I have the honor to advise you that I have signed on March 26, 2024 and am transmitting to the Secretary of State the following House bill, to wit:

H 494

within the time prescribed by law, the same having arrived in the Office of the Governor at the hour of 12:10 p.m. on March 22, 2024.

The improvements in this bill to the criminal laws on commercial sexual activity and human trafficking, as well as the related forfeiture provisions, are needed and I am proud to support them.

However, I feel compelled to reiterate my strong support of this state's longstanding policy of local control in criminal prosecutions. The primary duty of the county prosecutor is enforcing the penal provisions in state law. That authority is protected from intermeddling by state officials and has been affirmed by the Idaho Supreme Court. Creating concurrent authority with state officials to prosecute crimes can unnecessarily blur otherwise clear responsibilities in law and increases the likelihood of jurisdictional squabbles. Consequently, I would be disinclined to support future proposals that might erode local control in this area.

Moreover, I view Section 26 of this bill as largely superfluous. Section 31-2603(b) already provides the legal framework in any criminal case—not just human trafficking cases—for counties to seek prosecutorial assistance from the Attorney General. The required biennial report in this section would be best assigned to the Idaho Statistical Analysis Center at the Idaho State Police which for decades has prepared reports on crime and law enforcement in Idaho. By law, POST handles law enforcement training. If general funds to support law enforcement training for human trafficking are warranted, I believe POST Council is best equipped to collaborate with all stakeholders to develop and carry out that training.

Given these observations, I would encourage the Legislature to be particularly thoughtful about the fiscal note of this bill. There is no need to hastily grow state government over duplicative provisions tucked in a single section of an otherwise commendable bill.

I strongly disagree with the assertion this bill would have no fiscal impact. This bill is a sea change in legislative policy that will subject every procurement award to potential litigation and lead to significant delays in implementing contracts for critical products and services.

I fully support efforts to improve transparency, accountability, and credibility in state purchasing operations. However, this bill swings the pendulum to the opposite end of the spectrum, which I fear will primarily benefit litigation attorneys and unsuccessful bidders. This bill will be counterproductive to ongoing efforts and investments to improve purchasing efficiency and will significantly impact already strained staff resources. I urge all stakeholders to closely watch how the implementation of this bill negatively impacts purchasing operations, and I fully expect ongoing delays and setbacks in the award and implementation of contracts as a result of this bill.
