GUBERNATORIAL APPOINTMENT:

Committee Consideration of the Gubernatorial Appointment of Alex Adams of Eagle, Idaho, as the Director of Health and Welfare term

commencing June 5, 2024. **Mr. Adams** provided an overview of his background and vision for the Department of Health and Welfare (Department) which centered on increasing child welfare and decreasing regulations. **Mr. Adams** distributed handouts to the Committee (See Attachments 1, 2, and 3). He shared his motto "less is more," and his intention to sharply focus on a handful of matters, including foster care. **Mr. Adams** celebrated an increase in the

proportion of foster homes to foster children over the past year.


DISCUSSION:

Senator Lenney voiced concerns about misappropriation of funds within the Department as evident by the Community Partner Grant ineligible expenses in 2022, 32 million duplicate payments in August 2023, and \$2.5 million misallocated to cover employee salaries. Mr. Adams replied budget is a law, not a suggestion and promised increased transparency through oversight at multiple levels. **Senator Wintrow** invited Mr. Adams to share his highlights of working at the Department and the decision to focus on child welfare. Mr. Adams responded that internal reports and legislation had shown foster care to be an important topic with room for improvement. He enjoyed listening to and working with foster parents and was pleased by the Department's progress. Mr. Adams shared that though child welfare was the focus, his work as Director meant supporting employees from all fields. Senator Shippy volunteered that he was a foster parent and thanked Mr. Adams for the great changes within the Department. Senator Zuiderveld inquired about the Department's plans for areas outside of foster care. Mr. Adams stated increasing cost effectiveness and encouraging employment to decrease individual dependence on the state were at the top of his list. There being no further questions, Chair VanOrden announced that the Gubernatorial Vote for Mr. Adams would be held during

the following meeting.


PRESENTATION: Lauren Smyser, Deputy Chief of the Division of Financial Management, presented on the administrative rule making process (Attachment 4). She outlined the Constitutional authority of the Senate to review rules and the four main types of rules: proposed, pending, final, and temporary. Vice Chair Bjerke petitioned clarification on temporary rules. Ms. Smyser replied a temporary rule would remain in effect until the pending rule became official on either July 1, 2025, or a specified date. She shared tips on accessing and reading the rule books, and concluded by inviting the Senators to use Townhall Idaho, an online forum, to access all Idaho public meetings. **DISCUSSION:** Per Chair VanOrden's question, Ms. Smyser relayed there will be someone from her department to assist during Committee meeting the following day. Vice Chair Bjerke thanked Ms. Smyser for the presentation. There being no further business, Chair VanOrden adjourned the meeting at **ADJOURNED:** 3:45 p.m.. 







Because of the updates to 16.06.02, Foster Care Licensing, this rule makes corresponding changes to the children's agencies requirements for foster homes.

There are no changes to the pending rule and it is being adopted as originally proposed. The complete text of the proposed rule was published in the July 3rd, 2024 Idaho Administrative Bulletin, Vol. 24-7, pages 80 through 86.

DOCKET NO.

16-0314-2301

Hospitals - Adoption of Temporary Rule. Jared Larsen, Legislative and Regulatory Affairs Chief, Department of Health and Welfare (Department) stated this temporary rule kept in effect rules passed by the 2024 Legislature until July

1st, when the pending rule would come into effect.

MOTION: Senator Harris moved to approve Docket No. 16-0314-2301. Senator Wintrow

seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote.

DOCKET NO.

16-0314-2401

Rules Governing Hospitals (ZBR Chapter Repeal) - Pending Rule. Mr. **Larsen** introduced that this rule eliminated hospitals' regulatory burden processing Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) patients. The previous rule was more restrictive than federal standards, and the new docket would allow hospitals to be reimbursed for CMS patients. Mr. Larsen noted he was working with Senator Blaylock on legislation that moved the necessary

pieces of the rules to statute.

DISCUSSION Senator Wintrow inquired whether this rule would affect the eligibility and

accessibility of Medicare and Medicaid treatment. Mr. Larsen asserted it would

MOTION: Senator Harris moved to approve Docket No. 16-0314-2401. Senator Blaylock

seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote.

DOCKET NO. Child and Family Services - Temporary and Pending Rule. Mr. Larsen 16-0601-2402

explained the temporary and pending rule would allow increased compensation to resolve crisis-level deficiencies in foster homes. At the advisement of the Attorney General, the rule also clarified the appeals process for individuals substantiated for incidents of abuse, neglect or abandonment. The adoption of this rule helped situate Idaho in proper legal posture for an ongoing lawsuit.

MOTION: Chair VanOrden moved to approve Docket No. 16-0601-2402 . Senator

Wintrow seconded the motion. The motion carried by **voice vote**.

DOCKET NO. Child and Family Services - Adoption of Temporary Rule. Mr. Larsen 16-0601-2403

informed the Committee this temporary rule was enacted by Director Alex Adams on his first day. This docket eliminated adoption fees for children in State custody.

This docket underscored Idaho's stance as a Pro-Adoption state.

MOTION: Chair VanOrden moved to approve Docket No. 16-0601-2403. Senator

Wintrow seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote.

DOCKET NO. Child and Family Services - Temporary Rule. Mr. Larsen shared that this docket pertained to visitation requirements of parents substantiated by the 16-0601-2404

Department for crimes of sexual and physical abuse. These parent visits required direct supervision at all times, and prohibit the child from sitting on the parent's

lap or engaging in unmonitored conversations.

MOTION: Senator Wintrow moved to approve Docket No. 16-0601-2404 . Senator

Zuiderveld seconded the motion. The motion carried by **voice vote**.

DOCKET NO. Child and Family Services (ZBR Chapter Rewrite) - Pending Rule. Mr. 16-0601-2405 Larsen stated this docket eliminated outdated rules and included the priorly

approved dockets, Docket No. 16-0601-2402 through Docket No. 16-0601-2404

as rules.

MOTION: Senator Harris moved to approve Docket No. 16-0601-2405. Chair VanOrden

seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote.

Foster Care Licensing (Chapter Repeal) - Temporary and Pending Rule. Mr. DOCKET NO. 16-0602-2401

Larsen presented this docket as eliminating an outdated rules chapter that would

be replaced by Docket No. 16-0101-2401.

MOTION: Senator Zuiderveld moved to approve Docket No. 16-0602-2401 . Senator

Shippy seconded the motion. The motion carried by **voice vote**.

Foster Care Licensing (Chapter Rewrite) - Temporary and Pending Rule. Mr. DOCKET NO. 16-0602-2402 Larsen explained this docket for the adoption of national model of foster family

licensing standards that increased Department flexibility by:

Reducing the wait time of foster applications from 30 days to one day.

Permitting the use of Department funding to help foster families meet home safety standards, including fire extinguishers and smoke detectors.

Lowering the required age of a foster parent from 21 years old to 18 years old, thus permitting older siblings to become foster parents of their younger

siblings if that is the best scenario.

These changes set the Reasonable and Prudent Parent Standard and allowed the Department flexibility to place children with their best unique scenario.

DISCUSSION: **Senator Shippy** drew attention to Rule 230.02(d) on page 390, requiring

foster parents to store and lock ammunition separate from guns, and voiced concern this increased foster home vulnerability. Senator Shippy continued that foster homes faced unique threats, and that disarming the home created unnecessary difficulty and danger for the foster parents. Julie Sevcik, Program Manager, Child and Family Services, stated the rule limited gun and ammunition accessibility for children. Mr. Larsen invited Senator Shippy to work with the

Department during the interim to write more appropriate language.

MOTION: Senator Wintrow moved to approve Docket No. 16-0602-2402 . Senator

Zuiderveld seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote. Senator

Harris requested that he be recorded as voting nay.

DOCKET NO. 16-0602-2403

Foster Care Licensing - Temporary and Pending Rule. Mr. Larsen explained that the docket fast-tracked the reapplication processes for former foster parents. insofar as the parent:

- 1. underwent a licensed home visit within the last 12 months,
- 2. left the Department in good standing,
- agreed to follow department standards.

This docket hoped to incentivize foster parents to reapply thereby increasing the number of foster homes available.

MOTION:

Senator Harris moved to approve Docket No. 16-0602-2403. Senator Wintrow seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote.

DOCKET NO. 16-0101-2401

Emergency Medical Services (New Chapter) - Pending Rule. Mr. Larsen illustrated that the chapter proposed in this docket would subsume Docket No. 16-0102-2401, Docket No. 16-0105-2401, Docket No. 16-0107-2401, Docket No. 16-0112-2401, Docket No. 16-0201-2401, and Docket No. 16-0202-2401. These changes aligned Department rules with the Occupational Licensing Reform Act of 2021, which required that continuous education hour of Emergency Medical Services (EMS) workers not exceed the average of contiguous states. The Department found on average Idaho required 40% more continuous education hours and this docket reduced that time.

DISCUSSION:

Senator Wintrow inquired whether there were any large concerns expressed by EMS employees in the consolidation process. Mr. Larsen highlighted the Department's feedback process which included public hearing, conferences, and email surveys. Senator Harris asked if there was any detriment to cutting back continuous education hours and if hours were measured annual or biannually. Mr. Larsen articulated that the decreased requirements might incentivize individuals to stay in the EMS profession, especially those moving to Idaho from states with fewer required continuous education hours. The changes addressed shortage of EMS workers. Wayne Denny, EMS Bureau Chief, explained the required number of continuous education hours were based on an individual's level of experience.

MOTION:

Senator Harris moved to approve Docket No. 16-0101-2401 . Senator Wintrow seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote.

DOCKET NO. **Emergency Medical Services (EMS) - Agency Licensing Requirements** 16-0103-2401

(Chapter Repeal) - Pending Rule. Jared Larsen, Legislative and Regulatory Affairs Chief, Department of Health and Welfare (Department), stated that this was one of six chapters deleted and consolidated into one chapter, the replacement of

which was approved by the Committee.

MOTION: Senator Harris moved to approve Docket No. 16-0103-2401. Senator Zuiderveld

seconded the motion. The motion carried by **voice vote**.

DOCKET NO. Newborn Screening (ZBR Chapter Rewrite) - Pending Rule. Mr. Larsen

16-0212-2401 mentioned this docket consolidated rules regarding the screening of newborns.

This concerned internal laboratory processes and made no substantive changes.

DISCUSSION Senator Shippy inquired if there was informed consent by the parents regarding

retesting of infants in section 100.02(b) on page 87. Mr. Larsen mentioned that infant screening had been in Idaho Code since 1921 and contained religious

exceptions that could be invoked.

MOTION: Senator Blaylock moved to approve Docket No. 16-0212-2401. Chair VanOrden

seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote.

DOCKET NO. State of Idaho Drinking Water Laboratory Certification Program (ZBR

16-0213-2401 Chapter Rewrite, Fee Rule) - Pending Rule. Mr. Larsen stated that this docket

> consolidated rules regarding laboratory drinking water testing and outlined the changes in fee amounts. Annual base certification fee for Idaho labs increased from \$50 to \$100 per chemistry discipline. Microbiology testing moved to a flat annual fee of \$150. The base certification for out-of-state chemistry labs increased from \$50 to \$200. These fees were not expected to be burdensome and received no

concerns during negotiated rule making.

DISCUSSION: Senator Harris asked if Idaho would be subject to potential changes in EPA

Mr. Larsen explicated that this docket maximized the amount of information the Department could provide foster parents regarding the needs of foster children

in their care within the bounds of law.

DISCUSSION **Senator Wintrow** asked if confidentiality was covered in foster parent training.

> Mr. Larsen confirmed. Senator Blaylock asked if this pertained to information shared to schools and health providers. Mr. Larsen replied it would, if within the

DOCKET NO. Fees for State Hospital North and State Hospital South (Chapter Repeal) -

16-0407-2401 Pending Rule. Mr. Larsen stated this docket duplicated other Centers for Medicare

and Medicaid Services (CMS) regulations which would be repealed if approved.

DISCUSSION: Senator Wintrow asked if this changed the statutory obligation to provide CMS

services. Mr. Larsen clarified it would not as the requirement existed in statute.

MOTION: Senator Blaylock moved to approve Docket No. 16-0407-2401. Chair VanOrden

seconded the motion. The motion carried by **voice vote**.

DOCKET NO. Substance Use Disorders (SUD) Services - Pending Rule. Mr. Larsen reported

16-0717-2401 the Department was no longer a service provider for SUDs treatment and this

docket allowed contractors to be certified by new credentialing bodies. This enabled

workers with out-of-State credentials to fill work shortages.

TESTIMONY: Peyton Darst, Idaho Behavioral Health Association, spoke in support of the change

to accept credentialing agencies as they provided individuals greater access to care.

MOTION: Senator Wintrow moved to approve Docket No. 16-0717-2401. Senator

Zuiderveld seconded the motion. The motion carried by **voice vote**.

DOCKET NO. Adult Mental Health Services - Pending Rule. Mr. Larsen noted that this docket 16-0733-2401

clarified that the Department was no longer a direct service provider for adult mental

health services and instead contracted out this work to Magellan Health.

MOTION: Senator Harris moved to approve Docket No. 16-0733-2401. Senator Zuiderveld

seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote.

DOCKET NO. 16-0737-2401

Children's Mental Health Services (ZBR Chapter Rewrite) - Pending Rule. Mr. Larsen explained that this docket similarly reflected that the Department was no longer a direct service provider for children's mental health care but contracted out this work to Magellan Health.

TESTIMONY:

Brittany Shipley of Hailey, ID voiced concerns about potential complexity resulting from contracted service providers and confusion about credentials of those determining medical necessity. At **Senator Wintrow** 's request, **Ms. Shipley** restated the need for those in complex situations to have a clear process of care and a cohesive understanding of children's needs. **Juliet Charron**, Deputy Director, Department of Health and Welfare over Medicaid and Behavioral Health, clarified the current Department practice that a specialized clinician determined medical necessity. **Chair Van Orden** asked about the process of addressing concerns with the Department. **Mr. Larsen** shared that avenues to address complaints and complex situations exist.

MOTION:

Senator Zuiderveld moved to approve Docket No. 16-07037-2401. Senator Harris seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote.

DOCKET NO. 16-0313-2401 Consumer-Directed Services (ZBR Chapter Rewrite) - Pending Rule. Mr. Larsen explained that this docket consolidated rules without making substantive change.

DISCUSSION:

Chair VanOrden inquired about changes to the Medicaid Advisory Committee. **Ms. Charron** noted the Department removed their mention from the rules because it appeared in federal guidelines.

MOTION:

Senator Shippy moved to approve Docket No. 16-0313-4301. Senator Zuiderveld seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote.

DOCKET NO. 16-0309-2401 Medicaid Basic Plan Benefits (ZBR Chapter Rewrite) - Pending Rule. Mr. Larsen described this docket as a condensing of rules to contain only legislatable provisions. The docket removed Department oversight of legislative decisions, referencing 2023 House Bill No. 153, to communicate legislative power. While they received comments about Section 009, Mr. Larsen assured that the Department did not require individuals to alert them of medical bills that the individual had not yet received.

DISCUSSION:

Chair VanOrden asked for clarification on 210.01(c), page 123, prohibiting reimbursement for services provided after the individual's date of death. **Ms. Charron** shared that this section assisted the Medicaid Program Integrity Unit to ensure appropriate billing. She explained further the reimbursement process of dually eligible Medicare and Medicaid providers.

Senator Blaylock noted that expenses such as education and food delivery were not covered by Medicaid, and asked if they previously had. Mr. Larsen replied that the new rule clarified existing Idaho state policy without creating substantive change. Senator Blaylock inquired about interest on delayed payments and whether Medicaid identification cards would be considered government issued. Mr Larsen replied that late payments from the Department were atypical and would follow up with more information. Ms. Charron clarified that since the IDs came from the state, they could not serve as federal identification. At the request of Senator Wintrow, Ms. Charron "pinky promised" the Committee that there were no policy changes in the docket.

MOTION:

Senator Harris moved to approve Docket No. 16-0309-2401. Senator Wintrow seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote.

(Committee) to order at 3:00 p.m.

APPOINTMENT:

GUBERNATORIAL Committee Consideration of the Gubernatorial Appointment of Lance Boylan, of Kellogg, ID to the Board of Environmental Quality term

> commencing December 1, 2024 and expiring July 1, 2028. Mr. Boylan described his fourteen years of experience as an environmental engineer focusing on water and waste management. His most recent project involved land reclamation in

Yukon, Canada and he had served in management since 2022.

DISCUSSION: **Senator Shippy** petitioned Mr. Boylan's opinion on the biggest threat facing

Idaho and how he would prioritize agriculture. Mr. Boylan noted the growing population created unique water and waste management challenges and agriculturally he would prioritize phosphate and discharge operations. Senator Wintrow asked what skills made Mr. Boylan a good board member and how he planned to balance competing water interests. Mr. Boylan's discussed how his time negotiating between the First Nations, local government, and businesses in Yukon taught him to balance interests through listening to understand. Senator Zuiderveld asked about first action items if Mr. Boylan were appointed. Mr. Boylan articulated aligning Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ)

regulations with statute, along with increasing permit transparency.

APPOINTMENT

GUBERNATORIAL Committee Consideration of the Gubernatorial Appointment of Dennis Leikam of Idaho Falls, ID to the Board of Environmental Quality, term commencing December 1, 2024 and expiring July 1, 2028. Mr. Leikam held a Masters Degree in Geology and throughout his time working in the West had never experienced transparency like Idaho's. Mr. Leikam highly respected DEQ's climate of collaboration and desired to perpetuate that legacy during his tenure on the board.

DISCUSSION:

Senator Shippy inquired as to Mr. Leikam's opinion on the biggest threat facing Idaho and how he would prioritize agriculture. Mr. Leikam concurred with Mr. Boylan on the challenge of an expanding population and proposed reusing water before recycling. To prioritize agriculture, Mr. Leikam suggested examining water availability and connecting local farmers with educational organizations. Senator Wintrow asked about leadership qualities. Mr. Leikam mentioned his robust business experience granted him a unique vantage point to oversee DEQ. Senator Zuiderveld asked about Mr. Leikam's first action items if he was appointed. Mr. Leikam wanted to apply creative solutions to maximize both environmental protection and flexibility in business operations.

RS 31799C1 Relating to Newborn Testing. Senator Blaylock described this legislation transferred authority to regulate newborn testing from the Department of Health and Welfare (Department) to the Legislature. MOTION: Senator Harris moved that RS 31799C1 be sent to print. Senator Shippy seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote. RS 31828C1 Relating to Hospital Licensing. Senator Blaylock furthered that her legislation reduced unnecessary burdens on hospitals and providers to support Centers of Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). She remarked that removing current state level requirement would lessen operational strain on hospitals and providers. The legislation adjusted terminology and was supported by the Department. MOTION: Senator Harris moved that RS 31828C1 be sent to print. Senator Wintrow seconded the motion. The motion carried by voice vote. ADJOURNED: There being no further business at that time, Vice Chair Bjerke adjourned the meeting at 3:29 p.m. Senator VanOrden Rebecca Kozlowski Secretary Chair Senator Bjerke Vice Chair
