6	TIME IN THE MOUNTAIN TIME ZONE PORTION OF IDAHO AND TO PROVIDE THAT THE
7	STATE OF IDAHO SHALL CONFORM TO ANY FEDERAL LAW THAT MAKES DAYLIGHT
8	SAVING TIME PERMANENT; AMENDING CHAPTER 1, TITLE 73, IDAHO CODE, BY THE
9	ADDITION OF A NEW SECTION 73-124, IDAHO CODE, TO PROVIDE AN EXEMPTION
10	FROM DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME IN THE PACIFIC TIME ZONE PORTION OF IDAHO AND
11	TO PROVIDE THAT THE STATE OF IDAHO SHALL CONFORM TO ANY FEDERAL LAW THAT
12	MAKES DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME PERMANENT; AND PROVIDING CONTINGENCY EFFEC-
13	TIVE DATES.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT. The Legislature finds and declares that:

- (1) Changing clocks between Standard Time and Daylight Saving Time is disruptive to health, safety, education, and the economy.
- (2) Federal law permits observance of only permanent Standard Time by a state exempting itself from Daylight Saving Time as the alternative to biannual changing of clocks.
- (3) Permanent Daylight Saving Time has been repealed in the past due to its harm to health, safety, education, and the economy soon after its trials during World War II and the Oil Crisis of the 1970s.
- (4) Permanent Standard Time has historically proven to exist without incident for decades.
- (5) The American Academy of Sleep Medicine, the National Sleep Foundation, the Sleep Research Society, and the Society for Research on Biological Rhythms advise against permanent Daylight Saving Time and recommend permanent Standard Time.
  - (6) Standard Time is intended to approximate natural solar time.
- (7) Coordination with contiguous states regarding timekeeping is essential to convenience of commerce.
- SECTION 2. That Chapter 96, Title 67, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby repealed.
  - SECTION 3. That Chapter 1, Title 73, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended by the addition thereto of a <u>NEW SECTION</u>, to be known and designated as Section 73-123, Idaho Code, and to read as follows:
- 73-123. EXEMPTION FROM DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME IN THE MOUNTAIN TIME ZONE PORTION. (1) The state of Idaho hereby exempts the portion of the state that

is in the mountain time zone from the daylight saving time provisions of 15 U.S.C. 260a.

- (2) If the United States congress enacts legislation to mandate permanent daylight saving time in a majority of all states, the state of Idaho shall conform to such new federal law.
- SECTION 4. That Chapter 1, Title 73, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended by the addition thereto of a <u>NEW SECTION</u>, to be known and designated as Section 73-124, Idaho Code, and to read as follows:
- 73-124. EXEMPTION FROM DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME IN THE PACIFIC TIME ZONE PORTION. (1) The state of Idaho hereby exempts the portion of the state that is in the Pacific time zone from the daylight saving time provisions of 15 U.S.C. 260a.
- (2) If the United States congress enacts legislation to mandate permanent daylight saving time in a majority of all states, the state of Idaho shall conform to such new federal law.

SECTION 5. Section 3 of this act shall be in full force and effect on and after January 1 of the first year following or coinciding with effectuation of exemption from Daylight Saving Time in the portion of the state of Oregon that is in the Mountain Time Zone. Sections 2 and 4 of this act shall be in full force and effect on and after January 1 of the first year following or coinciding with effectuation of exemption from Daylight Saving Time in the state of Washington.
