MOTION: Rep. Cheatum made a motion to approve the minutes of the January 16, 2024

meeting. Motion carried by voice vote.

RS 30944C1: Rep. McCann presented RS 30944C1, relating to expanded notification options for

vacation of plats. She explained the legislation was brought forward by the City of Lewiston via the Association of Idaho Cities to help provide some cost burden relief to property owners seeking to vacate their properties. She described the current notification process and said the bill would add the option of sending notification mailings to properties within 300 feet by certified mail rather than requiring the certified mail with return receipt. The RS also requires the petitioner to provide an

affidavit confirming notification to be held on file.

MOTION: Rep. Galaviz made a motion to introduce RS 30944C1.

In answer to questions from the committee, **Rep. McCann** explained notices are posted at locations within City Halls and bulk mail was not considered as an option

because the number of mailings generally does not qualify for bulk mail rates.

VOTE ON MOTION:

Motion carried by voice vote.

RS 31104: Rep. Nelson presented RS 31104, which adds recreation districts to the list

of entities authorized to enter into intergovernmental agreements for capital improvements, or for the purpose of collecting and expending development impact fees for system improvements, or both. He said he brought the legislation back from last year because it provides one more tool for local governmental entities to

have at their disposal. This only adds recreation districts to the current law.

MOTION: Rep. Clow made a motion to introduce RS 31104. He stated the legislation

deserved introduction and further discussion, but was not yet sure he would support

it to the end. Motion carried by voice vote.

H 444: Rep. Ehlers presented H 444, which closes a loophole of government taking

surplus proceeds in excess of debts owed when the property is transferred to another government entity. He provided an example of how the loophole could be applied and ceded his time to **Madi Clark**, analyst, Mountain States Policy Center. Ms. Clark described a recent Supreme Court case of what is termed "home equity theft". This resulted in a ruling that such takings leave property owners with no recourse and are unconstitutional. This legislation will bring Idaho law

into constitutional compliance.

of any instances where the loophole has been used in Idaho. **MOTION:** Rep. Wroten made a motion to send H 444 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. James Manley, State Policy Deputy Director for the Pacific Legal Foundation and David Lehman, representing AARP, testified in support of the bill. They claimed it will bring Idaho law into compliance with the recent Supreme Count finding and it would better protect the elderly who are disproportionately affected by tax foreclosures. Rep. Elhlers stated the Association of Idaho Counties was consulted when writing the bill to ensure it did not include anything it should not. VOTE ON Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Ehlers will sponsor the bill on the floor. MOTION: ADJOURN: There being no further business to come before the committee, the meeting adjourned at 2:07 p.m.

Gannon presented RS 31334C1, which would give cities the authority to limit operations of certain sites that pose a threat to public health and safety, or would attract subversive threats. Rep. Gannon explained unprecedented growth is creating a conflict in property uses. While the use of certain properties may be grandfathered, cities are limited when addressing requests for expanding operations of such properties. He described examples of large gas storage facilities and electrical facilities that have posed a threat to nearby neighborhoods. MOTION: Rep. Green made a motion to introduce RS 31334C1. In answer to questions from the committee, Rep. Gannon explained the section requiring two thirds majority vote by city councils was incorporated to provide a reasonable check-and-balance and encourage consensus. He emphasized the legislation was brought forward because there is a real need in cities grappling with growth, and there needs to be a solution that makes the most sense; therefore he was open to other ideas and recommendations. Committee discussion focused on concern about giving broader powers to city councils and whether there is a need for the legislation since existing law addresses some of what Rep. Gannon described. VOTE ON Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Cheatum requested to be recorded as voting MOTION: NAY. **VOTE ON** Chairman Kingsley called for a vote on the motion to approve the minutes of the MOTION: February 8, 2024 meeting. Chairman Ehardt called the meeting to order at 1:31 PM.

Chairman Ehardt introduced Elijah Phipps, the new House Local Government Committee Secretary, and **Silas Frederick**, the new Committee page. Mr. Frederick

is home schooled, and has had three older siblings serve as House pages.

MOTION: Rep. Cheatum made a motion to approve the minutes of the February 14, 2024,

and February 16, 2024, meetings. Motion carried by voice vote.

H 492: Rep. Nelsen presented H 492, which would add recreational districts to the list of entities that a local community can add to their impact fee areas. This bill would not require every community to have an impact fee, but would provide another tool for

local communities to help pay for the growth they are experiencing.

When answering questions, Rep. Nelsen clarified H 492 would allow local jurisdictions to include recreational districts in Capitol Improvement Plans (CIPs), allowing them to receive funds gathered by impact fees. Although impact fees increase the price of a house, Idaho is growing rapidly, and this bill would provide local communities a tool to help address the strain recreational districts are

experiencing without relying on creating new annual fees.

Tim O'Meara, representing the Greater Middleton Park and Recreation District, testified in support of H 492. This bill would allow recreational districts to negotiate with local governments to impose impact fees on new structures, which the counties would collect through building permits and pass the funds down to the recreation district. While there is an annual tax homeowners pay to support the recreational district, the impact fees residents would pay after buying a new house would be used to maintain the level of service and prevent recreational districts from being strained due to an increase in the number of people using their facilities.

Matthew Garner, the Executive Director of the Greater Middleton Parks and Recreation District, testified in support of H 492. Impact fees are a very important and useful tool. With how the city of Middleton has grown, the recreational district does not have enough space in their parks for the community. This bill would help the whole community, and allow recreational districts to provide a better

environment for kids.

Ken Burgess, representing the Idaho Home Builders Association, testified in opposition to H 492. Development impact fees implemented to accommodate new growth, which are designed to pay for the proportionate share of the impact new development and homes will have on current services, and to maintain the current level of services. Because of the growth in Idaho and previous legislation, H 389 in 2021, which capped cities from increasing their budgets more than 8% annually, cities and local entities have been looking for different ways to increase funds they have available. Home builders are not opposed to impact fees, but they are seeing increases in the amount and size of impact fees, and increases in how communities are using impact fees in areas they are not designed for. Recreational districts have other resources available to collect funds, such as property taxes, club membership fees, and bonds.

Rep. Nelsen concluded there many different ways to look at **H 492**. He does not disagree with the developers on how the bill would affect housing prices, but recreational districts near homes affect the properties' value and people's interest in purchasing a property. A number of residential properties do not pay property taxes due to homeowner exemptions, and this can affect the funds available for the local recreational district.

Rep. Cheatum spoke **in support** of **H 492**, stating recreational districts are tightly controlled and regulated by the same budgetary restraints as other districts.

ORIGINAL MOTION:

Rep. Berch made a motion to send **H 492** to the floor with a **DO PASS** recommendation.

Rep. Clow and **Rep. Wroten** spoke against the motion, they stated impact fees are a form of taxation that recreational districts were not originally intended to have, and although impact fees collected from a housing development can provide large amounts of funds, the services they are used to address are not always the same services strained by the housing development.

SUBSTITUTE MOTION:

Rep. Galaviz made a substitute motion to send **H 492** to the floor with no recommendation. She stated there were valid points made and it would be best to give the House an opportunity to discuss the bill.

Rep. Green and **Rep. Berch** spoke in favor of the substitute motion, saying this substitute motion would allow the House to continue the discussion on how to support local communities.

Rep. Clow and **Rep. Wroten** spoke against the substitute motion. If the Committee should send **H 492** to the floor, it should be with a solid recommendation.

AMENDED SUBSTITUTE MOTION:

Rep. Wroten made an amended substitute motion to **HOLD H 492** in committee at the call of the chair.

ROLL CALL VOTE ON AMENDED SUBSTITUTE MOTION: Chairman Ehardt requested a roll call vote on the amended substitute motion to HOLD H 492 in Committee. Motion carried by a vote of 12 AYE and 4 NAY and 1 Absent/Excused. Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. Ehardt, Kingsley, Clow, Erickson, Weber, Alfieri, Cornilles, Dixon (24), Hawkins, Healey, Price, and Wroten. Voting in opposition of the motion: Reps. Cheatum, Berch, Green, and Galaviz. Rep. Skaug was Absent/Excused.

Chairman Ehardt called the meeting to order at 1:36 PM.

MOTION: Rep. Berch made a motion to approve the minutes of the February 20, 2024

meeting. Motion carried by voice vote.

H 608: Rep. Andrus presented H 608, which creates a new chapter in the Local Land

Use Planning Act, which would allow the creation of agriculture protection areas (APAs). When asking agriculture production commissions and organizations on how best to help agriculture production, the consistent response has been the need to protect and preserve agricultural land. This bill attempts to preserve and protect agriculture land while also preserving personal property rights without spending

any money to incentivize.

Braden Jensen, representing the Idaho Farm Bureau Federation. The disappearance of the limited agriculture land has been one of the greatest challenges for agriculture producers, especially as Idaho is now one of the fastest growing states in the nation. This bill creates an option to protect agriculture land that is voluntary, provides incentives, and would protect property rights for farmers and ranchers. He reviewed and explained the wording of the bill and how certain parts could be implemented.

When answering questions, **Branden Jensen** clarified, in order to qualify for APA status, the land has to be 5 acres or more and be taxed as agriculture or forestry land. **H 608** would require counties to establish an APA commission advisory board, would abide by open meeting laws, and will be proactively looking and planning for agriculture production. This could cause potential issues for annexing land for road and land development.

The bill will affect counties planning for growth and development by preventing imminent domain from being used for read easements on lands in an APA, However, the process for reviewing and accepting an APA application will allow for such concerns to be taken into consideration before approving, denying, or recommend changing an application. The bill would apply to county jurisdictions and cities, and counties will be able to develop ordinances if a landowner in an APA fails to use the land for agricultural production. This also prevents individuals from using APAs so they can get the benefits before quickly dissolving it and develop the land at will.

Seth Grigg, Idaho Association of Counties; **Ben Weymouth**, East Side Highway District; **Stephen Freiburger**, Buhl resident; **Bruce Bayne**, Highway District No. 4; testified **in opposition** of **H 608**. There are many great pieces in this bill, but their main concern is how it restricts condemnation authority and how it restricts highway districts. They requested for the bill to allow imminent domain for rights of ways purposes, such as expanding a highway. Taking away the use of imminent domain could prevent counties from purchasing land in an APA if the landowner tries to sell it above fair market value.

Roger Batt, Idaho Eastern Oregon Seed Association; Lorell Skosberg, HM Clause, Inc.; John Hoadley, Coalition for Agriculture's Future; Wyatt Penfold, self; Jason Fellows, self; Debra Reeves, Idaho Dairy Farmers; Marta Hammon, Fremont County Farm Bureau; Patricia Nilsson, self; Galen Lee, self; Jennifer Riebe, commissioner of Payette County; Stacey Satterlee, Idaho Grain Producers Association; testified in support of H 608. Although they would like to see more incentives for landowners, this bill greatly helps farmers and protects agricultural land from being lost to development. There is a limited agricultural land in the state, and there are heavy pressure for farmers to sell to developers. This would protect farmers, gives them a means to let counties know their intentions to maintain their agricultural lands, and promote strategic planning for counties by identifying land dedicated for long term agricultural use. County commissioners can take into account the needs and plans of highway districts when reviewing APA applications, allowing them to deny or recommend changes to applications conflicting with a highway district's development plans for right of ways.

Rep. Andrus stated there are many ways **H 608** could create problems for road access planning, but there are many ways it will be beneficial. Imminent domain is meant for the public good, and this would help ensure agricultural land and sources of food are protected.

ORIGINAL MOTION:

Rep. Galaviz made a motion to send **H 608** to the floor with a **DO PASS** recommendation.

SUBSTITUTE MOTION:

Rep. Cheatum made a substitute motion to send **H 608** to **General Orders**. He stated it is a good bill, but it would be better by removing the part restricting imminent domain as a whole. This bill will help ensure communication between counties and landowners, but relies too much on individuals not taking advantage of APAs to force counties to pay higher than market value without fear of imminent domain.

Rep. Wroten, Rep. Weber, and **Rep. Dixon (24)** spoke against the substitute motion. **H 608** would provide some comfort to participants of APAs by helping them preserve their agricultural land without fear of it being taken away through a statute. The process is voluntary, it allows counties to keep agricultural needs in mind when planning, and the process does not prevent county commissioners to take into account right of way and highway districts' needs when reviewing APA applications.

Rep. Green and **Rep. Alfieri** spoke in favor of the substitute motion. **H 608** is important, and it helps protect the state's farmland and produce. However, the concerns on how this would affect right of ways shows how the bill could negatively affect counties by preventing them from using imminent domain on lands in APAs when needed. Without imminent domain, counties will not be able to meet the needs of their growing populations.

Rep. Clow spoke in favor of the substitute motion, but stated he felt **H 608** may be too complicated to be sent to General Orders. It is a good bill, but the technical issues raised show parts of the bill need to be reworked to better address these issues.

ROLL CALL Chairman Ehardt requested a roll call vote on the substitute motion to send H 608 **VOTE ON THE** to General Orders. Substitute motion failed by a vote of 4 AYE and 12 NAY and SUBSTITUTE 1 Absent/Excused. Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. Clow, Alfieri, Cheatum, MOTION: and Green. Voting in opposition of the motion: Reps. Ehardt, Kingsley, Erickson, Weber, Cornilles, Dixon (24), Hawkins, Healey, Price, Wroten, Berch, and Galaviz. Rep. Skaug was Absent/Excused. ROLL CALL Chairman Ehardt requested a roll call vote on the original motion to send H 608 to **VOTE ON THE** the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by a vote of 15 AYE and 1 NAY and 1 Absent/Excused. Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. Ehardt, ORIGINAL MOTION: Kingsley, Erickson, Weber, Alfieri, Cheatum, Cornilles, Dixon (24), Hawkins, Healey, Price, Wroten, Berch, Green, and Galaviz. Voting in opposition of the motion: Rep. Clow. Chairman Ehardt called the meeting to order at 2:31 PM.

MOTION: Rep. Cheatum made a motion to approve the minutes of the March 6, 2024

meeting. Motion carried by voice vote.

Chairman Ehardt acknowledged the House page, Boyden Andriievskyi, and this being his last meeting with the Committee. Mr. Andriieskyi shared about himself and why he wanted to be a page. His experience as a page has been fun, and he

greatly enjoyed this opportunity.

want to be annexed by the city.

S 1293aa: Sen. VanOrden presented S 1293aa, which organizes and clarifies existing

legislation on annexation. This bill provides clarity for citizens and cities, and maintains the intent and effect of the current law.

Rep. Young discussed the need for S 1293aa, stating the current statute has been confusing, disorganized, and problematic. She discussed the issues in the current statute, and compared how **S 1293aa** corrects and reorganizes it. This bill removes the requesting of city services by a property owners as giving implied consent to be annexed by a city, changes the definition of enclave. For an area to be annexed, it will require 60% or more of property owners, who own 50% or more the land, to

When answering questions, Rep. Young clarified S 1293aa would require a property owner to give expressed written consent to be annexed by a city if they request city services. Currently, property owners are not aware how asking for city services gives implied consent to be annexed by the city. The bill decreases the size of an enclave a city can forcibly annex from 100 to 30 parcels. It also changes the definition of an enclave to require it be surrounded on all sides by a city. In current statute, cities are able to use the current definition for enclaves to annex large amount of land without hearing, notice, or consent on the edge of the city. The purpose of the phrase "meaningful opportunity" in the bill is meant to ensure public input at city council meetings on annexation.

Russ Hendricks, representing the Idaho Farm Bureau, clarified how agriculture protection areas, under H 608, would not affect annexations by cities if H 608 and S 1293aa became law. Already in Idaho law the owner of a parcel of land over 5 acres and dedicated to agriculture or forestry can refuse to be annexed by a city.

Kelly Packer, executive director of Idaho Association of Idaho Cities, testified in opposition of S 1293aa. She thanked the bill's sponsors for seeking input from stakeholders on the bill. The changes made in the bill greatly fixed the current statute. However, she felt this created two issues; the property owners wanting to be annexed needing to own 50% of the area considered for annexation, and the changes to enclaves. She stated These issues were why Sen. Schroeder voted against the bill in the Senate. If 60% or more of landowners want to be annexed by a city, but own less than 50% of the land, they cannot be annexed. For enclaves, the reduction of 100 to 30 parcels that can be annexed at once would dramatically increase costs if a city tries to annex an enclaves larger than 30 parcels. The definition for an enclave to being land surrounded on all sides by a city would also prevent cities from annexing enclaves with one or more sides surrounded by another city or natural barriers. A minor concern is the word "meaningful" when cities provide opportunities for public input on an annexation due to the word being legally ambiguous. She asked for the bill to be sent to General Orders or to hold it in Committee.

When answering questions, **Kelly Packer** clarified it is not always possible to annex only the property owners who do want to be annexed due to the larger property owners preventing some from bordering the city.

Kristi Crookham, self; Scott Johnson, self; and Colleen Hammon, self; testified in support of S 1293aa. Many farmers have moved much of their operations into Oregon due to how disruptive the spread of cities through annexation has been. The cost of forced annexation can be vague and a great financial burden for homeowners. The costs of connecting to city services can be in the tens of thousands of dollars, and, if unable to pay outright for the hookups, the cost can stay with the home and reduce the property value if the owner decides to sell. Although some property owners may not need city services, regulations could force them to connect to city services after being annexed, and it could be years after annexation before they receive the services. Decreasing the maximum parcels in an enclave to be annexed from 100 to 30 would better allow property owners to have their voices heard.

Rep. Clow and **Rep. Cheatum** stated an issue with **S 1293aa** is how it can prevent a city from annexing an area as an enclave if it's bordered by a natural feature, another county, another city, or federal or state land, which prevents the city from surrounding it.

Rep. Young stated cities have not used forcible annexation of enclaves except in extremely rare exceptions. Many cities have enclaves, and choose not to annex them, even though they do have the authority, because it is not good practice. She addressed **Sen. Schroeder's** part in when amending **S 1293aa**, and his interest in its success. The purpose of this bill is to protect property owners with a large amount of land who find themselves being surrounded by a city, and nothing prevents a city from annexing small property owners who wish to be annexed. The change in the definition of enclaves to be surrounded on all sides by a city in order to be forcibly annexed is only an issue if a city wants to forcibly annex property on its periphery.

Chairman Ehardt put the committee at ease at 4:05 PM for a ten minute break.

Chairman Ehardt resumed the meeting at 4:15 PM.

ORIGINAL MOTION:

Rep. Skaug made a motion to send **1293aa** to **General Orders**. He state there has been much hard work put into this bill, but the issues in it need to be fixed.

SUBSTITUTE MOTION:

Rep. Cheatum made a substitute motion to **HOLD 1293aa** in Committee indefinitely.

Rep. Alfieri spoke in favor of the original motion, stating he likes how **S 1293aa** protects property owners and address government growth. He agreed the issues in it needs to be addressed, and can be clarified in General Orders.

Rep. Clow spoke in favor of the substitute motion. He thanked **Sen. VanOrden** and **Rep. Young**, stating **S 1293aa** is a much better written bill. The main issues in it need to be fixed, but he was not sure if there was time left in the session to address them.

AMENDED SUBSTITUTE MOTION:

Rep. Hawkins made an amended substitute motion to send **S 1293aa** to the floor without recommendation. He stated this bill helps protect the rights of the people by making it more difficult for a city to forcibly annex property.

Rep. Skaug requested to hear the sponsors' response to having **S 1293aa** sent to General Orders. **Rep. Young** stated she is willing to have the issues about the bill, such as the definition of an enclave, addressed in General Orders if it is the will of the Committee.

MOTION:

Rep. Hawkins made a motion to withdraw his amended substitute motion. **Chairman Ehardt** called a vote on withdrawing the amended substitute motion. **Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Cheatum** requested to be recorded as voting **NAY.**

ROLL CALL VOTE ON SUBSTITUTE MOTION: Chairman Ehardt requested a roll call vote on the substitute motion to HOLD S 1293aa in Committee indefinitely. Chairman Ehardt called the meeting to order at 8:30 AM.

MOTION: Rep. Berch made a motion to approve the minutes of the March 14, 2024 meeting.

Motion carried by voice vote.

S 1403: Rep. Manwaring presented S 1403, which deals with area of impact. Areas of

impact are outside of city limits and are areas cities plan to grow. He reviewed key parts of the bill, including how it establishes the criteria for implementing areas of impact boundary decisions, a two mile standard for creating these areas, a five year planning time for review, clarifies jurisdiction, clear direction for judicial review, and to ensure areas of impact do not overlap. There has been work to respect city

and county jurisdiction.

Sen. Lakey disclosed that his law firm does work with public entities, as well as private property owners involved in land use processes. He discussed how **S 1403** clarifies a city's area of impact is still within the jurisdiction of the county, and how it improves relations and communication between counties and cities. Although this is a legislative decision, this bill provides a limited judicial review for the courts

when reviewing area of impact decisions.

When answering questions, **Sen. Lakely** clarified **S 1403** provides for a limited judicial review due to this being the common methodology for repealing a planning and zoning decision, the financial responsibilities for cities and counties when providing public hearing notices, and encourage adjacent cities to negotiate with each other and the county on their areas of impact before a public hearing. This bill also removes the mandate to hold a second hearing if the county commissioners feel it is not necessary, and encourage counties to negotiate with cities when implementing ordinances specific to an area of impact. A city will still be able to voluntarily annex property outside of its area of impact. In order to ensure area of impacts are used as to identify growth in the near future, this bill prevents cities from expanding past two miles. Although the bill requires areas of impact to be reviewed every five years, changes to an area of impact can be made at any time, and it will not automatically expand if a city annexes property within its area of impact.

Kris Crookham, representing self; Theresa Denham, representing self; Martin Denham, representing self; Keri Smith, representing the Coalition for Agricultures; and Ron Amarel, representing self, testified in opposition to S 1403. They stated the bill damages both rural and urban communities and agriculture, and gives cities more power over those living in areas of impacts. Removing the requirement to hold a second public hearing will damage property rights and give local governments opportunities to change their decisions without notice. Implementing judicial review as a means to overturn decisions will create contention between cities and counties and will be costly for citizens. Currently, not all property owners are ensured they'll receive a notice of a public hearing, and this bill prevents citizens from challenging area of impact decisions if they did not receive a notice. Implementing a five year requirement for reviewing areas of impact will overwhelm local government planners. The five year requirement to review, as well as the size of a city's area of impact, should be based on the size and needs of a city rather than a general rule for all.

Seth Grigg, representing the Idaho Association of Counties, testified **in support** of **S 1403**, stating the Idaho Association of Cities, realtors, and home builders are also supportive of the bill. Several provisions in the current statute are invalid due to case decisions. He clarified the bill establishes two miles as the maximum size of an area of impact. This bill does not negate the advisory role of planning and zoning commissions. This bill also better guards against areas of impact being used by one city to prevent another city from expanding in a certain area, as well as prevent areas of impact from overlapping.

Sen. Lakey stated S 1403 has been a collaborative process with county and city policy makers, and these policy makers were able to receive input from their planning staff. The bill does not negate counties' comprehensive plans or their approach towards preserving agriculture. It clarifies county jurisdiction, places limitations and requirements on areas of impact planning, and promotes more local control. This would tighten growth and promote more regular planning so as to negate expansive growth. The five year review requirement allows local officials to ensure their area of impact is still appropriate for their needs, and does not force them to readjust their area of impact or from meeting sooner. The bill allows county commissioners to have discretion on how they implement the process for public hearings, and allows commissioners to decide whether a second public hearing is necessary. The adding of a limited judicial review allows for an additional opportunity for addressing decisions on areas of impact. The bill requires each property owners to receive notices by mail, and gives counties the opportunity to publish notices. He clarified Section 67-6526 (1) in the bill addresses legislative findings and intent.

Rep. Manwaring clarified many of the key parts of **S 1403**, including the removal of the second public hearing requirement and judicial review, were proposals made and supported by local city and county officials. This bill is an effort to respect city and county jurisdiction, and to have a process which ensures planning decisions are made thoughtfully and with due course.

MOTION:

Rep. Cheatum made a motion to send **S 1403** to the floor with a **DO PASS** recommendation.

Rep. Clow spoke **in support** of the motion. He stated cities and counties have been in difficult situations when dealing with areas of impact. **S 1403** does a better job making it clear who has jurisdiction over areas of impact, but he wished there was more flexibility in the bill regarding the five year requirement.

Rep. Mendenhall spoke **in support** of the motion. He stated, as a county commissioner, **S 1403** helps address issues counties and cities run into with areas of impact.

Rep. Hawkins spoke **in opposition** to the motion. He stated there is a lot covered in **S 1403**, and there are questions about the language which bring him concerns

Rep. Wroten spoke **in support** of the motion. There is support from his city for **S 1403**, it helps cities experiencing large growth, and there is enough flexibility for cities of various sizes and needs.

Rep. Berch stated he was not sure how he would vote on **S 1403**, and requested a roll call vote on the motion. He was concerned with how the bill diminishes public recourse on area of impact decisions due to the bill being described as a legislative decision.

Rep. Healey spoke **in support** of the motion. She stated **S 1403** helps keep the decisions on areas of impact with locally elected officials, and better allows them to make decisions based on what their people need.

ROLL CALL VOTE ON MOTION: Chairman Ehardt requested a roll call vote on the motion to send S 1403 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation. Motion carried by a vote of 10 AYE and 6 NAY and 1 Absent/Excused. Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. Ehardt, Clow, Erickson, Mendenhall, Cheatum, Cornilles, Dixon (24), Healey, Wroten, and Galeviz. Voting in opposition of the motion: Rep. Kingsley, Skaug, Alfieri, Hawkins, Price, and Berch. Rep. Green was Absent/Excused. Rep. Manwaring will sponsor the bill to the floor.

Rep. Healey requested a consideration of having before the Committee **S 1293aa**. She was unable to stay for the vote on the bill on March 14, 2024, due to a medical emergency, and requested the Committee reconsider its vote on the bill. **Chairman Ehardt** explained the process for reconsidering a bill the Committee has heard in a previous meeting.

Chairman Ehardt put the committee at ease at 10:03 AM to review and clarify the process.

Chairman Ehardt resumed the meeting at 10:04 AM.

Rep. Healey made a motion to reconsider the Committee's actions on S 1293aa.

Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. Ehardt, Kingsley, Erickson, Skaug, Mendenhall, Alfieri, Cornilles, Hawkins, Healey, and Price. Voting in opposition to the motion: Reps. Clow, Cheatum, Dixon (24), Wroten, Berch, and Galaviz. Rep. Green was Absent/ Excused. Rep. Young will sponsor the bill to the floor.

Rep. Skaug made a motion to send **S 1293aa** to **General Orders**.

Rep. Berch spoke **in opposition** to the motion. He stated he was concerned on the reasoning to reconsider **S 1293aa** when there was a committee member absent during this process.

ROLL CALL VOTE ON MOTION: Chairman Ehardt requested a roll call vote on the motion to send S 1293aa to General Orders. Motion carried by a vote of 10 AYE and 6 NAY and 1 Absent/Excused. Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. Ehardt, Kingsley, Erickson, Skaug, Mendenhall, Alfieri, Cornilles, Hawkins, Healey, and Price. Voting in opposition to the motion: Reps. Clow, Cheatum, Dixon (24), Wroten, Berch, and Galaviz. Rep. Green was Absent/ Excused.
