

Statewide Single Audit Report

Overview

- Idaho receives federal assistance categorized by an assistance listing number, formerly known as the CFDA number
- These numbers are important because that is how we identify the purpose and uses, grant requirements, terms, funding, etc.
- We call each of these programs and while some of them are "clustered" together to form one larger program for compliance considerations, most are considered individually for compliance with federal requirements
- Federal requirements are communicated in the grant agreement and award documentation including terms and conditions
- Auditors completing required single audits of any nonfederal entity spending more than \$750,000 of federal assistance also utilize a compliance supplement that identifies 14 compliance requirements and suggested audit procedures to determine compliance
- Federal grantors may also review or audit a program at their discretion

Main Types of Federal Grants


- Formula grants: uses formulas determined by congress to allocate an overall amount, and typically requires an application to ensure the entity meets the specific requirements, but is not subject to a competitive process
- Discretionary grants: awarded using a competitive process, these are often called project grants or cooperative agreements


FY 2010 - 72% of programs are administered by 10 agencies 328 of 452 \$3.356 billion in total Federal assistance

Federal Programs

FY 2021 - 79% of programs are administered by 10 agencies 316/405 \$5.993 billion in total Federal assistance

CFDA/Assistance Listing Information

Guidance Included in Grant Information

- Identifying federal policy requirements starts by identify the specific program of interest from the SEFA and then gathering requirement information from the CFDA/assistance listing (SAM.gov) including:
 - Objectives of the program
 - Program description
 - Authorizing legislation
 - Eligibility
 - Other applicable requirements such as "all participating schools and institutions must agree to operate a nonprofit food service that is available to all children regardless of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or disability."

Compliance Supplement

- The Compliance Supplement is issued each year by the Office of Management and Budget
- It is intended to assist auditors in performing required audits as described in 2 CFR Part 200 Subpart F
- The Supplement is a document that identifies existing, important compliance requirements that the federal government expects to be considered as part of an audit required by the 1996 Amendments to the Single Audit Act.
- Without the Supplement, auditors would need to research many laws and regulations for each program under audit to determine which compliance requirements are important to the federal government and could have both a direct and material effect on a program
- We utilize this supplement to complete the audit of federal assistance received by the state of Idaho each year, and determine compliance with federal requirements
- Throughout the Supplement, the word "must," when used in conjunction with auditor responsibilities, means that the auditor is required to do what the statement indicates. Use of the term "should" when addressing auditor responsibilities indicates a recommended action or approach

Uniform Guidance-Post Federal Award Requirements

2 CFR 200, Subpart D 200.300— 200.346

- The 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart D, describes post federal award requirements
- 2 CFR 200.300 (a) The Federal awarding agency must manage and administer the Federal award in a manner so as to ensure that Federal funding is expended and associated programs are implemented in full accordance with the U.S. Constitution, Federal Law, and public policy requirements: Including, but not limited to, those protecting free speech, religious liberty, public welfare, the environment, and prohibiting discrimination. The federal awarding agency must communicate all relevant public policy requirements, including those in general appropriations provisions, and incorporate them either directly or by reference in the terms and conditions of the federal award
- 2 CFR 200.300 (b) The non-federal entity (state) is responsible for complying with all requirements of the federal award.
- 2 CFR 200.339 If a non-Federal entity fails to comply with the U.S. Constitution, Federal statutes, regulations or the terms and conditions of a Federal award, the Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity may impose additional conditions, as described in 2 CFR 200.208

2 CFR 200.211

Information contained in a Federal Award

- A Federal award must include the following information:
- (c) General terms and conditions
 - (1) Federal awarding agencies must incorporate the following general terms and conditions either in the Federal award or by reference, as applicable:
 - (i) Administrative requirements implemented by the Federal awarding agency as specified in this part
 - (ii) National policy requirements including statutory, <u>executive order</u>, <u>other Presidential directive</u>, or regulatory requirements that apply by specific reference and are not program-specific.

Replacing Federal Funds with State Funds

If the Legislature chooses to replace some federal funds with state funds, here are some things to consider:

Formula grants are based on a set amount that is allocated through the application of a formula, so if Idaho did not apply, the granting agency would just allocate a larger amount to other participating states

If we terminate a current formula funded grant agreement, a different State agency could be eligible to initiate a new agreement and receive the allocation for that program

Competitive grants are typically allocated based on an overall amount the federal grantor has available and a competitive evaluation of the application, if Idaho didn't apply, the funds we might have gotten wouldn't necessarily be reallocated

Application periods and obligation periods of the award and length of the grant would need to be considered

Additional laws that may be applicable to overall funding from specific federal agencies (such as Title IX requirements), but should be referenced in the current terms and conditions

Review of selected programs terms and conditions and assistance listing information to identify appropriate information
