Rep. Redman called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. He announced \$ 1052

will be moved to the top of the agenda.

S 1052: Rep. Beiswenger, District 8, and Rep. Brian Lenney, District 13, presented S

1052. This legislation aligns the bureau chiefs with division managers for improved

accountability to the Health and Welfare oversight board.

MOTION: Rep. Wheeler made a motion to send S 1052 to the floor with a DO PASS

recommendation. Motion carried by voice vote. Rep. Beiswenger will sponsor

the bill on the floor.

S 1023aa,aa: Rep. Beiswenger, District 8, presented S 1023aa,aa, the Idaho Medical Freedom

Act, which applies the Coronavirus Stop Act to all medical interventions.

**Leslie Manookian**, Self, testified **in support** of **S 1023aa,aa**. This preserves bodily autonomy, as affirmed by multiple supreme court decisions. It would impact

employment, schools, and entry into public buildings.

Rep. Redman turned the gavel over to Chairman Vander Woude.

Answering questions, **Ms. Manookian** explained this legislation addresses future scenarios based on past pandemic events. It does not restrict the protection of other students, staff, or impact school vaccination statutes. Occupational hazards

are excluded.

**Quinn Perry**, Deputy Director, Idaho School Board Association, testified **in opposition** to **S 1023aa,aa** because it will conflict with other sections of code. It is important to know which kids are immunized so the schools can avoid and mitigate

closures during an epidemic.

**Heather Gagliano**, Self, testified **in opposition** to **S 1023aa,aa**. Parents already have the right to choose vaccines and decide what is reported to the schools.

Jane Withers, Self, Registered Nurse, testified in opposition to S 1023aa,aa.

Records are a valuable tool when outbreaks occur. If the parents are not sharing

their records with the school any coordinated care is limited.

Matthieu Carman, Self, testified in opposition to S 1023aa,aa. Outbreaks of

preventable diseases in schools put staff and communities at risk.

**Summer Bushnell**, Self, testified **in support** of **S 1023aa,aa**. This legislation seeks to correct and prevent discriminative issues like those which occurred during

the pandemic.

**Sarah Clendenon**, Health Freedom Foundation, testified **in support** of **S 1023aa,aa**, explaining vaccine failures.

**Hilary Rayhill**, Nurse, testified **in opposition** to **S 1023aa,aa**. Children are often sent to school when they are sick. Parents already have the vaccination freedom.

**Noreen Womack**, General Pediatrician, Idaho Children Are Primary, testified **in opposition** to **S 1023aa,aa**. Medical interventions save lives, as reflected by the decreased cases of measles after the vaccine. Idaho has the least medical requirements of any state.

**Angela Hamblin**, School Nurse, testified **in opposition** to **S 1023aa,aa**. School requirements remind young parents to make routine medical visits for their children.

**Ron Nate**, President, Idaho Freedom Foundation, testified **in support** of **S 1023aa,aa**, which protects assaults on personal liberties without prohibiting direct vaccination mandates.

**Stephanie Nemore**, Self, testified **in opposition** to **S 1023aa,aa**. This legislation expands the Corona Virus Stop Act beyond what is necessary.

**Dr. Ryan Cole**, Clinical and Anatomic Pathologist, Chief Medical Officer, Laboratory Director, Cole Diagnostics, testified **in support** of **S 1023aa,aa**. When authorities make rules which override bodily autonomy, personal choice is eliminated.

**Rep. Beiswenger**, in closing, stated the schools have exemptions and parental rights are untouched. Personal decisions and medical rights need to be respected.

**MOTION:** Rep. Redman made a motion to send S 1023aa,aa, to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation.

ROLL CALL VOTE ON MOTION: Roll call vote was requested. Motion carried by a vote of 8 AYE, 5 NAY and 2 Absent/Excused. Voting in favor of the motion: Reps. Vander Woude, Redman, Beiswenger, Burgoyne, Cayler, Leavitt, Rasor, Thompson. Voting in opposition to the motion: Reps. Wheeler, Fuhriman, McCann, Rubel, Egbert. Reps. Erickson, Healey were absent/excused. Rep. Beiswenger will sponsor the bill on the floor.
