National Occupational Learning Consortium Membership

Benefits:

- Action plan development and implementation: internal policy discussions facilitated by staff from NCSL, the National Governors Association and the Council of State Governments.
- *Structured interstate networking and idea sharing*: national meetings, policy news and updates via webinar and email, and a policy message board provided for Consortium members.
- Advanced in-state technical assistance: specially tailored meetings organized in each member state with the support of NCSL, NGA and CSG to hear from national experts on specific questions and develop policy with key stakeholders.
- *On-demand access to licensing policy experts*: committed advisory group of national experts on occupational licensing prepared to assist member states whenever they are needed.

Outcomes:

- In first year of Consortium, 83 licensing reform bills were enacted across the ten Consortium member states that held legislative session.
- After being admitted to the Consortium, member states were over 40 percent more likely to pass proposed licensing legislation compared to non-member states, on average.

Commitment:

- The Consortium is funded through 2020.
- Each member state is expected to establish a team of seven policymakers.
- State teams are expected to attend national meetings and convene in-state meetings.
- State teams are expected to develop and implement an action plan for licensing policy change.
