Dear Ms. Gerrity,

After listening to all the arguments about the federal lands in Idaho at the committee hearing on December 12, I still favor Idaho control of the lands, and the revenue there-from. In my opinion, Idaho could manage the land better than a distant bureaucracy in Washington, specially in fire prevention.

However, I still have some questions. Perhaps the chairman could answer them. Senator Winder is my Senator from District 20. As I said in my presentation, in the US Constitution, Article 1, section 8, the States gave the federal government "authority over all Places purchased by the consent of the Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be". See copies of the Constitution enclosed. My question is did the federal government purchase the lands it now owns? Did it pay Idaho for the lands? If not, could Idaho bill the federal government for payment plus interest, or foreclose on the lands for non-payment?

Also, one presenter said if Idaho gained ownership of the lands and sold any of it, 95% of the proceeds of the sale must be given to the federal government. Is this true? Is there any way to avoid this? If true, the main gain from a sale would be putting the land on the local tax rolls. Strict conditions could be applied to any sale of land, such as access, conservation, etc. to satisfy all objections to the sale.

Article 1 U.S. Constitution

the President of the United States; and before the Same shall take Effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the Rules and Limitations prescribed in the Case of a Bill.

Section. 8. The Congress shall have Power To lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common Defence and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uni-

form throughout the United States;

To borrow Money on the credit of the United

States;
To regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes:

To establish an uniform Rule of Naturalization, and uniform Laws on the subject of Bankruptcies throughout the United States;

To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures;

To provide for the Punishment of counterfeiting the Securities and current Coin of the United States;

To establish Post Offices and post Roads;

To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries;

To constitute Tribunals inferior to the supreme

Court;

To define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offenses against the Law of Nations;

To declare War, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water; To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years;

To provide and maintain a Navy;

To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces;

To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections and repel Invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining, the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercise exclusive Legislation in all Cases whatsoever, over such District (not exceeding ten Miles square) as may, by Cession of particular States, and the Acceptance of Congress, become the Seat of the Government of the United States, and to exercise like Authority over all Places purchased by the Consent of the Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be, for the Erection of Forts, Magazines, Arsenals, dock-Yards and other needful Buildings;—And

To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.

Section. 9. The Migration or Importation of such Persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a Tax or duty may be imposed on such Importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each Person.
