Chairman Weber called the meeting to order at 8:31 a.m.

MOTION: Rep. Burns made a motion to approve the minutes of the February 21, 2024

meeting. Motion carried by voice vote.

RS 31210: Rep. Boyle presented RS 31210, which will allow county Sheriff's offices to be

reimbursed from state funds for the cost of transporting a prisoner, probationer or parolee who has absconded from the Idaho Department of Correction or Idaho

Commission of Pardons and Parole.

MOTION: Rep. Dixon (1) made a motion to introduce RS 31210. Motion carried by voice

vote.

RS 31422: Rep. Petzke presented RS 31422, relating to the signature verification process for

statewide referendums. Rep. Petzke stated the proposed legislation will institute a monthly submission schedule versus submitting them all at the end. It will also extend the verification period to 90 days and create a 60-day review period to

enhance civic engagement and accountability.

MOTION: Rep. Dixon (1) made a motion to introduce RS 31422.

In answer to questions from the committee, **Rep. Petzke** explained the signature gathering process will be 17 months instead of 18 months; signatures will be required to be turned in monthly for those gathered in the previous month; and signatures will be invalid if turned in after the monthly deadline. This is being done to help the Secretary of State Office balance workload, especially as the state is

growing. More signatures take longer to verify.

Committee discussion opposed to the motion included expressions of concern the proposed legislation creates another barrier for citizens, it shuts down casual signature gatherers and deserves more time for examination than a late session introduction allows. Discussion in support of the motion, included appreciation for the RS to create some relief for the those verifying signatures, as there is a

preference the referendum process would go away.

VOTE ON MOTION:

Motion carried by voice vote. Reps. Rubel, Necochea and Burns requested to be recorded as voting NAY.

RS 31453: Rep. Blanksma presented RS 31453, which creates a rebuttable presumption

of adequate warning with regard to U.S. EPA approved warning labels with the carcinogenicity classification. It applies to two sections of Idaho Code: Title 22, which references agriculture, and Title 48, which references trade practices.

MOTION: Rep. Manwaring made a motion to introduce RS 31453. Motion carried by voice

vote.

RS 31479: Rep. Redman presented RS 31479, which directs the Department of Health and

Welfare set up a pilot program to track and share data with local law enforcement

and health districts for new incidents and emergence of illicit drugs.

In answer to questions from the committee, **Rep. Redman** stated he is not aware of whether there is a definition for "de-identified" in code, but his understanding is there are new drug compounds that are often mixed and may not yet be known or identified pharmaceutically. The committee recommended the definition be included

in the RS as it moves forward.

MOTION: Rep. Rubel made a motion to introduce RS 31479. Motion carried by voice vote.

RS 31498: Rep. Shepherd presented RS 31498, which is a joint memorial supporting the

relicensing process to Idaho Power, but it also requests the Hells Canyon Dam complex be maintained at a minimum of 8,500 CFS from May 15 to October 1 for the benefit of Idaho residents as it relates to recreation, water temperatures, fisheries and electricity production. Rep. Shepherd explained this may be some burden on Idaho Power, but water level fluctuations and timing of those fluctuations

are creating an almost inoperable situation for Idaho's outfitters and guides.

MOTION: Rep. Rubel made a motion to introduce RS 31498.

In answer to questions from the committee, **Rep. Shepherd** stated there has been a short conversation with Idaho Power, as there will likely be a small impact to

their bottom line.

VOTE ON Motion carried by voice vote. MOTION:

RS 31472: Rep. Erickson presented RS 31472, which will make it possible for inmates hired

by private employers under the Department of Correction's work release program to

earn similar salary and benefits as other similarly situated employees.

MOTION: Rep. Burns made a motion to introduce RS 31472.

Committee discussion focused on concern this requirement may discourage

employers from participating in the program.

VOTE ON Motion carried by voice vote. MOTION:

RS 31289C1: Rep. Manwaring presented RS 31289C1, which provides for expedited judicial

review of state purchasing decisions. It also pauses the deadline to submit an administrative appeal until public records related to the purchasing decision are

provided, pursuant to the Public Records Act.

MOTION: Rep. Dixon (1) made a motion to introduce RS 31289C1. Motion carried by voice.

Chairman Weber turned the gavel over to Rep. Monks.

RS 31515: Chairman Weber presented RS 31515, and explained it gives property rights back

to homeowners by giving them representation on their homeowner's association (HOA) board when 75% of their development is built out and occupied. It also outlines the process for turning total control of the HOA board over to homeowners

once the development is 95% built out.

MOTION: Rep. Manwaring made a motion to introduce RS 31515.

In answer to a question from the committee, **Rep. Weber** stated subsection 55-3204B comes into play after the requirements of subsection 55-3204A are met.

VOTE ON MOTION:	Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Monks turned the gavel over to Chairman Weber.
