HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 32

BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND SUPPORTING ADVANCEMENT OF STATE ENERGY SOVEREIGNTY.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, Idaho participates in interstate energy markets and benefits at times from cost-effective imported power, particularly during seasonal fluctuations, and at other times from being able to sell excess power to neighboring states, with financial benefits directly benefiting Idaho customers; and

WHEREAS, Idaho is a net energy importer, and as such, long-term energy security, ratepayer protection, and state sovereignty require that imported energy supplement, but not replace, secure in-state base load generation that is capable of sustaining Idaho's residential, agricultural, commercial, industrial, and mining-related energy demand under all seasonal and water conditions; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's economy and workforce, including its national laboratory, agricultural producers, mining operations, advanced manufacturing facilities, and rural communities, depend on affordable and reliable energy that is responsibly developed and selected by electric utilities to meet the needs of Idahoans in a least-cost and least-risk manner; and

WHEREAS, the Eastern Snake River Plain Aquifer is a critical ground water resource supporting Idaho agriculture, rural communities, and economic stability, and its protection is a matter of statewide importance; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Legislature has formally expressed opposition to the Lava Ridge project, citing documented concerns regarding impacts to agriculture, the Eastern Snake River Plain Aquifer, aviation safety, wildlife habitat, and Idaho's natural landscapes; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that transmission infrastructure constructed that does not benefit Idaho utility customers and does materially harm agriculture, critical water resources, or rural communities is inconsistent with the expressed policy position of the State of Idaho; and

WHEREAS, Idaho's long-term reliability and grid stability require secure, dispatchable base load generation capable of continuous output independent of weather variability, including advanced and conventional nuclear energy technologies, hydroelectric plants, and natural gas generation; and

WHEREAS, Idahoans rely on affordable, dependable energy from responsibly developed natural gas generation that provides flexible, on-demand power and supports energy security through locally owned and operated resources; and

WHEREAS, all major transmission infrastructure projects that materially affect Idaho ratepayers must demonstrate a clear, measurable, and durable net benefit to Idaho ratepayers,

measured by reduced long-term cost exposure, strengthened in-state energy security, and tangible benefits to Idaho's in-state energy and economic interests, before approval or cost allocation is permitted at the state level.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature of the State of Idaho formally acknowledges that transmission projects built in Idaho must demonstrate a clear, measurable, and durable net benefit to Idaho ratepayers as demonstrated by utility-integrated resource plans.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the standards expressed in this Resolution are intended by the Legislature to guide state-level permitting, siting review, and any cost recovery proceedings before the Idaho Public Utilities Commission, which ensures that Idaho ratepayers are not required to subsidize infrastructure that does not benefit Idaho utility customers or is inconsistent with Idaho's base load reliability priorities.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature affirms that private property rights, local land use authority, and the protection of agricultural and rural communities are paramount considerations in the siting and review of any major transmission infrastructure within the State of Idaho, and that the use of eminent domain should be strictly limited to the purposes allowable under Idaho law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature supports the advancement of responsibly developed conventional and advanced nuclear technologies, hydroelectric generation, geothermal, and natural gas generation as the proper foundation for Idaho's future energy system and as the preferred means of providing secure base load energy for Idaho citizens and industries, including the necessary major transmission resources to move energy from its generation source to Idaho citizens.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature encourages Idaho-regulated public utilities to continue to review and analyze utility participation in any interstate energy market to ensure participation in such markets does not conflict with Idaho's commitment to reliable, dispatchable base load generation, ratepayer protection, private property rights, and state energy sovereignty.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be transmitted to the Governor of the State of Idaho, members of the Idaho Public Utilities Commission, Idaho-regulated electric utilities, and Idaho's congressional delegation.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 33

BY STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STATING FINDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND ESTABLISHING AN INTERIM COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE CRIME OF SEXTORTION AND TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE LEGISLATURE.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

WHEREAS, predators threatening to disclose intimate images of another in exchange for money, more sexual content, or other favors is becoming an increasing problem throughout the country; and

WHEREAS, these images can be obtained through coercion, deception, or hacking and can be either real or created artificially so as to be indistinguishable from a real image; and

WHEREAS, such a crime is commonly referred to as "sextortion," and those under 18 years of age are the most common victims; and

WHEREAS, victims of sextortion can experience mental health issues such as anxiety and depression, financial loss, reputational damage, and in some cases may attempt suicide or other self-harm; and

WHEREAS, victims of sextortion, especially those who are minors, often feel fear, shame, or embarrassment and fail to tell anyone or ask for help; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Office of the Attorney General states that sextortion cases are one of the main issues currently being reported to the office; and

WHEREAS, it would greatly benefit the people of Idaho for the Legislature to study the crime of sextortion, the effects on its victims, and means of prevention; to review ways to strengthen or expand current statutes regarding sextortion; and to address ways to help and support the victims of sextortion.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-eighth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislative Council is authorized to establish an interim committee to undertake and complete a study of the crime of sextortion, means of prevention, and the effects on its victims, in particular those victims under 18 years of age, and to make recommendations regarding ways to strengthen current statutes to address the effects on victims of sextortion. The Legislative Council shall determine the number of legislators and membership from each house appointed to the interim committee, shall appoint members of both the majority party and minority party, and shall authorize the interim committee to receive input, advice, and assistance from interested and affected parties who are not members of the Legislature. Other members of the interim committee shall include a representative from the Office of the Attorney General's Internet Crimes Against Children Unit, the Idaho Department of Education, and the Idaho Crisis and Suicide Hotline.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the cochairs of the interim committee who are appointed by the Legislative Council may appoint additional nonvoting members of the interim committee to represent stakeholders.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that nonlegislative members of the interim committee shall not be reimbursed from legislative funds for per diem, mileage, or other expenses.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Services Office shall provide staff support to the interim committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the interim committee shall, by January 31, 2027, report its findings, recommendations, and proposed legislation, if any, to the First Regular Session of the Sixty-ninth Idaho Legislature.
