



# Fact Sheet

## Education

January, 2018

The Robert Janss School (RJS) is the organizational structure for educational teaching and learning in the Department of Correction. The Department has demonstrated a strong and continued commitment to inmate employment training with an emphasis on soft skills.

### By the Numbers

- 14% (236) of the 1724 inmates enrolled in education classes during any given week are assessed below the 6<sup>th</sup> grade level
- 45.1% of the incarcerated population are between the ages of 18-34 years
- Gender of the population – 9.2% female and 90.8% male
- 74.7% of the incarcerated population are white – 16.5% are Hispanic
- 49.5% of inmates enter prison without a GED or high school diploma
- 19.1% of inmates earn a GED in prison
- Average reading level of currently incarcerated inmates is 10.3 and 8.5 in math
- 23 current IDOC apprenticeship programs (22 through Correctional Industries and 1 through Education)
- Parolees receiving recent educational programming and released past one year were half as likely to return to incarceration as the general population of parolees. Inmates who participated in education classes have a recidivism rate of 25.7% compared to inmates who did not participate in correctional education – recidivating at 37.6%.

### PreRelease

The Prerelease Program provides inmates with the opportunity to learn the skills of communication, personal goal setting, attitudes they need to maintain strong family ties, find and keep good jobs, and manage their finances. The curriculum consists of three components – the Prerelease Manual addressing areas of life skills, Education/Career Planning aligned with the Department of Labor’s Career Information Services software and leads inmates through career exploration, resume writing, job application and interview skills and finally Computer Literacy.

“I’ve learned how to apply for jobs, how to interview for jobs,” an inmate shared in a post class evaluation. “I like computers. I never knew you could do all this stuff (on computers) because I only saw them being used by my aunties for chatting with men.

### Employability Skills Framework

Career technical program advisory committees have stated the need for “soft skills” training for offender students, in addition to their skill of trade. The top three most important skills identified by employers are:

- Ability to work in teams
- Ability to make decisions/solve problems
- Ability to communicate inside/outside organization

The Employability Skills Framework is broad enough to fit all classrooms. By integrating employability skills into academic and technical skill instruction, all students are receiving instruction in preparation for the job market and release.
