Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

SECTION 1. That Section 33-107, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 33-107. GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE STATE BOARD. The state board shall have power to:
- Perform all duties prescribed for it by the school laws of the (1)state;
- (2) Acquire, hold and dispose of title, rights and interests in real and personal property;
- (3) Have general supervision, through its executive departments and offices, of all entities of public education supported in whole or in part by state funds;
  - (4) (a) Delegate to its executive secretary, to its executive officer, or to such other administrators as the board may appoint, such powers as said officers require to carry out and administer the policies, orders and directives of the board;
  - Delegate to its executive officer, if necessary to enhance effectiveness and efficiency, such powers as he requires to exercise discretionary authority and to perform duties vested in the state board related to the operation, control and management of Idaho's state universities and colleges and other agencies under the supervision and governance of the state board, and to perform duties and render decisions prescribed to the state board involving the exercise of judgment and discretion that affect the public schools in Idaho;
  - (c) Delegate to the presidents of Idaho's state universities and colleges, if necessary to enhance effectiveness and efficiency, such powers as said officers require to exercise discretionary authority and to perform duties vested in the state board related to the operation, control and management of Idaho's state universities and colleges;

- (d) Delegate to its executive secretary, the superintendent of public instruction, if necessary to enhance effectiveness and efficiency, such powers as he requires to perform duties and render decisions prescribed to the state board involving the exercise of judgment and discretion that affect the public schools in Idaho;
- (e) Delegations of powers under this subsection must be adopted as statements of agency action by the state board, as provided in section 33-105(2), Idaho Code, and pursuant to a process that provides for notice, opportunity for input and formal adoption by the state board;
- (5) Through its executive departments and offices:
- (a) Enforce the school laws of the state  $\tau$ ; and

- (b) Study the educational conditions and needs of the state and recommend to the legislature needed changes in existing laws or additional legislation;
- (6) In addition to the powers conferred by chapter 24, title 33, Idaho Code:
  - (a) Maintain a register of postsecondary educational institutions approved to provide programs and courses that lead to a degree or which that provide, offer and sell degrees in accordance with the procedures established in chapter 24, title 33, Idaho Code;
  - (b) Determine whether to accept academic credit at public postsecondary educational institutions in Idaho. Academic credit shall not be transferred into any Idaho public postsecondary institution from a postsecondary educational institution or other entity that is not accredited by an organization recognized by the board, and
  - (c) Maintain a register of proprietary schools approved to conduct, provide, offer or sell a course or courses of study in accordance with the procedures established in chapter 24, title 33, Idaho Code;
- (7) Prescribe the courses and programs of study to be offered at the public institutions of higher education, after consultation with the presidents of the affected institutions;
- (8) Approve new courses and programs of study to be offered at community colleges organized pursuant to chapter 21, title 33, Idaho Code, when the courses or programs of study are academic in nature and the credits derived therefrom are intended to be transferable to other state institutions of higher education for credit toward a baccalaureate degree, and when the courses or programs of study have been authorized by the board of trustees of the community college; and
- (9) Administer the adult workforce high school diploma program in accordance with the provisions of section 33-142, Idaho Code.
- SECTION 2. That Chapter 1, Title 33, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended by the addition thereto of a <u>NEW SECTION</u>, to be known and designated as Section 33-142, Idaho Code, and to read as follows:
- 33-142. ADULT WORKFORCE HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA PROGRAM. (1) The adult workforce high school diploma program is hereby established for the purpose of assisting adults twenty-two (22) years of age or older in obtaining a high school diploma and developing employability and career technical skills. The adult workforce high school diploma program may be delivered

in a campus-based modality, online modality, or a combination of both such modalities.

(2) For the purpose of this section:

- (a) "Academic skills intake assessment" means a criterion-referenced assessment of numeracy and literacy skills with high reliability and validity as determined by third-party research. Assessments can be administered in person or online.
- (b) "Accredited" means holding an active accreditation from a United States regional accreditor, including the:
  - (i) Accrediting commission for community and junior colleges;
  - (ii) Higher learning commission;
  - (iii) Middle states commission on higher education;
  - (iv) New England association of schools and colleges;
  - (v) Northwest commission on colleges and universities;
  - (vi) Southern association of colleges and schools commission on colleges;
  - (vii) Western association of schools and colleges;
  - (viii) Cognia; or
  - (ix) Any successor entities or consolidations of the regional accreditors described in this paragraph.
- (c) "Approved program provider" means a public, nonprofit, or other entity that meets the requirements of subsection (3) of this section. An approved program provider may not receive funding for a student under this section if the approved program provider receives federal or state funding or private tuition for that student.
- (d) "Average cost per graduate" means the total program funding disbursed to an approved program provider for a cohort during the measurement period divided by the total number of students who graduated from the cohort during the measurement period.
- (e) "Career advising services" means services designed to assist students in obtaining employment, including but not limited to resume development and mock interviews.
- (f) "Career pathways coursework" means one (1) or more courses that help a student enter or advance within a specific occupation or occupational cluster.
- (g) "Coaching" means proactive communication between the approved program provider and the student related to the student's pace and progress through the student's learning plan.
- (h) "Cohort" means the students who enter the program between July 1 and June 30 of each program year.
- (i) "Employability skills certification" means a certificate earned by demonstrating professional, nontechnical skills through assessment and shall include but not be limited to the program standards of the United States department of labor's "skills to pay the bills: mastering soft skills for workplace success" program.
- (j) "Graduate" means a student who has successfully completed all of the approved program provider requirements in order to obtain a high school diploma.
- (k) "Graduation rate" means the total number of graduates from a cohort who graduated during the measurement period divided by the total num-

ber of students included in the same cohort for which a provider has received funding.

- (1) "Graduation requirements" means course, credit, and curriculum requirements aligned to the graduation requirements needed to earn a high school diploma from an approved program provider in the state of Idaho.
- (m) "High school diploma" means a diploma issued by an accredited institution. A diploma issued pursuant to the provisions of this section is recognized as a secondary school diploma by the state of Idaho.
- (n) "Learning plan" means a documented plan for courses or credits needed for each individual in order to complete the state course, credit, and curriculum requirements for graduation.
- (o) "Measurement period" means the two (2) year period beginning July 1 of the year the cohort begins the program through June 30 of the subsequent state fiscal year.
- (p) "Mentoring" means a direct relationship between a coach and a student to facilitate the completion of the student's learning plan designed to prepare the student to succeed in the program and the student's future endeavors.
- (q) "Milestones" means objective measures of progress for which payment is made to an approved program provider under this section, including earned units of high school credit, attainment of an employability skills certificate, attainment of workforce credentials, and attainment of an accredited high school diploma.
- (r) "Request for applications" means a request for interested public, nonprofit, or other entities to submit evidence that they meet the qualifications established in subsection (3) of this section to become an approved program provider.
- (s) "Student" means a participant in the adult workforce high school diploma program who is twenty-two (22) years of age or older, who is a resident of Idaho, and who has not yet earned a high school diploma.
- (t) "Transcript evaluation" means a documented summary of credits earned in previous public or private accredited high schools compared with program and approved program provider graduation requirements.
- (u) "Unit of high school credit" means credit awarded based on a student's demonstration that the student has successfully met the content expectations for the credit area, as defined by subject area standards, expectations, or guidelines.
- (v) "Workforce credential" means a third-party credential that either is part of a sequence of credentials that can be accumulated over time to build an individual's qualifications to advance along a career pathway and results in a certificate or verifies an individual's qualification or competence and that is issued by a third party with the relevant authority to issue said credential.
- (w) "Workforce diploma program" means a program to assist adults twenty-two (22) years of age or older to obtain a high school diploma and develop employability and career technical skills.
- (3) By August 15, 2024, and annually thereafter, the state board of education shall issue a request for applications for entities to become approved program providers and participate in the adult workforce high school diploma program established in this section. Once the state board of educa-

tion verifies that the applicant meets the criteria established in this subsection, it shall approve the applicant as an approved program provider. In order to become an approved program provider, an entity must be a regionally accredited high school diploma-granting entity and have the ability to:

- (a) Provide academic skills intake assessments and transcript evaluations;
- (b) Develop a learning plan for each student that integrates graduation requirements and career goals;
- (c) Provide a course catalog that includes all courses and credits necessary to fulfill graduation requirements in the state of Idaho;
- (d) Provide remediation opportunities in literacy and numeracy;
- (e) Provide employability skills certification;
- (f) Provide career pathways coursework;
- (g) Provide preparation for workforce credentials; and
- (h) Provide career advising services.

- (4) The state board of education shall announce the approved program providers no later than October 15 each year, with authorization for the approved program providers to begin enrolling students starting no later than November 15, annually. Approved program providers shall maintain their approved status without reapplying annually as long as the provider continues to meet the requirements set forth in subsection (3) of this section and has not been removed from the approved program provider list in accordance with the provisions of subsection (9) of this section.
- (5) The state board of education shall pay approved program providers for the completion of the following milestones by each student:
  - (a) Two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) for the completion of each half unit of a high school credit;
  - (b) Two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) for the attainment of an employability skills certification;
  - (c) Two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) for the attainment of a workforce credential requiring up to fifty (50) hours of training;
  - (d) Five hundred dollars (\$500) for the attainment of a workforce credential requiring between fifty-one (51) and one hundred (100) hours of training;
  - (e) Seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750) for the attainment of a work-force credential requiring more than one hundred (100) hours of training; and
  - (f) One thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the attainment of an accredited high school diploma.
  - (6) (a) Approved program providers shall submit monthly invoices to the state board of education no later than the tenth calendar day of each month for milestones met in the previous calendar month.
  - (b) The state board of education shall pay approved program providers in the order in which invoices are submitted until all available funds are exhausted.
  - (c) The state board of education shall provide a written update to approved program providers by the last calendar day of each month, including the aggregate total dollars that have been paid to approved program providers to date and the estimated number of enrollments still available for the program year.

(7) On or before August 15 of the second fiscal year of the program, approved program providers shall report the following required information to the state board of education:

- (a) The total number of students for whom the approved program provider has received payments;
- (b) The total number of credits earned by students for whom the approved program provider is receiving payments;
- (c) The total number of employability skills certifications issued to students for whom the approved program provider is receiving payments;
- (d) The total number of workforce credentials earned for each tier of funding described in subsection (5) of this section by students for whom the approved program provider is receiving payments; and
- (e) The total number of students for whom the approved program provider is receiving payments who receive high school diplomas.
- (8) On or before August 15 after the conclusion of the first measurement period of the program and each year thereafter in which program payments were disbursed for the prior state fiscal year, each approved program provider that received payments pursuant to subsection (5) of this section for the preceding state fiscal year shall report, in addition to the information required by subsection (7) of this section, the following information to the state board of education, broken down by cohort:
  - (a) The average cost per graduate for the cohort for which the measurement period ended in the prior state fiscal year and updated average cost per graduate for any previous cohort for which the measurement period has ended but students from the cohort achieved one (1) of the outcomes described in subsection (5) of this section in the prior state fiscal year; and
  - (b) The graduation rate for the cohort for which the measurement period ended in the prior state fiscal year and updated graduation rate from any previous cohort for which the measurement period has ended but students from the cohort achieved one (1) of the outcomes described in subsection (5) of this section.
  - (9) (a) Beginning with the end of the second fiscal year of the program, the state board of education shall review data from each approved program provider to ensure that each provider is achieving minimum program performance standards, including:
    - (i) A minimum of fifty percent (50%) graduation rate for each cohort's measurement period; and
    - (ii) An average cost per graduate of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) or less for each cohort's measurement period.
  - (b) The state board of education shall place any approved program provider that does not meet the minimum program performance standards identified in paragraph (a) of this subsection on probationary status for the remainder of the fiscal year. An approved program provider that does not meet the minimum performance standards for two (2) consecutive years shall be removed from the approved program provider list.
- SECTION 3. That Chapter 9, Title 33, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended by the addition thereto of a  $\underline{\text{NEW SECTION}}$ , to be known and designated as Section 33-912, Idaho Code, and to read as follows:

- 33-912. ADULT DIPLOMA WORKFORCE FUND. (1) There is hereby created in the state treasury the adult diploma workforce fund. Moneys in the fund shall be used to create a pilot program for the issuance of accredited high school diplomas for adults twenty-two (22) years of age or older pursuant to section 33-142, Idaho Code.
- (2) Moneys in the fund shall be subject to legislative appropriation and shall consist of:
  - (a) Legislative transfers and appropriations; and
  - (b) Interest earned on idle moneys in the fund.

 SECTION 4. An emergency existing therefor, which emergency is hereby declared to exist, this act shall be in full force and effect on and after July 1, 2024.
