9	CODE, TO ESTABLISH PROVISIONS REGARDING THE ADULT ALTERNATIVE INSTRUC-
10	TIONAL DIPLOMA PROGRAM FUND; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY AND PROVIDING

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 1, Title 33, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended by the addition thereto of a NEW SECTION, to be known and designated as Section 33-143, Idaho Code, and to read as follows:

- 33-143. ADULT ALTERNATIVE INSTRUCTIONAL DIPLOMA PROGRAM. (1) The adult alternative instructional diploma program is hereby established for the purpose of assisting adults twenty-one (21) years of age or older in obtaining a high school diploma and developing employability and career technical skills.
 - (2) For the purpose of this section:
 - (a) "Accredited" means holding an active accreditation recognized by the state board of education.
 - (b) "Career pathways coursework" means one (1) or more courses that help a student enter or advance within a specific occupation or occupational cluster.
 - (c) "Employability skills certification" means a certificate earned by demonstrating professional, nontechnical skills through assessment and shall include but not be limited to the program standards of the United States department of labor's "skills to pay the bills: mastering soft skills for workplace success" program.
 - (d) "High school diploma" means a diploma issued by an accredited institution. A diploma issued pursuant to the provisions of this section is recognized as a secondary school diploma by the state of Idaho.
 - "Qualified provider" means a public, nonprofit, or other entity that meets the requirements of subsection (3) of this section. A qualified provider may not receive funding for a student under this section if the qualified provider receives federal or state funding or private tuition for that student.
 - (f) "Student" means a participant in the adult alternative instructional diploma program who is twenty-one (21) years of age or older, who is a resident of Idaho, and who has not yet earned a high school diploma.

- (g) "Workforce credential" means a third-party credential that either is part of a sequence of credentials that can be accumulated over time to build an individual's qualifications to advance along a career pathway and results in a certificate or verifies an individual's qualification or competence and that is issued by a third party with the relevant authority to issue such credential.
- (3) On or before August 1, a prospective qualified provider shall file an application with the state board of education, on a form prescribed by the state board of education, that includes all information required under the provisions of this subsection. After the state board of education verifies that the applicant meets the criteria established in this subsection, it shall approve the applicant as a qualified provider. The state board of education shall publish and maintain a list of all such qualified providers, and shall announce the qualified providers no later than August 31. Qualified providers that do not meet minimum standards for two (2) consecutive years shall be removed for the approved list. Qualified providers for adult alternative instructional programs include public, nonprofit, or other qualified entities that:
 - (a) Are regionally accredited entities that grant high school diplomas;
 - (b) Have a minimum of two (2) years of experience providing adult dropout recovery services;
 - (c) Have the ability to:

- (i) Provide academic skills intake assessments and transcript evaluations;
- (ii) Develop a learning plan for each student that integrates course and credit requirements for graduation and career goals;
- (iii) Provide remediation opportunities in literacy and numeracy;
- (iv) Provide an employability skills certification;
- (v) Provide career pathways coursework; and
- (vi) Provide preparation for workforce credentials; and
- (d) Have a minimum of fifty percent (50%) graduation rate for each two-year cohort of students served.
- (4) (a) The state board of education shall reimburse qualified providers an amount equal to seven hundred thirty-three dollars (\$733) for each credit of high school instruction provided by such qualified providers and completed by a student.
- (b) After twelve (12) consecutive months, each qualified provider shall provide the following data outcomes to the state board of education:
 - (i) The average number of credits needed to meet state course and credit requirements for graduation upon enrollment;
 - (ii) The average number of credits earned by students enrolled within a twelve (12) month period; and
 - (iii) The average number of credits earned by students who meet the state graduation course and credit requirements within a twelve (12) month period.
- (5) On or before February 1 of the second fiscal year of the program, qualified providers shall report the following required information to the state board of education:

- (a) The total number of students for whom the qualified provider has received payments;
 - (b) The total number of credits earned by students for whom the qualified provider is receiving payments; and
 - (c) The total number of students for whom the qualified provider is receiving payments who received high school diplomas.
- (6) The state board of education shall promulgate rules, subject to legislative approval, to carry out the provisions of this section.
- SECTION 2. That Chapter 9, Title 33, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended by the addition thereto of a $\underline{\text{NEW SECTION}}$, to be known and designated as Section 33-919, Idaho Code, and to read as follows:
- 33-919. ADULT ALTERNATIVE INSTRUCTIONAL DIPLOMA PROGRAM FUND. (1) There is hereby created in the state treasury the adult alternative instructional diploma program fund. Moneys in the fund shall be used to create a pilot program for the issuance of accredited high school diplomas for adults twenty-one (21) years of age or older pursuant to section 33-143, Idaho Code.
- (2) Moneys in the fund shall be subject to legislative appropriation and shall consist of:
 - (a) Legislative transfers and appropriations; and
 - (b) Interest earned on idle moneys in the fund.

 SECTION 3. An emergency existing therefor, which emergency is hereby declared to exist, this act shall be in full force and effect on and after July 1, 2025.
