the Senate shall select, by simple majority vote, 3 commissioners who meet said requirements. At least one commissioner from each chamber shall not be a sitting member of the Idaho Legislature at the time of appointment. Each chamber shall nominate two additional persons to serve as commissioners or alternates. The original six commissioners shall agree upon a priority list of these four nominees. The first nominee in priority shall become the seventh commissioner. The remaining three shall become alternates and shall be assigned a ranking of first, second, or third alternate to serve in that order should a vacancy occur for any reason. This total of 7 commissioners and 3 alternate commissioners shall constitute Idaho's delegation to the convention.
- 3. Each commissioner and alternate shall, by oath or affirmation as provided for in the Constitution of Idaho, and as a condition of participating in the convention, agree to faithfully and impartially discharge all the duties incumbent upon a convention commissioner, including the duty to abide by instructions established by concurrent resolution of the Idaho State Legislature for participation in the convention and not to act outside the scope of the call for the convention. The taking of this oath shall be a condition precedent to the receipt of the issuance of formal credentials to said commissioners. Each commissioner and alternate shall further agree to immediately notify the Speaker of the House of Representatives and President Pro Tempore of the Senate if he or she believes that any Idaho commissioner or alternate has violated his or her oath or instructions while participating in the convention.
- 4. After commissioners have been selected, the Idaho State Legislature may by concurrent resolution recall commissioners or alternates to such convention, or appoint new commissioners or alternates.
- 5. When the Idaho State Legislature is not in a regular session, the Speaker of the House, together with the President of the Senate, may call an extraordinary session of the Legislature to convene upon forty-eight hours' notice. Notice by email shall constitute a valid notice. Because the Legislature is acting under authority conferred on it directly

by Article V of the Constitution of the United States, the requirement that the Governor shall call special sessions of the Legislature is inapplicable, as governors have no authority under said Article V. This extraordinary session shall be limited to a decision to recall commissioners or alternates.

- B. Prior to the administration of the oath to the commissioners, the Idaho State Legislature shall by joint resolution provide instructions to the commissioners selected pursuant to Section A regarding the scope of matters they may consider and vote on at a convention, including rules of procedure and proposed amendments. These instructions shall include, but shall not be limited to:
  - 1. An instruction that the Idaho commissioners may not support any voting rule for votes taken by the entire body (regardless if meeting as the Committee of the Whole or otherwise) other than the rule whereby each state exercises one vote; and
  - 2. An instruction that on all voting matters at the convention (concerning any vote taken by the entire body), the decision of a simple majority of the Idaho commissioners shall constitute a single vote for Idaho.
  - 3. Individual commissioners may vote as an individual only in service on committees other than the Committee of the Whole.
- C. Any vote cast by a commissioner or alternate at an Article V Convention that is outside the scope of:
  - 1. The instructions established by a joint resolution adopted under Section B of this chapter;
  - 2. The limits placed by the Idaho State Legislature in a joint resolution that calls for an Article V Convention for the purpose of proposing amendments to the Constitution of the United States on the subjects and amendments that may be considered by the Article V Convention; or
  - 3. If Idaho was not one of the states applying for the Article V Convention, the limits contained in the narrowest state resolution applying for the Article V Convention;

is void.

- D. In the event that the Speaker of the House of Representatives or President Pro Tempore of the Senate receives written notice from any other Idaho commissioner or from a member of either the Idaho House or Senate, that a commissioner is alleged to have violated his or her oath or instructions, a hearing shall be called by the leader of each respective chamber, to be held on the floor of each chamber. The sole issue in said hearing shall be whether or not the commissioner has in fact violated the terms of his oath or instructions. If a determination is made by both chambers that such a violation has occurred, the commissioner shall be discharged immediately and may no longer represent Idaho at the convention. The alternate who is next in the priority list shall immediately take the place of the discharged commissioner.
- E. Alternates shall take the place of commissioners and may serve only if a commissioner dies, resigns, or is discharged as specified in paragraph D. Alternates shall take the place of commissioners in the order previously determined.

F. Expenses for commissioners and observers to travel to and participate in such convention shall be paid according to the per diem rate established for members of the Idaho State Legislature as provided by the Citizens' Committee on Legislative Compensation.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that this application shall constitute a continuing application for such amendment convention of the states pursuant to Article V of the United States Constitution until the legislatures of two-thirds of the states have made applications on the same subject and such convention has been called by the Congress of the United States; however, this application shall expire and have no further effect unless a convention is called for the purposes specified herein within ten years of the date of its final passage; and, be it

RESOLVED FINALLY, that the Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit copies of this resolution to the President of the United States, the Speaker and the Clerk of the United States House of Representatives, the President and the Clerk of the United States Senate, the members of the Idaho Congressional Delegation, and the legislatures of each of the several states, attesting the adoption of this resolution by the Idaho State Legislature.

### HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 19 BY HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO APPOINT A COMMITTEE TO UNDERTAKE AND COMPLETE A STUDY OF THE FOSTER CARE SYSTEM IN IDAHO.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, House Concurrent Resolution 59, passed by the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature, authorized the Legislative Council to appoint the Foster Care Study Committee in order to accomplish a thorough study of issues related to foster care and report its findings and make recommendations to the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-third Idaho Legislature enabled a study by the Office of Performance Evaluations to review and report on Idaho's Child and Family Services, specifically foster care, within the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare: and

WHEREAS, the Foster Care Study Committee recommended to the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature that an inquiry regarding visitation plans between children being taken into care and the biological parents should occur at the shelter care hearing wherein courts are encouraged to keep the best interest of the child in mind at this hearing; and

WHEREAS, the committee also encouraged the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare to continue to review its internal practices and confirm that they align with Idaho statutes and IDAPA and do not rely on past practices, especially in regards to placement priorities; and

WHEREAS, the committee recommended that the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare should further review its processes regarding the determination and definition of the term "consider" in placement priority and advance internal review and improvements to its processes and training manuals and

materials to ensure alignment with Idaho statutes and IDAPA;

WHEREAS, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare should be supported in its efforts to work collaboratively with Idaho courts, guardians ad litem and birth and foster parents, as well as other stakeholders in determining placement decisions; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare is encouraged to train its staff regarding judicial review, which allows for contested permanent placement decisions to be denied by the court for any reason at the judge's discretion; and

WHEREAS, the Foster Care Study Committee recommends continuance of the examination by an interim committee of foster care issues, which were highlighted by the 2017 report submitted by the Office of Performance Evaluations; and

WHEREAS, the 2017 report by the Office of Performance Evaluations underscores the need for such efforts by noting that a new systems approach should be undertaken by the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare working in collaboration with stakeholders and policymakers; and

WHEREAS, the Office of Performance Evaluations states that Child and Family Services should work with the Idaho Legislature to develop a multi-year plan; and

WHEREAS, the Office of Performance Evaluations has noted that its 2005 report, which supplied recommendations regarding staffing, workload and caseload, did not receive a subsequent review by an interim committee, and the lack of follow-up has contributed to growing difficulties within the program.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to appoint a committee to undertake and complete a study of the foster care system in Idaho and to make recommendations for changes to state statutes. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the committee and shall authorize the committee to receive input, advice and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that nonlegislative members of the committee may be appointed by the cochairs of the committee who are appointed by the Legislative Council. Nonlegislative members of the advisory committee shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage or other expenses and shall not have voting privileges regarding the committee's recommendations or proposed legislation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall report its findings, recommendations and proposed legislation, if any, to the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LANDS TO PRODUCE A REPORT DETAILING THE MANAGED USES OF STATE ENDOWMENT LAND, BOTH LOCATION AND QUANTITY, AND THE LOCATION AND QUANTITY OF ACCESSIBLE AND INACCESSIBLE STATE ENDOWMENT LAND.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, hunting, fishing, recreating and enjoying public lands are central to Idaho's western heritage; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Department of Lands manages more than 2.4 million acres of state land for the State of Idaho pursuant to Section 8, Article IX, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho; and

WHEREAS, hunters, anglers, and recreationists, as taxpaying citizens of Idaho, expect reasonable access to state lands; and

WHEREAS, hunters, anglers, and recreationists are required to obtain permission from landowners whenever entering private land; and

WHEREAS, hunters, anglers, and recreationists should not assume that access will be provided to landlocked parcels; and

WHEREAS, 162,000 Idahoans and 85,000 nonresidents hunt in Idaho, combining for 3.2 million days of hunting; and

WHEREAS, at least 74% of Idaho residents participate in outdoor recreation each year; and

WHEREAS, an estimated 30% of the state's endowment lands are landlocked by private property and inaccessible to Idaho taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, the state is under a constitutional mandate to manage endowment lands for the maximum long-term financial return: and

WHEREAS, the management of land under that mandate may require the land to be timbered, mined or used for recreational purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Department of Lands provides no resource that quantifies the acreage and percentage of state endowment land managed for each use; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Department of Lands provides no resource that quantifies the acreage and percentage of state

endowment land that is accessible and inaccessible by the taxpayers of Idaho.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we request the Idaho Department of Lands to produce a report detailing the managed uses of state endowment land, both location and quantity, and the location and quantity of accessible and inaccessible state endowment land.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Idaho Department of Lands provide the report to the Idaho Legislature no later than January 1, 2018, and shall make a digital copy available on their website for the public at large.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Idaho Department of Lands provide such a report no later than January 1 of every year.

#### HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 3 BY HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, TO THE SECRETARY OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY, TO THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, at the direction of the United States government, the U.S. Department of Energy's Idaho site was established in 1949 to demonstrate peaceful uses of splitting the atom through nuclear reactor research and development in its mission to create electricity for commercial use and propulsion for the United States Navy fleet; and

WHEREAS, during its history the Department of Energy's Idaho site designed and built fifty-two nuclear reactors, perfecting light-water reactor design and operation, proving that reactors could create more fuel than they use, extending the useful life of our country's naval vessels, and providing isotopes to the medical community for the elimination of cancer and other diseases; and

WHEREAS, in its sixty-eight-year history, radioactive and hazardous wastes were generated on-site, or were shipped to Idaho, that required storage or disposal using industry-accepted practices at the time, which presented environmental challenges at the 890-square-mile federal site and to the underlying Snake River Plain Aquifer, the primary drinking and agricultural water source for more than 300,000 Idaho residents; and

WHEREAS, elected officials, federal department administrators, environmental interest organizations, Idaho citizens, and the nuclear industry itself recognized the need to change past waste storage and disposal practices and clean up legacy waste sites that posed a potential or confirmed risk to people or the environment; and

WHEREAS, after several years of assessment and negotiations, the State of Idaho entered into a legally binding agreement with the federal government on December 9, 1991, to assess all potential waste sites at the Department of Energy's Idaho site and use the risk-based process outlined in the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act to clean up legacy waste sites with the intent of protecting the second-largest continuous aquifer in the United States and restoring or preserving areas of the site to protect people and the ancestral lands of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Energy and its contractors have completed environmental assessments of all suspected waste sites at the Department of Energy's Idaho site and completed the cleanup actions outlined in twenty of twenty-five records of decision; and

WHEREAS, environmental scientists and engineers have employed innovative cleanup technologies and processes to protect employees, the public, and the environment, while also expediting the remediation of contaminated sites and saving taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Energy and its contractor continue to make measurable progress removing Cold War weapons waste from an unlined landfill with the aim of protecting the Snake River Plain Aquifer – one of Idaho's most precious natural resources.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that, in this twenty-fifth anniversary of the signing of the Federal Facility Agreement and Consent Order, we support the Department of Energy, the Administration and Congress to identify, commit and sustain the necessary funding to allow the Department of Energy to continue to make progress at meeting its cleanup milestones to benefit the citizens of Idaho and its environment.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature supports continued funding for the national and international missions at the Department of Energy's Idaho site to include, but not be limited to, nuclear energy research and development, bioenergy research, renewable energy research, cyber security advancements, smart-grid technology deployments, and national security support to the Department of Homeland Security and other departments.

#### HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 4 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES, TO THE LEADERSHIP OF THE HOUSES, ASSEMBLIES AND SENATES IN THE STATES OF MONTANA, WYOMING, UTAH, NEVADA, OREGON, WASHINGTON, ARIZONA, COLORADO, NEW MEXICO AND CALIFORNIA, AND TO THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST ECONOMIC REGION.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, eradication of invasive species is a matter of national concern, transcending state lines; and

WHEREAS, the presence of quagga and zebra mussels, collectively referred to as dreissenid mussels, in the West is a matter of growing and alarming concern; and

WHEREAS, the mussels were introduced into the Great Lakes in the 1980s by watercraft from the shipping industry through ballast water and adhesion to watercraft, having originated in Eastern Europe near the Black Sea, and now having spread to 32 states, including a discovery of larvae in Montana in November 2016; and

WHEREAS, in her five-year lifetime, a single quagga or zebra mussel will produce about 5 million eggs, 100,000 of which reach adulthood. The offspring of a single mussel will in turn produce a total of half a billion adult offspring; and

WHEREAS, mussels spread, in large part, by attaching to exposed hard surfaces of watercraft, as well as ballast water discharges, and being transported from water body to water body, many times across state lines, and many western states have now enacted laws to establish watercraft inspection programs to prevent the spread of quagga and zebra mussels to unaffected waters: and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that mussel introduction into the State of Idaho would cost Idaho approximately \$94 million per year. This figure does not include agriculture-related impacts, which would be devastating to the state, but reflects the impact to hydroelectric facilities, recreation areas, fish hatcheries, golf courses, intake valves for drinking water facilities and irrigation facilities; and

WHEREAS, federal action, and federal regulations, are necessary to address decontamination policies for those infested federal waters in the West; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho seeks to foster cooperative efforts between the western states and the federal government for the establishment of a coordinated effort to prevent, to whatever extent possible, through efforts including inspections, decontamination policies, enforcement of invasive species laws and rapid response protocols, further spread of the mussels, and containment where established, until such time as viable tools for eradication are discovered.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we encourage western states and the federal government to establish cooperative and coordinated efforts with the State of Idaho to prevent, to whatever extent possible, through efforts including inspections, decontamination policies, enforcement of invasive species laws and rapid response protocols, further

spread of the mussels, and containment where established, until such time as viable tools for eradication are discovered.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States, to the leadership of the houses, assemblies and senates in the states of Montana, Wyoming, Utah, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico and California, and to the Pacific Northwest Economic Region.

74-601. SHORT TITLE. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Government Noninterference in Bond and Levy Elections Act."

74-602. LEGISLATIVE INTENT. The legislature finds that it is against public policy for public funds or property to be used to influence the outcome at the ballot box. The legislature also finds that using public funds or property to advocate particular outcomes is contrary to the principles of our republican form of government in protecting individual thought rather than perpetuating government as its own special interest.

- 74-603. PUBLIC FUNDS IN BOND AND LEVY ELECTIONS PROHIBITED. (1) Public funds and/or property may not be used by a government entity, its officers or agents in supporting, opposing, or promoting a bond or levy election except as provided in subsection (2) and (3) of this section. Nothing in this chapter shall prohibit individuals from using public grounds or facilities that are available to the general public for political purposes, nor does it prohibit public employees or elected officials from exercising their right to free speech in advocating for or against a bond or levy election.
- (2) Public funds and property may be used to inform voters of election-related information including, but not limited to: election notifications as required by Idaho Code, dates and locations of forthcoming elections, voter registration requirements, absentee and early voting details, and bond and levy disclosures pursuant to sections 34-439 and 34-439A, Idaho Code.
- (3) For property tax proposals, nothing shall prohibit the use of public funds or property to provide voters with the expected costs of the bond or levy per one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) of taxable value and the current tax per one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) of taxable value.

74-604. VIOLATIONS. (1) The attorney general shall have the duty to enforce this chapter.

(2) A public official in violation of this chapter is guilty of a misdemeanor and may be fined up to one thousand dollars (\$1,000) and may be ordered to pay restitution pursuant to section 19-5304, Idaho Code.

- 74-605. VALIDITY OF ELECTION CHALLENGED. (1) The attorney general, a county prosecutor or a qualified elector of the applicable jurisdiction shall have standing to challenge an election that involves a violation of this section. A challenge to an election shall be filed by the attorney general, a prosecutor or an elector and reviewed by the court pursuant to chapter 20, title 34, Idaho Code.
- (2) If the court finds that a violation of this section occurred, and that it is more likely than not that the result of the election would have been different had the violation not occurred, then the court shall order that the election is null, void, and of no force and effect.
- (3) If the court finds that a violation of this section occurred, the plaintiff shall be entitled to costs and reasonable attorney's fees and shall be considered the prevailing party regardless of whether or not the violation affected the outcome of the election."

There are few quicker ways of compromising public trust in government than even the perception that its purchasing processes are not on the up-and-up. So I understand and appreciate the Legislature's efforts to buttress the reputation of the Idaho Lottery with House Bill 57.

This measure is redundant relative to Idaho Code 67-7426. Idaho Code 67-7408, Idaho Code 67-7409, and Idaho Code

67-7421 also define how the Lottery Commission must conduct its business. The Idaho Lottery's professional staff ensures compliance with all legal requirements for major procurements by both knowing the law and reaffirming their interpretation with advice of counsel from the Idaho Attorney General. What's more, all decisions about major procurements are made in open meetings of the Lottery Commission.

I have great faith that the Lottery Commission's procurement processes and procedures comply in every respect with the Idaho Constitution and Idaho Code. However, I sign this measure into law to help reinforce the confidence of lawmakers and the public in the Lottery's integrity.

While the Lottery Commission's work has been above reproach since the first ticket was sold in July 1989, it is neither uncommon nor burdensome for the Legislature to require a "belt-and-suspenders" approach to asserting its oversight in order to ensure both the fact and appearance of lawful operations.

WHEREAS, in 2016, Ms. Galaviz received the Marsha Nakamura Teaching Excellence Award by the Idaho Education Association for her professional practice, advocacy, community engagement, leadership in professional development and attention to diversity; and

WHEREAS, on February 10, 2017, Ms. Galaviz received the NEA Foundation Award for Teaching Excellence, the top award out of forty national finalists, for attaining the highest teaching standards, her exemplary instruction, her advocacy for her profession and her staunch support for public education.

WHEREAS, the Legislative Services Office is authorized to gather information necessary to implement a remote testimony pilot program for the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature and is authorized to work with individuals at potential remote sites to develop the pilot program; and

WHEREAS, estimated costs associated with implementing the pilot program will be gathered by the Legislative Services Office, and such estimate will be reported to the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and

WHEREAS, the Speaker of the House of Representatives will select one or more House committees to participate in the remote testimony pilot program for the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the House of Representatives, assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, that a remote testimony pilot program for the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature be adopted by the House of Representatives.

# HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 5 BY HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, AND THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, Article 1, Section 23, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho provides in part that: "The rights to hunt, fish and trap, including by the use of traditional methods, are a valued part of the heritage of the State of Idaho and shall forever be preserved for the people and managed through the laws, rules and proclamations that preserve the future of hunting, fishing and trapping. Public hunting, fishing and trapping of wildlife shall be a preferred means of managing wildlife."; and

WHEREAS, Section 36-103, Idaho Code, provides that: "All wildlife, including all wild animals, wild birds, and fish, within the state of Idaho, is hereby declared to be the property of the state of Idaho. It shall be preserved, protected, perpetuated, and managed. It shall be only captured or taken at such times or places, under such conditions, or by such means, or in such manner, as will preserve, protect, and perpetuate such wildlife, and provide for the citizens of this state and, as by law permitted to others, continued supplies of such wildlife for hunting, fishing and trapping."; and

WHEREAS, Idaho is responsible for managing all wildlife wherever it is located within the borders of the State of Idaho, drawing upon the best available science to monitor the size and health of wildlife populations throughout the state; and

WHEREAS, In May of 2011, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service delisted gray wolves in the Northern Rockies and Western Great Lakes and Idaho resumed management of gray wolves within the state's boundaries with continued monitoring and reporting requirements. Based on the delisting, the Idaho Fish and Game Commission directed the Fish and Game Department to: (1) Manage wolves in a manner that will ensure wolves remain under responsible state management in conjunction with the rest of Idaho's wildlife; (2) Manage wolves as big game animals consistent with the goals and objectives of the 2002 Idaho Wolf Conservation and Management Plan approved by the Idaho Legislature and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to keep wolves off the Endangered Species List; (3) Control wolves where they depredate on livestock and other domestic animals or threaten human safety; (4) Control the population of wolves and other predators as needed to address areas where elk or other prey populations are below management objectives; (5) Develop wolf hunting season recommendations for consideration by the commission and develop trapping recommendations; and (6) Conduct additional species management planning as appropriate;

WHEREAS, given the state's wildlife management responsibilities, agencies of the state and their designees should be afforded full access to all state and federal lands within the state, as well as all means of wilderness entry and animal tracking, for these management purposes. Furthermore, mandating the destruction of data acquired from tracking wildlife by entry on federal lands is a heavy-handed interference with the possession of chattels that by right belong to the State of Idaho, contrary to the best science practices for wildlife management, and needlessly hostile to the spirit of cooperation needed to properly steward the wildlife resources with which Idaho has been blessed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urge Idaho's congressional delegation and all members of the United States Congress to take necessary action to authorize the State of Idaho, its agencies and designees, full access to all state and federal lands within the state, as well as all means

of wilderness entry and animal tracking, to fulfill wildlife management responsibilities of the State of Idaho.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Interior, the Secretary of Agriculture, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CONGRESS ASSEMBLED AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, since the beginning of time, the ability of man to provide food, fiber and fuel for himself and others has determined his independence, freedom and security; and

WHEREAS, the strength of a nation is based on its ability to sufficiently provide safe and reliable food, fiber and fuel for its people; and

WHEREAS, the family farm unit is the foundation of agriculture and one of the basic strengths of the United States; and

WHEREAS, a strong and viable agricultural industry is a very important part of our national security and overall well-being; and

WHEREAS, federal, state and local laws and regulations require farmers, ranchers and food processors in the United States to meet the highest standards in the world when it comes to environmental protection, worker safety, wage rates and food safety concerns: and

WHEREAS, United States farmers, ranchers and food processors pay for record audits on farm inspections and USDA product inspections to confirm that necessary criteria are met to adhere to the laws and regulations that apply; and

WHEREAS, the Food Safety Modernization Act requires that all food products, foreign and domestic, must adhere to the same food safety standards, and yet only 2% of all imported food products are actually inspected.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urge that United States farmers, ranchers and food processors be enabled to compete freely and trade fairly in foreign and domestic markets on a strictly level playing field.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that food safety standards in the United States should be enforced fully on food from foreign countries wishing to participate in markets that lie within the boundaries of the United States and funded in a way that does not burden the United States taxpayer.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED when determining the economic value of international trade agreements, we urge that the cost of environmental protection, worker safety, wage rates and food safety standards be quantified and considered in such determinations.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage the education of the general public regarding the importance of the role agriculture plays in the development of a society, recognizing that such public education, primarily at the middle and secondary school levels, is critical in the preservation and strengthening of the family farm unit and the overall preservation and strengthening of the agricultural industry itself.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, the Sixtieth Idaho Legislature passed Senate Joint Memorial 106, sponsored by the office of Governor C.L. "Butch" Otter, calling for an amendment to the U.S. Constitution that would prevent Congress from passing laws requiring citizens of the United States to participate in any health care insurance program or penalizing them for declining health care coverage; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Health Freedom Act codifies as state policy that every person in the State of Idaho is and shall be free from government compulsion in the selection of health insurance options, and that such liberty is protected by the constitutions of the United States and the State of Idaho; and

WHEREAS, the average Idaho rate increase for 2017 individual Affordable Care Act (ACA) health insurance plans was 24% and, with the year-over-year increases since the implementation of the ACA federal mandates, health insurance plans have become unaffordable for thousands of Idahoans and their families; and

WHEREAS, nearly 90,000 Idahoans can afford coverage only with the assistance of an ACA premium assistance tax

credit or other subsidy, and Idaho's uninsured includes "middle class" individuals and families who earn too much to qualify for federal insurance premium assistance and have no coverage option other than high-cost ACA plans; and

WHEREAS, the premium amounts for pre-ACA individual transitional "grandmothered" plans were 30% to 50% less than those of the individual ACA plans, indicating that a return to state regulation of the individual insurance market would result in significantly lower premium amounts for many Idahoans; and

WHEREAS, prior to implementation of the ACA, the State of Idaho primarily regulated the Idaho health insurance market and provided aggressive oversight of all aspects of that market and enforced consumer protections as well as ensured a local, responsive regulation for consumers; and

WHEREAS, prior to the implementation of the ACA-mandated plans, Idaho had a stable and competitive individual insurance market, with among the lowest individual premium amounts in the nation, and consumers could choose from a variety of health insurance coverage options to best cover them and their families; and

WHEREAS, on January 20, 2017, President Donald J. Trump signed an executive order to minimize the economic burden of the ACA pending repeal, including instruction to the Secretary of Health and Human Services and to the heads of all other executive departments and agencies with authorities and responsibilities under the act to exercise all authority and discretion available to them to provide greater flexibility to states and to cooperate with them in implementing health care programs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Idaho Legislature urges President Trump, Secretary Price and Congress to take the following action: Allow individual states to once again serve as the primary regulator of health insurance plans and immediately permit the free market availability and sale of nonsubsidized health insurance plans in accordance with state-established statutes, regulations and rules governing such plans; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Idaho Department of Insurance issue guidance allowing for competitive, innovative, nonsubsidized health insurance plans, along with the free market sale of health insurance plans to Idahoans who choose to purchase them, in accordance with state-established statutes, regulations and rules governing such plans; and

WHEREAS, Jim Jones was born in Twin Falls and raised on his family's farm near Eden, Idaho; and

WHEREAS, Jim served as an artillery officer in the United States Army in Vietnam in the late 1960s, receiving the Bronze Star; and

WHEREAS, while serving in Vietnam, Jim volunteered at an orphanage run by the Cao Dai Church in Tay Ninh Province; and

WHEREAS, upon his discharge from the United States Army, Jim served as a legislative assistant to former United States Senator Len B. Jordan from 1970 to 1973; and

WHEREAS, Jim returned to Idaho in 1973 and opened a private law office in Jerome, Idaho; and

WHEREAS, in 1982, Jim was elected Idaho Attorney General and was reelected in 1986; and

WHEREAS, while Attorney General, Jim played a key role in negotiating the Swan Falls Settlement, which set the stage for the Snake River Basin Adjudication, and promoted Idaho water management; and

WHEREAS, as Attorney General, Jim was instrumental in defending Idaho's sovereignty over its water and other natural resources; and

WHEREAS, Jim was active in the Conference of Western Attorneys General and led the successful effort for adoption of a Executive Order 12612 by President Reagan on "Federalism"; and

WHEREAS, Jim received the Torch of Liberty Award from the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith in recognition of his fight against discrimination; and

WHEREAS, from 1990 to 2004 Jim maintained a private practice in Boise, advocating for the rights of all Idahoans; and

WHEREAS, Jim was elected to the Idaho Supreme Court in 2004, having run unopposed in a nonpartisan election to fill the open seat of retiring Justice Wayne Kidwell; and

WHEREAS, Jim was reelected to the Idaho Supreme Court in May 2010, again unopposed, and became Chief Justice in August 2015; and

WHEREAS, as a Justice, Jim forcefully advocated for the Idaho State Bar's pro bono program, of which he was a founding member and chairman; and

WHEREAS, Jim continues to be a strong voice in the movement to increase access to the courts through reducing litigation costs and increasing court assistance services; and

WHEREAS, Jim demonstrated his independence and commitment to the rule of law as a Justice on the Idaho Supreme Court; and

WHEREAS, Jim believes an informed and active citizenry is critical to the functioning of our form of government, and has witnessed many instances where a concerned citizen saw a problem, rallied support and solved the problem; and

WHEREAS, Jim's numerous contributions to the community include chairing the Special Committee on Governmental Ethics, Lobbying and Political Campaign Financing with former Governor Cecil Andrus and former Supreme Court Justice Charles McDevitt and serving as the founding director of the Idaho Vietnam Veterans Leadership Program; and

WHEREAS, Jim has captivated us all with his quick wit and puns; and

WHEREAS, Jim has made immeasurable contributions to the Idaho judicial system through his carefully reasoned and honest opinions; and

#### HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 8 BY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, THE SECRETARY OF THE ARMY, THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR, THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF CONGRESS, AND THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, Dreissenid mussels, specifically quagga mussels (Dreissena rostriformis bugensis) and zebra mussels (Dreissena polymorpha), are aquatic invasive species that cause irreparable ecological damage to many waters in the United States; and

WHEREAS, we are requesting \$8 million in federal matching funding for FY 2018 to combat the immediate threat of invasive quagga and zebra mussels to the Pacific Northwest

region. Until recently, the Pacific Northwest region remained one of the only regions in North America without invasive quagga and zebra mussels. In November 2016, invasive mussel larvae were detected at Canyon Ferry Reservoir and Tiber Reservoir, located in Montana, and part of the Missouri River system. In response, Montana Governor Steve Bullock declared a natural resources state of emergency; and

WHEREAS, further spread of these invasive mussels will have a devastating and far-reaching impact on the economic and environmental wellbeing of the entire region. If invasive mussel populations become established in the Pacific Northwest, they will cost the region \$500 million a year, so it is vital that we work together to ensure that the invasive mussels do not make the short trip across the Continental Divide and into the Columbia River system. Failing to ensure this would not only result in Idaho water bodies becoming infested with quagga and zebra mussels, but the rest of the Columbia River Basin and region as well; and

WHEREAS, for these reasons, we ask Congress to appropriate \$8 million of the authorized \$20 million for FY 2018 to the four Northwest states of Idaho, Montana, Oregon, and Washington, according to the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation Act (WIIN), which includes the Water Resources Development Act of 2016 (WRDA). The \$8 million in federal matching funding would be used to enhance funds already allocated by the states for watercraft inspection and decontamination stations with the purpose of protecting the Columbia River Basin against invasive mussels. Now that invasive mussel larvae have been found in Montana, federal assistance is key to ensuring that the Columbia River Basin system is protected and that invasive mussels do not spread to the rest of the region; and

WHEREAS, we appreciate the funding that Congress appropriated under the Water Resources Reform and Development Act of 2014 (WRRDA) and WIIN to assist the four Northwest states. The emergency in Montana highlights the constant and ongoing threat of invasive mussels to the region, and the importance of the states' continued receipt of federal matching funding to support their efforts to protect against these aquatic invaders. Therefore, we respectfully ask that you consider our request and take the necessary steps to ensure that federal funds are appropriated to the four Northwest states in FY 2018.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urge Congress to appropriate \$8 million of the authorized \$20 million for FY 2018 to the four Northwest states of Idaho, Montana, Oregon, and Washington, according to the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation Act (WIIN), which includes the Water Resources Development Act of 2016 (WRDA). The \$8 million in federal matching funding will be used to enhance funds already allocated by the states for watercraft inspection and decontamination stations with the purpose of protecting the Columbia River Basin against invasive mussels. Now that invasive mussel larvae have been found in Montana, federal assistance is key to ensuring that the Columbia River Basin system is protected and that invasive mussels do not spread to the rest of the region.

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND AUTHORIZING THE DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION TO ENTER INTO AGREEMENTS WITH THE IDAHO STATE BUILDING AUTHORITY TO FINANCE THE PURCHASE OF, FINANCE OR CONSTRUCT NEW, OR PURCHASE EXISTING, OFFICE AND/OR WAREHOUSE SPACE TO ESTABLISH A SINGLE-DESTINATION COMPLEX TO HOUSE STATE AGENCIES.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho currently leases more than 800,000 square feet of office and warehouse space in Ada County at an annual lease cost of \$12.2 million; and

WHEREAS, the cost of leasing will continue to grow as lease rates negotiated during the great recession become open to renegotiation; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho State Tax Commission, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game and the Idaho Department of Finance currently occupy more than 159,000 square feet of office space in a facility being purchased by an owner with no interest in leasing to third parties; and

WHEREAS, other state agencies occupying 478,000 square feet of office space and 82,000 square feet of warehouse space have leases expiring within the next 5 years; and

WHEREAS, the state recognizes that the lowest long-term occupancy cost is achieved through ownership, making ownership the most conservative policy choice; and

WHEREAS, state agencies need a dependable, predictable location to conduct business outside of the control of third-party owners; and

WHEREAS, by grouping agencies in a single location, costs can be shared and reduced, while citizens are better served; and

WHEREAS, the timing is favorable for bonding the purchase of state office buildings, due to historically low interest rates; and

WHEREAS, the state has executed an exclusive right to negotiate for a period of 45 days following the adoption of this resolution, in conjunction with a letter of intent, the purchase of property located at 11311 Chinden Boulevard, Boise, Idaho commonly referred to as the HP Campus, with Hewlett-Packard, Inc. maintaining its current level of occupancy through a lease with the state as part of the purchase agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature authorizes and approves the Department of Administration, in consultation with legislative leadership, to enter into an agreement or agreements with the Idaho State Building Authority, under such terms and conditions as may be reasonable and necessary, to provide financing to construct new, or purchase existing, office and/or warehouse space to establish a single-destination complex to house state agencies.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution constitutes authorization required by the provisions of Section 67-6410, Idaho Code.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that it is the intent of the Legislature that due to the tax-exempt status of state-owned property, a property tax shift could result to other property owners in those affected taxing districts, and those taxing districts should remove the assessed value of this property from their budget capacity pursuant to Section 63-802, Idaho Code.

A HOUSE RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND PROVIDING FOR THE ADDITION OF A NEW RULE 78 TO THE RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, the House of Representatives deems it necessary and desirable to add a new Rule 78 to the Rules of the House of Representatives.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the House of Representatives, assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, that the Rules of the House of Representatives shall be amended by the addition thereto of a new Rule 78 to read as follows:

### RULE 78

Contest of Election – Procedures. This Rule governs procedures leading up to and including a hearing on the contest of election. It should be read in conjunction with Chapter 21, Title 34, Idaho Code. For purposes of this Rule, the term "Party" means either the CONTESTEE or the CONTESTOR; the term "Parties" means both.

- (1) Any proof of the CONTESTEE's or CONTESTOR's legal arguments, including depositions, affidavits, production of papers, and examination of poll books and ballots (herein "Record") that either CONTESTEE or CONTESTOR desires the House of Representatives to consider in adjudication of a Contest must be completed on or before December 29. CONTESTEE and CONTESTOR's Record must be delivered to the Office of the Secretary of State no later than the close of business on the next business day. Any Record or evidence from the CONTESTEE or CONTESTOR not delivered to the Office of the Secretary of State by that day and time will not be considered by the House of Representatives.
- (2) The Parties must file a Memorandum that outlines their claims, defenses, legal authority, legislative precedent, proposed form of relief, and a description of witness fees and discovery costs that are incurred. The Memorandum must be filed with the Office of the Secretary of State no later than the close of business four (4) business days following delivery of the Record to the Office of the Secretary of State as provided in paragraph (1). However, CONTESTEE is not required to file a responsive pleading to the Contest.
- (3) Any Party may file a Responsive Memorandum. If a Party chooses to file a Responsive Memorandum, it must be filed with the Office of the Secretary of State no later than the close of business on the first day of the next Regular Session.

- (4) If an unresolved discovery or Record dispute exists and continues between the CONTESTEE and the CONTESTOR, and on motion duly made, the presiding officer or his designee may rule on the dispute. Neither the CONTESTEE nor the CONTESTOR will be granted any additional time beyond December 29 to develop or deliver his Record.
- (5) Committee hearing procedures. If the House of Representatives refers the Contest of Election to a Standing or Special Committee, the Committee Chairman will notify the Parties of the Committee hearing procedures. The following procedures, subject to the discretion of the Committee Chairman, will govern the hearing:
  - (a) No additional testimony or Record may be presented, taken, or allowed by the Parties beyond the Record delivered to the Office of the Secretary of State as provided in paragraph (1) of this Rule.
  - (b) Neither CONTESTEE nor CONTESTOR may examine or cross-examine any witness that testifies before the Committee. All examination will be performed by Committee members.
  - (c) Pursuant to Section 34-2104, Idaho Code, only the named points in the Notice of Contest of Elections may be argued.
  - (d) The Committee may send for and receive persons, papers, and records, whether written or oral, including from the Office of the Attorney General, other State Elected Officers, State officials, County Elected Officers, County officials, or other witnesses that the Committee determines will reasonably assist the Committee in the performance of its constitutional duty as a "judge of the election, qualifications and returns of its own members," Section 9, Article III, Idaho Constitution.
  - (e) In all other respects, the Committee will be governed by the rules of the House of Representatives.
- (6) The Committee may adopt any of the following as part of the hearing procedures:
  - (a) Permit the Parties to have counsel present at Committee meeting(s); and
  - (b) Establish a time limit for the CONTESTEE and CONTESTOR to argue their positions to the Committee.
- (7) Neither CONTESTEE nor CONTESTOR, nor their counsel, may participate in ex parte communication with any member of the Idaho House of Representatives regarding the merits of the Contest of Election prior to final House of Representatives determination.
- (8) Service of all Record, Memorandum, Responsive Memorandum, motions, or objections must be made on the other Party as provided in Idaho Rules of Civil Procedure 5(b), excepting subpart 5(b)(2)(D). The Parties must also provide a proof of service as provided by Idaho Rules of Civil Procedure 5(e). The Parties must work in good faith to ensure reasonable and timely service, considering the limited time periods.
- (9) Nothing in this Rule limits or restricts the House of Representatives in the performance of its duties as the judge of the election, qualifications and returns of its members.

Service contracts, other than motor vehicle service contracts subject to the provisions of the Idaho motor vehicle service contract act, chapter 2862, title 491, Idaho Code, may provide for the repair, replacement or maintenance of property for damage resulting from power surges and accidental damage from handling.
- (2) The marketing, sale, offering for sale, issuance, making, proposing to make, and administration of a service contract is exempt from the provisions of title 41, Idaho Code.
- (3) Service contracts shall be subject to the provisions of the Idaho consumer protection act, chapter 6, title 48, Idaho Code.

SECTION 5. That Section 48-605, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 48-605. EXCEPTIONS TO CHAPTER. Nothing in this act shall apply to:
- (1) Actions or transactions permitted under laws administered by the state public utility commission or other regulatory body or officer acting under statutory authority of this state or the United States.
- (2) Acts done by publishers, broadcasters, printers, retailers, or their employees, in the publication or dissemination of an advertisement in good faith on the basis of information or material supplied by others and without knowledge or reason to know of the misleading or deceptive character of such advertisement or the information or material furnished.
- (3) Persons subject to chapter 13, title 41, Idaho Code (sections 41-1301 through 41-1327), defining, and providing for the determination by the director of the department of insurance of unfair methods of competition or unfair or deceptive acts or practices in the business of insurance, except as specified in chapter 62 or 63, title 41, Idaho Code."

WHEREAS, the State and the citizens of Idaho have a proud tradition of support for the armed forces of the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Air National Guard has distinguished itself in service to the State of Idaho and to the citizens of our state and the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, Gowen Field, located in the City of Boise, Idaho, has served admirably for decades as an effective, world-class military installation, both in federal and state service,

as a base of operations for the Idaho Army National Guard and the Idaho Air National Guard; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Air Force has chosen Gowen Field among five finalists for two sites to locate squadrons of F-35 Lightning II Joint Strike Fighter aircraft; and

WHEREAS, Gowen Field is the only finalist for the basing of F-35 aircraft in the western United States; and

WHEREAS, Gowen Field, Boise, and southwestern Idaho possess the facilities, infrastructure, airspace, climate, landscape, skilled personnel, relevant private-sector industry and strong public support for military operations required to effectively support the siting of F-35 aircraft; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Air National Guard's existing A-10 aircraft flying mission faces the distinct possibility of elimination in the foreseeable future; and

WHEREAS, the economies of Boise, southwestern Idaho and the entire state would be materially damaged by the loss of an Idaho Air National Guard flying mission at Gowen Field, which now provides jobs and career opportunities for thousands of Idaho citizens, both military and civilian; and

WHEREAS, it is incumbent upon the leadership of the State of Idaho to extend its active support to efforts to maintain a viable flying mission for the Idaho Air National Guard, such as that which would be provided by the U.S. Air Force's basing of F-35 aircraft at Gowen Field.

While I appreciate the desire to establish an orderly process for conducting a special election to fill vacancy in one of Idaho's seats in the U.S. House of Representatives, this legislation unnecessarily sacrifices timeliness for structure. I also appreciate the benefits of consolidated election dates. However, I find H 197 overly proscriptive in response to what would be an extraordinary circumstance.

The governor now has discretion to set such elections, which should be conducted as soon as possible to ensure the Idaho's congressional representation is not diminished for any longer than necessary. **H 197** could leave the state without a way of filling a U.S. House vacancy for six months or longer. That is simply unacceptable.

I look forward to working with legislative leaders in the months ahead to develop a process for special congressional elections that provides the kind of expediency that Idaho citizens deserve in choosing their national representation.

#### AMENDMENT TO THE BILL

On page 4 of the printed bill, following line 14, insert: "SECTION 2. That Section 63-3024, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

63-3024. INDIVIDUALS' TAX AND TAX ON ESTATES AND TRUSTS. (a) For taxable year 2001, and each taxable year thereafter, a tax measured by Idaho taxable income as defined in this chapter is hereby imposed upon every individual, trust, or estate required by this chapter to file a return.

(ai) Through taxable year 2016 and except as provided in paragraph (ii) of this subsection, tThe tax imposed upon individuals, trusts and estates shall be computed at the following rates:

When Idaho taxable income is: The rate is:

Less than \$1,000	One and six-tenths percent (1.6%)
\$1,000 but less than \$2,000	\$16, plus three and six-tenths percent (3.6%) of the amount over \$1,000
\$2,000 but less than \$3,000	\$52, plus four and one-tenth percent (4.1%) of the amount over \$2,000
\$3,000 but less than \$4,000	\$93, plus five and one-tenth percent (5.1%) of the amount over \$3,000
\$4,000 but less than \$5,000	\$144, plus six and one-tenth percent (6.1%) of the amount over \$4,000
\$5,000 but less than \$7,500	\$205, plus seven and one-tenth percent (7.1%) of the amount over \$5,000
\$7,500 and over	\$383, plus seven and four-tenths
	percent (7.4%) of the amount

over \$7,500

(ii) Beginning with taxable year 2017 and each taxable year thereafter, the tax imposed upon individuals, trusts and estates shall be computed at the following rates:

When Idaho taxable income is:	The rate is:
<u>Less than \$1,000</u>	One and five-tenths percent $(1.5\%)$
\$1,000 but less than \$2,000	\$15, plus three and five-tenths percent (3.5%) of the amount over \$1,000
\$2,000 but less than \$3,000	\$50, plus four percent (4.0%) of the amount over \$2,000
\$3,000 but less than \$4,000	$\frac{\$90, \text{ plus five percent } (5.0\%)}{\text{of the amount over } \$3,000}$
\$4,000 but less than \$5,000	\$140, plus six percent (6.0%) of the amount over \$4,000
\$5,000 but less than \$7,500	\$200, plus seven percent (7.0%) of the amount over \$5,000
<u>\$7,500 and over</u>	\$375, plus seven and three-tenths percent (7.3%) of the amount over \$7,500

For taxable year 2000 and each year thereafter, the state tax commission shall prescribe a factor which that shall be used to compute the Idaho income tax brackets provided in subsection (a) of this section. The factor shall provide an adjustment to the Idaho tax brackets so that inflation will not result in a tax increase. The Idaho tax brackets shall be adjusted as follows: multiply the bracket amounts by the percentage (the consumer price index for the calendar year immediately preceding the calendar year to which the adjusted brackets will apply divided by the consumer price index for calendar year 1998). For the purpose of this computation, the consumer price index for any calendar year is the average of the consumer price index as of the close of the twelve (12) month period for the immediately preceding calendar year, without regard to any subsequent adjustments, as adopted by the state tax commission. This adoption shall be exempt from the provisions of chapter 52, title 67, Idaho Code. The consumer price index shall mean the consumer price index for all U.S. urban consumers published by the United States department of labor. The state tax commission shall annually include the factor as provided in this subsection to multiply against Idaho taxable income in the brackets above to arrive at that year's Idaho taxable income for tax bracket

- (b) In case a joint return is filed by husband and wife pursuant to the provisions of section 63-3031, Idaho Code, the tax imposed by this section shall be twice the tax which that would be imposed on one-half (1/2) of the aggregate Idaho taxable income. For the purposes of this section, a return of a surviving spouse, as defined in section 2(a) of the Internal Revenue Code, and a head of household, as defined in section 2(b) of the Internal Revenue Code, shall be treated as a joint return and the tax imposed shall be twice the tax which that would be imposed on one-half (1/2) of the Idaho taxable income.
- (c) In the case of a trust that is an electing small business trust as defined in section 1361 of the Internal Revenue Code, the special rules for taxation of such trusts contained in section 641 of the Internal Revenue Code shall apply except that the maximum

individual rate provided in this section shall apply in computing tax due under this chapter.

(d) The state tax commission shall compute and publish Idaho income tax liability for taxpayers at the midpoint of each bracket of Idaho taxable income in fifty dollar (\$50.00) steps to fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), rounding such calculations to the nearest dollar. Taxpayers having income within such brackets shall file returns based upon and pay taxes according to the schedule thus established. The state tax commission shall promulgate rules defining the conditions upon which such returns shall be filed.

SECTION 3. That Section 63-3025, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 63-3025. TAX ON CORPORATE INCOME. (1) For taxable years commencing on and after January 1, 2001, a tax is hereby imposed on the Idaho taxable income of a corporation, other than an S corporation, which that transacts or is authorized to transact business in this state or which that has income attributable to this state. The tax shall be equal to seven and four three-tenths percent (7.43 %) of Idaho taxable income.
- (2) In the case of an S corporation that is required to file a return under section 63-3030, Idaho Code, a tax is hereby imposed at the rate provided in subsection (1) of this section upon both:
  - (a) Net recognized built-in gain attributable to this state. The amount of net recognized built-in gain attributable to this state shall be computed in accordance with section 1374 of the Internal Revenue Code subject to the apportionment and allocation provisions of section 63-3027, Idaho Code.
  - (b) Excess net passive income attributable to this state. The amount of excess net passive income attributable to this state shall be computed in accordance with section 1375 of the Internal Revenue Code subject to the apportionment and allocation provisions of section 63-3027, Idaho Code.
- (3) The tax imposed by subsection (1) or (2) of this section shall not be less than twenty dollars (\$20.00); provided further that the twenty dollar (\$20.00) minimum payment shall not be collected from nonproductive mining corporations.
- (4) The tax imposed by this section shall not apply to corporations taxed pursuant to the provisions of section 63-3025A, Idaho Code.

SECTION 4. An emergency existing therefor, which emergency is hereby declared to exist, Sections 2 and 3 of this act shall be in full force and effect on and after passage and approval, and retroactively to January 1, 2017. Section 1 of this act shall be in full force and effect on and after July 1, 2018.".

House Bill 139 is a case of reasonable, consensus-driven ideas from the State Board of Cosmetology and the Board of Barber Examiners getting burned in what is supposed to be the refining fire of our legislative process.

More than a year ago, the two boards began exploring ways to allow cosmetology training to be credited to barber licensure and vice versa. The boards worked on this and other issues with interested parties to produce a legislative proposal to: 1) allow transfer of education credits between professions; 2) combine the boards to create efficiencies and save money; 3) reduce required education hours for an electrology license from 800 to 600; 4) exempt persons performing services for theatrical or other visual arts productions from licensing requirements; and 5) allow licensees to practice outside licensed establishments up to 24 days per year.

The boards' proposal was discussed in open meetings and had broad support among stakeholders. But after it was submitted to the Legislature, the sponsors were informed that it would not get a hearing. Instead, legislators used the boards' proposal as a starting point for drafting House Bill 139. The resulting changes - incorporated without input from the boards and stakeholders - turned a consensus plan into a controversial bill in which the original intent was largely lost.

Those changes would reduce the number of education hours required for barber-stylist and cosmetology licenses, and allow a board to reinstate an expired license retroactive to its expiration date - a misguided attempt to resolve a federal accreditation issue by creating a legal fiction in state law. I will not allow the State of Idaho to be subjected to legal liability for falsely representing the licensure status of those seeking federal student loans for their training.

However, I would invite the Legislature's attention during the 2018 session to item No. 4 above on the list of proposals from the boards, which also was incorporated in House Bill 139. I would consider legislation exempting "event" makeup artists from existing licensure requirements, but this bill has too many other flaws.

The public, the Legislature and I expect State boards that regulate such professions as cosmetology and barbering to promulgate rules and draft proposals for legislative consideration in an open and inclusive manner. House Bill 139 was developed

without input from interested parties or due regard for the health, safety and welfare of the public. Idahoans deserve better.

House Bill 202a is a classic case of a solution in search of a problem, with the potential to create problems of its own in the process. The fact that this bipartisan legislation was overwhelmingly approved by both eh House and the Senate is outweighed by compelling opposition from law enforcement and the absence of any benefit to law-abiding citizens from its enactment.

There have been no allegations that Idaho law enforcement officers or agencies are illegally or inappropriately seizing property from alleged drug traffickers. Its sponsors contend that the measure is aimed at preventing improper forfeiture of assets in the future, but there is no evidence to suggest that such a problem is imminent.

At the same time, there is a legitimate public safety concern associated with allowing those charged with drug crimes to keep money, cars and other civil assets that may be connected with those crimes. Not the least of these concerns is the potential for evidence to disappear or be tampered with.

What's more, it is my view that it is right and proper for drug dealers to have a healthy fear of losing their personal assets if they are caught breaking the law. But while seeking to ease those fears, this legislation goes even further by placing an annual reporting requirement on law enforcement. It is a misplaced effort to hold those responsible for protecting us from crime more accountable while relieving those charged with committing crimes of a worrisome consequence.

There is a broad agreement in the Legislature and among everyone interested in protecting Idaho rivers, streams, lakes and reservoirs, as well as related infrastructure, that preventing an infestation of invasive quagga or zebra mussels must be among our top natural resource priorities. Count me among those for whom the fight against these and other invasive species is of paramount importance.

My veto of House Bill 274a is only about the manner in which we address the challenge. Our focus must be on putting more boots on the ground to enhance the successful boat inspection and decontamination program run by the Idaho State Department of Agriculture (ISDA). I appreciate the Legislature increasing ISDA's budget to do just that. However this legislation creating a new position within my office to coordinate our efforts does little to improve our defenses and preparedness for the potentially devastating impact of a mussel infestation.

Therefore, with this veto I also am issuing Executive Order 2017-05, formally continuing the work of Idaho's Invasive Species Council. This interagency panel is tasked with developing and maintaining a coordinated approach among local, state, federal and tribal entities, as well as private and non-profit organizations, for preventing and controlling invasive species threats.

The Council, led by ISDA, also is responsible for outreach and education efforts for our communities and regional partners. Indeed, more states and local jurisdictions throughout the region are awakening to the pressing need of cooperative efforts toward prevention and management of the threat. But that means intensifying the work of our Invasive Species Council - not adding more bureaucracy.

Every Idaho citizen should know by now that I support tax relief. In fact, I have approved about \$1 billion in tax relief since I took office in 2007. However, the costs of this particular proposal are too high and the potential for imminent financial need too great for the small amount of tax relief it would provide.

One of the hallmarks of human social development is the ability to learn not just from our own mistakes, but from the difficult experiences and hard-earned wisdom of others. That ability, beyond cold economic realities, informs my decision to veto House Bill 67.

In a meeting with Republican leaders of the Idaho House and Senate during the recently concluded legislative session, the discussion turned to the desire by members of their respective caucuses to remove the 6-percent sales tax from groceries. The leaders were concerned about the fiscal impacts of such a change, citing the trouble that Utah legislative leaders reported as a result of our neighboring state taking that action.

The advice from Utah was simple and straightforward: Don't do it. The ramifications of lifting the sales tax from food had made budgeting much more difficult with the loss of what indisputably was their most stable and consistent source of revenue for essential government operations. Taxpayers benefited almost imperceptibly while lawmakers found themselves dealing with the peaks and valleys of income tax and other financial supports that are far more susceptible to economic fluctuations.

Everyone benefits from some kind of government service. Everyone eats. The income derived from a tax on groceries helps to even out the more dramatic ups and downs in our State revenue stream so that government avoids disruptive and dysfunctional shortfalls and funding holdbacks needed to balance the budget.

With the Utah experience, the advice of economists and the reasons we established the grocery tax credit in the first place in mind, I wrote a letter to our legislative leaders making it clear that I opposed removing the sales tax on groceries. It was my hope that our legislators would look beyond the understandable impulse to relieve a financial burden on taxpayers to weigh the relative merits of such a change.

Unfortunately, they did not.

Let me recap the pertinent facts from that letter:

- The State will return approximately \$149 million to Idaho taxpayers through the grocery tax credit in fiscal 2019 starting on July 1, 2018, when House Bill 67 would become effective.
- Removing the sales tax on groceries would reduce the State's General Fund revenue by over \$201 million in fiscal 2019.
- Provisions in House Bill 67 to keep local units of government from losing any revenue-sharing money as a result of the change would reduce the State's General Fund by another \$26 million.
- Overall, the General Fund would be reduced by almost \$80 million in fiscal 2019 alone, making it all the more difficult to meet our commitments to improving Idaho's education system.

I also cited the experience and regrets expressed by other states in an effort to impress upon legislators that what they were proposing would be virtually irreversible. In essence, they would be giving themselves and all those who rely on government services - in other words, every Idaho citizen - an \$80 million tattoo.

How to make up for that foregone revenue has not been expressed. I doubt it has been much considered.

Idaho Department of Insurance Director Dean Cameron was a State senator and longtime chairman of the Legislature's budget-setting Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee. In observing legislative debate on this issue, Cameron recounted the lessons he learned the hard way about the cost of a destabilized tax system.

"By removing food and other commodities from sales tax they unintentionally tie it more directly to the fluctuations of the economy. When the economic downturn comes - and it will - the Legislature will be forced into tax increases or dramatic reductions in education spending," he wrote. "Sales tax is what saved us in the four economic downturns during my tenure."

Putting aside the challenging and subjective calculus of deciding what by law constitutes "food" for the purposes of implementing the tax exemption created by House Bill 67, there is the additional problem of losing the sales tax revenue generated from food purchased by tourists and other non-resident travelers passing through. And none of those receipts are offset by grocery tax credit reimbursements.

Of more immediate concern is the hole that House Bill 67 would leave in our State budget just as we are facing the prospect of enormous flood damage this spring, above and beyond the winter-weather damage we already have experienced and budgeted \$52 million to address.

In summary, I understand that House Bill 67 has captured the popular imagination. It purports to provide tax relief for the working poor - a worthy ambition but one already accomplished through the grocery tax credit. The truth is this bill's benefits are largely imaginary while the downsides are many and very real. The job of all of us who represent and serve the people of Idaho is to do what's right, not necessarily what's popular. It's wonderful when the two align. In this case, unfortunately, they do not.

Yet this situation should provide additional impetus for the Legislature to undertake a more comprehensive reassessment of our tax system, and particularly the wisdom and continuing utility of the multitude of tax exemptions in Idaho Code.

In the meantime, I am calling on the Legislature to send me a bill as soon as possible in the 2018 session to provide the unemployment insurance tax relief I sought this year and a one-tenth of 1 percent reduction in individual and corporate income tax rates, both retroactive to January 1, 2018. I look forward to working with legislators, our business community and Idaho taxpayers to bring about that change.
