HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 35 BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND RECOGNIZING MOTHER'S DAY THROUGH FATHER'S DAY AS AN OPPORTUNITY TO RAISE AWARENESS ABOUT THE CHALLENGES FACING TRADITIONAL FAMILIES AND THE ALARMING RATE AT WHICH THE TRADITIONAL AMERICAN FAMILY IS DECLINING.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, traditional families designed by God have been the foundation of societies since creation. As such, traditional families operate as a source of security in their communities, often attending to societal troubles before law enforcement involvement is needed, thereby serving as the cornerstone of a functional society. In a letter entitled *The Crucial Role of Families* submitted to the United Nations by the International Federation for Family Development in consult with the U.N. Economic and Social Council division, the authors state: "Children growing up in healthy, married, two-parent families are more likely to lead happy, healthy and successful lives than those who have not experienced the same level of family security and stability... Governments cannot afford to fully replace the functions families perform for the benefit of their members and for the good of society. The family is the most powerful, the most humane and, by far, the most economical system known for building competence and character."; and

WHEREAS, the freedom to exercise these beliefs and values based in the truth of the laws of nature and nature's God has been protected by the Constitution of the United States since its inception; and

WHEREAS, the International Federation for Family Development has stated: "As basic and essential building blocks of societies, families have a crucial role in social development. They bear the primary responsibility for the education and socialization of children as well as instilling values of citizenship and belonging in the society."; and

WHEREAS, compared to peers in two biological parent married families, children who lived with a single parent with no cohabiting partner were five times more likely to be sexually abused, children who lived in a stepfamily with a married biological and non-biological parent were eight to nine times more likely to be sexually abused, and children who lived with a single parent with a partner in the home were twenty times more likely to be sexually abused; and

WHEREAS, traditional families consisting of a natural mother and father, children, grandparents, and extended family have declined drastically since 1960 when approximately 77.5% of children lived with their two parents, who were married; and

WHEREAS, according to census data, in 1960, just 13% of all households were single-person households. In 2018, that figure was 28%; and

WHEREAS, today, only 17.8% of Americans live in traditional nuclear families; and

WHEREAS, in 1950, 27% of marriages ended in divorce. Today, about 45% do; and

WHEREAS, in 1960, 72% of Americans were married. In 2017, nearly half of Americans were single; and

WHEREAS, in 1960, approximately 5% of children were born to unmarried women. Now, about 40% are; and

WHEREAS, American children are more likely to live in a single-parent household than children from any other country; and

WHEREAS, according to the International Federation for Family Development, "Those who build stable families have a higher life expectancy, lower risks of mental illness, alcoholism and domestic violence. The children show lower infant mortality rate, lower risk drug addiction, and lower incidences of engaging in criminal activities after puberty, higher academic achievements, lower incidence of mental illnesses and fewer teenage unwanted pregnancies. A stable family is the lowest cost option for both its members and the State."; and

WHEREAS, the people who suffer the most from the decline in traditional family values and structure are the most vulnerable, especially children; and

WHEREAS, those born into poverty and living with both parents have an 80% chance of climbing out of it. Those born into poverty with a single mother have a 50% chance of remaining stuck in poverty; and

WHEREAS, even in high-crime, inner-city neighborhoods, well over 90% of children from safe, stable homes do not become

delinquents. By contrast, only 10% of children from unsafe, unstable homes in these neighborhoods avoid crime; and

WHEREAS, 63% of youth who commit suicide, 90% of all homeless or runaway children, 85% of all children who show behavior disorders, 80% of rapists with anger problems, 71% of all high school dropouts, 75% of all adolescent patients in chemical abuse centers, and 85% of youths in prisons come from fatherless homes; and

WHEREAS, research demonstrates children who grow up in families with traditional values and gender roles are more likely to have traditional values and gender role expectations themselves; and

WHEREAS, there is an unprecedented attack on these beliefs and the celebration of these beliefs; and

WHEREAS, much remains to be done to ensure that traditional family roles and values are both celebrated and encouraged to provide the most nurturing and healthy environment possible to raise the next generation of American children.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-seventh Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Idaho Legislature:

- (1) Supports the designation of Mother's Day through Father's Day as Traditional Family Values Month in the State of Idaho;
- (2) Recognizes the value of a traditional family consisting of the natural female mother and male father, children, aunts, uncles, grandparents, and other extended family;
- (3) Recognizes the first week of Traditional Family Values Month, including Mother's Day, as a celebration of motherhood;
- (4) Recognizes the second week of Traditional Family Values Month as a celebration of sons, brothers, and uncles;
- (5) Recognizes the third week of Traditional Family Values Month as a celebration of grandparents;
- (6) Recognizes the fourth week of Traditional Family Values Month as a celebration of daughters, sisters, and aunts;
- (7) Recognizes the fifth and final period of Traditional Family Values Month, including Father's Day, as a celebration of fatherhood and marriage between a man and a woman;
- (8) Recognizes the evidence-based physical and mental health benefits children receive when raised in a home with a traditional family;
- (9) Recognizes the evidence-based results that children flourish when raised in a home with an involved biological father:
- (10) Recognizes the immeasurable benefits children receive in the development of character, morality, virtue, and spirituality that traditional American family values foster; and
- (11) Encourages communities, schools, churches, businesses, corporations, and other stakeholders who all benefit from the cohesiveness, peace, tranquility, and civility of communities built on strong traditional family values, along with the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare whose mission is to strengthen the health, safety, and independence of Idahoans, to take part in celebrating Traditional Family Values Month in the State of Idaho.
