JRI Strategies...

1. Strengthen supervision practices and programs to reduce recidivism.
2. Tailor sanctions for supervision violations, provide recidivism outcomes for sentencing, and structure parole to make more productive use for prison space.
3. Assess, track, and ensure impact of recidivism-reduction strategies.

Justice reinvestment is a data-driven approach to improve public safety, reduce corrections and related criminal justice spending, and reinvest savings in strategies that can decrease crime and reduce recidivism.

Strategy #3

Program Evaluation Report

Assess, track, and ensure impact of recidivism-reduction strategies.

The report must include: 1) an evaluation of the quality of each recidivism reduction program; 2) the program's likelihood to reduce recidivism among program participants; and 3) a plan for program improvements from the Board of Correction.

Strategy #3

Gap Analysis

Assess, track, and ensure impact of recidivism-reduction strategies.

Senate Bill 1357 section 20-216

January 15th of each year IDOC and Health Welfare will submit a "Gap Analysis" analyzing the following;

Criminogenic needs of active probationers and parolees;

Current funding available to deliver effective, evidenced-based programming to address those needs;

And any gap in funding to meet treatment needs of all moderate and high risk probationers and parolees.

Strategy #3

150% Report

Senate Bill 1357, section 12 20-223

Assess, track, and ensure impact of recidivism-reduction strategies.

By February 1, 2015, and by February 1 of each year thereafter, the department of correction and the commission shall submit a report to the legislature and governor that describes the percentage of people sentenced to a term in prison for a property or drug offense conviction who are released before serving one hundred fifty percent (150%) of the fixed portion of the sentence, and that documents the most common reasons for people whose release was delayed or denied.
