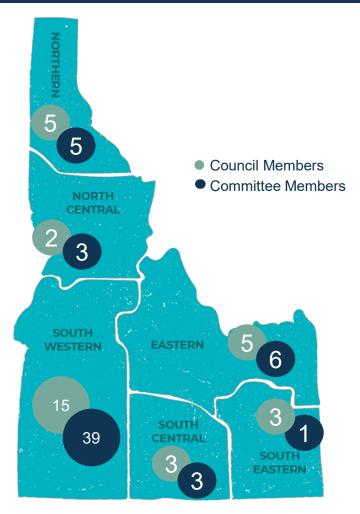

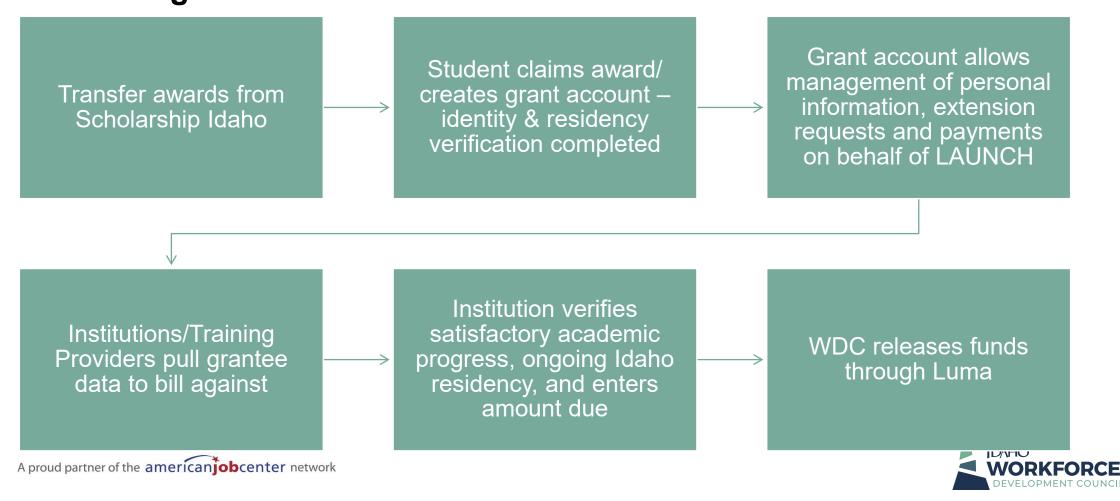

Child Care Expansion Grant Update

Excerpt From 2023 JFAC Presentation/Supporting Documentation:

Anticipated Outcomes

The WDC expected to fund the expansion of 1,000 child care seats with the original \$15M appropriation (2022 Supplemental). As shown on the reverse side, the funding will expand child care capacity by 2,869 seats.

 We were not able to establish a contract with three projects which reduces the total new seats to 2,646.

Potential Changes if Additional Funding is Received

- ✓ Target funds for in-home and/or small providers and provide a higher level of technical support to develop their business plan.
 - Have contracted with WonderSchool to provide support in developing business plans and applying for grants for 50 small providers. Four million set-aside for the contract and grants.
- ✓ Support expansions that will provide care for extended working hours i.e. to help public safety/first responders, shiftwork, etc.
 - Set-aside three million for public safety proposals. Will have awarded funds by end of November.
- ✓ Adjust scoring rubric for different types of providers: small, medium, large, and after-school care. Scoring rubrics are distinct for daycare vs. after-school care. Will review medium and large providers separately from after-school providers.
- Reduce maximum funding per seat and/or maximum cap on grants. Consider different levels for small, medium, large, and after-school care. Alternatively, set funding levels according to project components (i.e. construction vs. renovation vs. expansion into existing suitable space).

 Decided not to pursue these changes.

The three columns on the right are calculations based on the requirements set forth in Section 33-911, Idaho Code (H292); these may or may not be the actual amounts saved/paid by school districts as other funding and support programs can impact the final results. This analysis does not include funding for bond levy equalization or any other support program. This handout does not include levied amounts for the budget stabilization M&O levies that are allowed for in Section 33-802, Idaho Code. This handout uses FY 2023 data as the FY 2024 data is not displaying the full debt for bonds and levies.

Key Terms

- ATR: Additional Tax Relief to all property owners (triggered by state budget surplus)
- HTR: Homeowner Tax Relief to homestead exemptions as of July 10th
- SDFF: School District Facility Fund property tax relief to all homeowners <u>only if school</u> district has a bond or 2 year supplemental levy

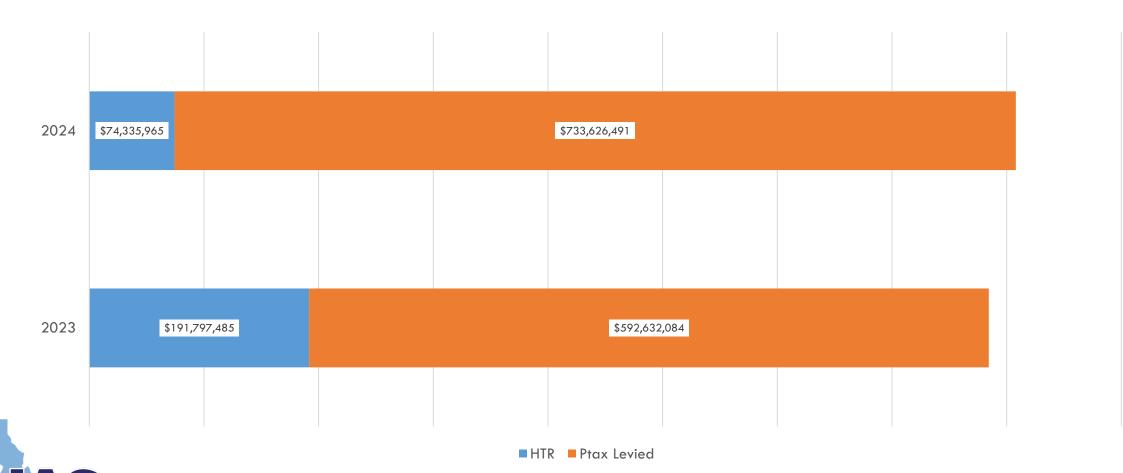


H0292 Tax Relief (2023)

- HTR: \$191,797,484.92
 - ~24.45% of homeowner property taxes
- ATR: \$24,564,356.06
 - ~1.1% of property taxes
- SDFF School Bonds: \$81,921,947
 - ~48.6% of average school bond levies
- SDFF Supplemental Levies: \$22,025,201
 - ~10.1% of supplemental levies
- SDFF Savings (no tax relief): \$2,254,312

Challenges

- Not enough time in the property tax certification calendar (may need to make changes for 2024)
- For the system to work, each and every taxing district must adopt, submit, certify, and correct a budget and correlating levies
- There are 1,000+ taxing districts in Idaho
- If one district has an error, everyone is impacted and a new factor must be created
- There are at least 5 separate tax systems deployed by counties
- ISTC and counties need more staff to support and program information systems



Reconciliation Challenges

- Applying the HTR and ATR factors on a parcel by parcel basis is resulting in +/- for respective parcels
 - After tallying each parcel, counties will have a surplus or a deficit of tax relief funds

Counties submit budget levy data to ISTC ISTC computes tax relief factors (HTR and ATR)

ISTC provides county treasurers with factors County treasurers apply factors to parcel

County treasurer mails out tax notices

Taxpayer pays property taxes

ISTC provides HTR and ATR funding to counties/taxing districts

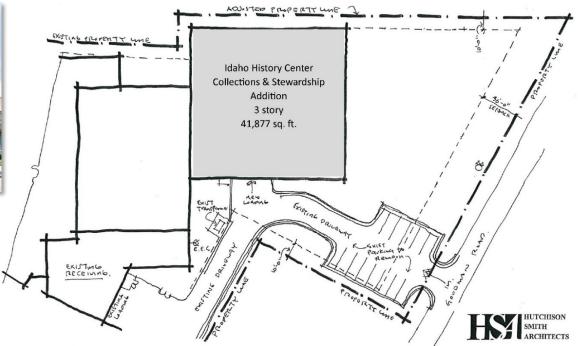

Stewardship of Collections is Essential to Government

Rationale of Consolidated Collections and Archives Stewardship Facility

Adjacency

- Adjacency improves centralized collections management government records, manuscripts, photographs, maps, architectural drawings, artifacts records management
- Adjacency improves collections access for exhibitions (Old Pen, State Museum, Capitol, State Archives)
- Reunites related collections
- Facilitates efficient public access for all agency collections

Achieves standards

- Fire/intrusion protection
- Environmentally controlled- HVAC, air filtration, etc.
- THR N= 68 degrees; 35-45% RH
- Organized
- Access controlled
- Archival materials (boxes, papers, folders, etc.) used for storage, processing, and exhibition
- Meets standards set by the American Alliance of Museums, National Association of Government Archives and Records Administrators, Society of American Archivists

Efficiency

- Reduces number of single, physically separate storage buildings from 3 into one existing State Archives building addition
- Reduces number of facilities that require ongoing maintenance and repair
- Reduces leasing costs
- Leverages existing security presence, existing utilities, infrastructure, parking
- Compact mobile shelving provides 2/3 more space in same footprint

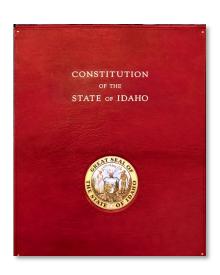

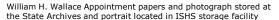

Compact Mobile Shelving Improves Efficiency

- Increases Space nearly doubles storage capacity
- Accessibility & Improve Productivity bringing storage closer to point of need improving efficiency, quick access to stored materials
- Safer Environment safely moves heavy loads and provides enhanced preservation











Standards Ensure Collections Longevity and ISHS Credentials

Environmental Standards include:

- HVAC controls- temperature and relative humidity to minimize fluctuation and maintain a range within 68-74 degrees; 35-45% RH
- Air filtration to remove particulates from the environment
- Lighting to minimize UV damage and fading
- Proper housing of archival and 3 dimensional collections- acid free boxes, paper, and folders; proper shelving lining and padding for fragile materials
