CONVENED: Chairman Hartgen called the meeting of the Senate Agricultural Affairs Committee

(Committee) to order at 8:00 a.m.

RS 30228 Relating to Fences. Senator Harris reported the purpose of this Legislation was

due to the increased conflict and frustration around the state of Idaho with livestock on state highways and, in grain fields. Owners had permitted their livestock to roam without making efforts to contain them and repair their fences. Instead using Open Range law as the answer to why livestock was roaming free. He stated **RS 30228** was specifically focused on the barbed wire section of Title 35. **Senator Harris**

requested the Committee send RS 30228 to print.

MOTION: Senator Schroeder moved to approve RS 30228. Senator Taylor seconded the

motion. The motion passed by voice vote.

S 1036 Raw Milk - Amends Existing Law to Revise Provisions Regarding Raw Milk

and Raw Milk Products. Senator Herndon discussed administrative rule 02.04.13 the selling of raw milk and raw milk production. The change included removing the criminal penalty of a misdemeanor to a civil penalty for those not in compliance

with the raw milk statue.

TESTIMONY: Bob Naerebout, Idaho Dairymen's Association, cited he was not in favor of

commercial sale of raw milk. **Mr. Naerebout** mentioned Senator Herdnon approached the Idaho Dairymen's Association and, we support the amended

changes to S 1036.

MOTION: Senator Foreman motioned to approve S 1036. Senator Zuiderveld seconded

the motion. The motion passed by voice vote.

GAVEL:

Chairman Hartgen passed the gavel to Vice Chair Nichols.

DOCKET NO. Rules of the State Of Idaho Board of Veterinary Medicine - Notice of Omnibus 24-3801-2200F Rulemaking (Fee Rule) - Proposed Rule Tim Frost, Deputy Administrator Division

of Occupational and Professional Licenses explained **Docket No. 24-3801-2200F** had a chapter reduction of 30 percent in 2019 and another 30 percent reduction in 2021. The rule had no changes and was approved by the Committee in 2022. **Mr.**

Frost asked the Committee to approve Docket No. 24-3801-2200F.

MOTION: Senator Schroeder moved to approve Docket No. 24-3801-2200F. Senator

Taylor seconded the motion. The motion passed by **voice vote**.

DOCKET NO. 02-0801-2201 Sheep and Goat Rules of the Idaho Sheep and Goat Health Board (New Chapter, Fee Rule) - Temporary and Proposed Rule. Emily Merrigan, Idaho Sheep and Goat Health Board, reviewed Docket No. 02-0801-2201 she stated there were no changes and, it was scheduled to go through negotiated rulemaking in May of 2023. Ms. Merrigan requested the Committee approve Docket No. 22-0801-2201.

MOTION:

Senator Taylor motioned to approve Docket No. 24-0801-2201. Senator **Schroeder** seconded the motion. The motion passed by **voice vote**.

PASSED THE GAVEL:

Vice Chair Nichols passed the gavel back to Chairman Hartgen.

PRESENTATION: Gretchen Hyde, Director, Idaho Rangeland Resources Commission (IRRC) opened with a brief overview of the IRRC funding. The assessment fees were contributed by ranchers and landowners, and were refundable upon request. The assessment fee was set in 1997, and changes on the fee must be Legislatively approved. Furthermore, the IRRC received grants from partners based on its projects and activities. Other revenues came from license plate sales, trespass fines, sales of materials and registration fees from workshops.

> Ms. Hyde talked about IRRC goals to increase public understanding that Idaho's rangeland were a renewable source of important consumer products and environmental values. By the promotion of Idaho's livestock industry she hoped to achieve and maintain a responsible rangeland stewardship through balanced use of rangeland resources.

> Ms. Hyde detailed the Care and Share Campaign. The primary audience was outdoor recreationists who may not be aware of the authorized and historic use of public and private lands for livestock grazing. She mentioned the IRRC produced more than 50 educational videos that feature BLM topics of range monitoring, fire suppression, sage grouse habitat, multi-use land management, post-fire restoration, recreation and, livestock grazing.

Ms. Hyde cited a 2013 Legislation was passed to formalize the Rangeland Fire Protection Association (RFPA). The Idea was to allow ranchers to work together with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and rural fire departments to respond to fires quickly. New procedures were quickly put in place, the BLM and Idaho Department of Lands provided training, start up costs, fire fighting equipment and radios so ranchers could easily respond to wildfires in remote locations. The Department of Lands and the BLM were celebrating the success of the RFPA on its ten year anniversary this year. (Attachment 1)

Senator Carlson inquired if the videos were on the local TV stations or social media to aid the education of rangeland use.

Ms. Hyde responded due to the budget constraints it did not allow TV slots. The IRRC did use social media to get the word out. She mentioned a video on sheep grazing had close to a million hits. People were watching on various social media venues from all over Idaho and, the country.

RS 30295	Concurrent resolution Appointing a Committee to Study Agricultural Issues. Senator Hart reported the purpose of the Committee would be to study the effect of the COVID-19 pandemic on the agriculture sector of Idaho's economy. The last two years Idaho had seen a 50 percent decline in the sector. What could the Legislature do to help Idaho recover from the fertilizer, and egg shortages. Would the vaccine that was used in Australia and New Zealand livestock be used in Idaho and, would people boycott the food products. He mentioned he had more questions than answers. Senator Schroeder questioned Senator Hart if he had discussed with the University of Idaho Department of Agriculture any of the issues. Senator Hart answered he had not discussed the questions with the University of Idaho Department of Agriculture, this was the purpose of the Committee.
