



Quality and Impact of WWAMI

- 51% Retention rate (Idaho graduates)
- 75% Return on Investment (all WWAMI graduates)
- Provides access to public medical education to Idaho citizens with the #1 ranked medical school for primary care, family medicine, and rural medicine. US News and World Reports, 2015

•72% state appropriations spent in Idaho


For each dollar invested in WWAMI, Idaho gets
\$5 back into the state economy








Medical Education FY16-Cost per Student



Medical Education FY16-Cost per Capita



Idaho State Board of Education Medical Education Subcommittee

Recommendations 2009:

- Increase Idaho WWAMI students from 20 to 40/yr
- Encourage admissions committee to select students likely to practice in primary care and rural Idaho
- Ensure students get rural clinical training experiences







Class Expansion

- **1972**-2012: 20 or fewer students/class
- **2013**: 25 students in entering class
- **2014**: 30 students in entering class
- **2015**: 35 students in entering class
- **2016**: proposed expansion to 40 students








TRUST Targeted Rural Underserved Track

- Selects Idaho students with rural background or interest
- Matches one Idaho student with one Idaho rural/underserved community
- Prepares students for residencies in rural/underserved practice









Rural Physician Incentive Program

- Idaho students at UWSOM and UUSOM pay into fund that is known as RPIP
- Legislation passed in 2015: Physicians may receive a maximum of \$100,000 over a four year period.
- Preference is given to eligible physicians who paid into the RPIP fund, however, funding is not limited to these candidates.
