SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 109

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1 STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE RESOLVING THAT A CONDITION OF EX-
 2 TREME PERIL EXISTS IN AND AROUND THE WATER BODIES OF THE STATE
 3 OF IDAHO, PROCLAIMING THAT A STATE OF EMERGENCY EXISTS WITHIN
 4 THE STATE OF IDAHO AND ASKING THAT DEFICIENCY WARRANT FUNDING
 5 AUTHORIZED BY THE IDAHO INVASIVE SPECIES ACT OF 2008, BE USED BY
 6 THE IDAHO STATE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE FOR PERSONNEL, EQUIP-
 7 MENT AND FACILITIES FOR THE PERFORMANCE OF ANY AND ALL ACTIV-
 8 ITIES ASSOCIATED WITH QUAGGA AND ZEBRA MUSSEL PREVENTION, DE-
 9 VELOPMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION OF INCIDENT RESPONSE PLANS AND
 10 INTERAGENCY AGREEMENTS.

12 Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

13 WHEREAS, invasive species are a real and imminent danger to Idaho. Two nonnative
 14 species, quagga and zebra mussels, are moving inexorably toward Idaho; and

15 WHEREAS, quagga and zebra mussels were introduced to the Great Lakes in the late
 16 1980s and have been a major fouling organism, causing billions of dollars in damage in that
 17 region; and

18 WHEREAS, the mussels were first detected in the West in 2007, and have rapidly ex-
 19 panded from Lake Mead, Nevada to California, Colorado, Arizona and Utah and, although the
 20 mussels are not yet established in Idaho, the waters of our state are extremely vulnerable; and

21 WHEREAS, should quagga and zebra mussels become established in Idaho, the financial
 22 impact to the region’s extensive hydropower system and irrigated agriculture could exceed \$90
 23 million annually due to the mussel’s capacity to clog pipes, pumps and delivery systems; and

24 WHEREAS, the mussels also damage the hulls, props, and motors of boats and other
 25 watercraft, imposing additional costs and burdens on recreational boaters and would diminish
 26 the attraction of water-based recreation in Idaho.

27 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of
 28 the Sixtieth Idaho Legislature, the Senate and the House of Representatives concurring therein,
 29 that given the urgency of the situation, and in light of the aforementioned, a condition of ex-
 30 treme peril exists in and around the water bodies of the state of Idaho.

31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the ability of the agencies and department of the state
 32 of Idaho to effectively prevent and control the spread of these mussels in the state is limited
 33 and, accordingly, under the authority of the Invasive Species Act of 2008, we proclaim that a
 34 state of emergency exists within the state of Idaho.

35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we ask that deficiency warrant funding authorized by
 36 the Idaho Invasive Species Act of 2008, be used by the Idaho state department of agriculture
 37 for personnel, equipment and facilities for the performance of any and all activities associ-
 38 ated with quagga and zebra mussel prevention, development and implementation of incident
 39 response plans and interagency agreements.
