A PROCLAMATION

1 COMMENDING RONALD L. HATZENBUEHLER, PH.D.

3 We, the members of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Idaho as-
4 sembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixtieth Idaho Legislature, honor Ronald L. Hatzen-
5 buehler, Ph.D., the 2008 recipient of the Idaho Humanities Council Outstanding Achievement
6 in the Humanities Award.

7 WHEREAS, Ronald L. Hatzenbuehler, Ph.D., has taught at Idaho State University since
8 1972, after earning M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in history at Kent State University; and

9 WHEREAS, in addition to a teaching career of nearly four decades, Dr. Hatzenbuehler
10 has written and lectured to the general public on Idaho population trends, migration, political
11 history and the legacies of presidents; and

12 WHEREAS, Dr. Hatzenbuehler has served as an historian and consultant for many grass-
13 roots humanities projects and programs throughout Southeastern Idaho and has participated in
14 many humanities workshops, institutes and conferences; and

15 WHEREAS, Dr. Hatzenbuehler has served as a scholar in a number of Idaho Humanities
16 Council and Idaho State Historical Society summer institutes for teachers of grades K through
17 12, lecturing on the United States Constitution, the Bill of Rights, Idaho history and the Lewis
18 and Clark Expedition; and

19 WHEREAS, over the years, Dr. Hatzenbuehler has served on the advisory boards for the
20 Idaho State University Press, the Idaho State University magazine "Rendezvous" and for the
21 Idaho State Historical Society magazine "Idaho Yesterdays"; and

22 WHEREAS, in 2006, Dr. Hatzenbuehler published "'I Tremble for My Country':
23 Thomas Jefferson and the Virginia Gentry" to much critical praise.

24 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED by the members of the Senate and the
25 House of Representatives assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixtieth Idaho Legis-
26 lature, that the state of Idaho honors the life and achievements of Ronald L. Hatzenbuehler,
27 Ph.D., and congratulates him for being the 2008 recipient of the Idaho Humanities Council Out-
28 standing Achievement in the Humanities Award.
