

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Audit Findings: SFY 2019-2021

<u>Finding #1</u>- The cash balance for Real Estate Commission, Division of Building Safety, and Board of Medicine exceeds reserves necessary for normal operating cash needs.

<u>Corrective Action Plan #1-</u> DOPL will evaluate cash balances and maintain balances that are adequate to cover agency obligations but are not excessive in nature.

<u>Finding #2</u>- Supporting documentation was unavailable or inadequate for receipt and expenditure testing for the newly assigned entities.

<u>Corrective Action Plan #2-</u> After the consolidation, DOPL started using the Statewide Accounting System (SAS) for accounts payable, receivable and adjustments and attaching supporting documentation as required.

<u>Finding #3</u>- Fees charged at the Board of Professional Engineers and Professional Land Surveyors were not adequately supported to show they were in accordance with State statute.

<u>Corrective Action Plan #3-</u> DOPL is currently attaching a detailed licensing report to the monthly revenue adjustment, tying revenue back to what is posted in the Statewide Accounting and Reporting System (STARS).

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

Licensing Information System \$6,054,000



License Information System

- From the 2022 Legislative Session, DOPL received spending authority in the amount of \$6,054,000 from dedicated funds to procure a License Information System (LIS).
- The appropriation was for the implementation of the LIS and estimated to cover 2.5 state fiscal years running from 2023 to 2025. The definitive timeline will result from the award.
- DOPL's appropriation for the project does not include ongoing maintenance and support costs; DOPL plans to return to JFAC in 2024 to request ongoing spending authority.
- The state procurement process resulted in an Invitation to Negotiate (ITN) and is meeting key milestones:



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Replacement Items

One-time spending authority for replacing 27 vehicles, 71 computers, 60 docking stations, 20 monitors, 2 network routers, 4 wireless access points, 4 room controllers, 4 LCD Monitors at a total cost of \$998,700 from dedicated funds
