



IDAHO STATE MUSEUM, October 2019

As of the October 2019 anniversary of its first year, the Museum has shared Idaho's story with over 60,000 visitors, including 50,000 general visitors and over 10,000 students, including National History in Idaho kids, and public program participants engaged in field trips, workshops, day camps and an array of educational programming.

Visitors consider the museum a trusted source of information about Idaho's land, water, and people; visitors make clear connections between today's issues and historical events; are prideful in Idaho; feel the museum is essential to promoting Idahoans' common identity; want to travel more to other regions of the state; and have desire to learn more about our great state.

Visitors overwhelmingly indicate, that as a direct result of their experience, they feel a greater respect for Idaho's Native People. There is strong visitor interest for future programming and exhibitions about Native People.

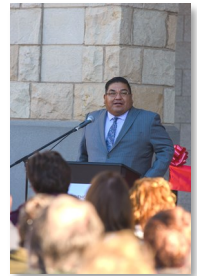

The Idaho State Historical Society was a lead partner in hosting the Western Museums Association 2019. Shoshone Paiute Chairman Ted Howard was introduced by Governor Little and presented the opening blessing.
